appreciated around the world; and

Whereas, through the contributions of such African–Americans as Dr. Charles
Drew, George Washington Carver, Dr. Mae C. Jemison, and Garrett Morgan, the
worlds of medicine, science, and technology were advanced; and

Whereas, African–Americans have kept alive and derived pride and unity from
their history and other aspects of their cultural traditions; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the assembly, That the members of the Wisconsin assembly
remember and commend African–Americans for their achievements and recognize
the value of those achievements to African–Americans and to other Americans; and,
be it further

Resolved, That in order to encourage everyone in this state to recognize and
salute African–American history and culture, the members of the Wisconsin
assembly declare February "African–American History and Cultural Heritage
Month."
