Hi. Senator Moore signed herself on to the Boys and Girls Club legislation on the floor of the Senate, so she supports the B&G club receiving a direct allocation of Community Youth Grant funding.

However, a number of youth organizations in Milwaukee (and other places) that recieved Community Youth grant funding from Act 9 were quite outraged that the legislation took the \$450,000 TANF appropriated in Act 16 for Competitive grant funding and earmarked it for the B&G Club in this fiscal year. DWD was waiting to see the outcome of the Wirch legislation prior to issuing any of the \$450,000 TANF for competitive youth grants appropriated this year.

Since we have a substantial portion of unappropriated TANF dollars, I would suggest that we alter the legislation as follows:

appropriate \$450,000 to the B&G Club in this Fiscal Year using a portion of the Unappropriated TANF balance. Then, in the second year of the biennium, leave the bill the way it is currently drafted (uses funding placed in unallotted reserves, as a result of the Governor's veto).

Therefore, the \$450,000 that is currently available for competitive youth grant funding would continue to be available and you would save yourself a lot of headaches! We got a number of calls against the bill as drafted.

I have talked with Victoria about this idea, so she would know how to draft such a proposal.

### **3. Boys and Girls Club Youth Outreach Funding Proposal**

#### **DWD – Community Youth Grants Funding**

##### **Background Information –**

- Senator Wirch worked very hard during budget deliberation in the JFC to secure \$1 million in the TANF package for the Boys and Girls Club.
- Both the Senate and Assembly Caucuses retained the funding of \$1 million Boys and Girls Club Youth Outreach Program. In fact, it remained in the 2001-03 budget until it reached the governor's desk.
- The governor vetoed \$450,000 TANF annually from the Boys and Girls Club earmark, leaving the program with \$50,000 TANF annually. The governor uses the 2001 \$450,000 TANF for competitive grants under the community youth grant program, to be dispensed by the DWD's discretion. The 2003 \$450,000 TANF goes back to unallotted reserves, in case there is a shortfall in TANF funding.
- Senator Wirch and Representative Krawczyk this session authored SB272/AB542 that reverse the governor's veto, reallocating competitive grant funding to the Boys and Girls Club. AB542 passed out of the Assembly on an 86-13 vote. SB272 passed out of the Senate Labor and Agriculture Committee with unanimous support, but failed to be scheduled in the full Senate before the close of regular session.

##### **Funding Sources for this new proposal (W-2 contracts and Unallotted Reserves)-**

- Currently, the Fiscal Bureau projects that under spending of W-2 contracts is estimated to exceed \$20 million TANF. The JFC has already set aside \$15 million TANF from this under spending for a contingency fund for W-2 benefits. DOA has also set aside \$3.8 million TANF from this under spending to prepare DWD for transition costs for new service delivery regions in 2002. There is still \$1.2 million available in the TANF balance that has currently not been earmarked. This amendment takes \$450,000 from the \$1.2 million balance for funding for the 2001-02 Boys and Girls Club budget.
- For the 2002-03 year, this amendment provides \$450,000 to the Boys and Girls Clubs by using funds that were placed in unallotted reserve by the Governor's partial veto of Act 16.
- By passing this amendment, we are retaining \$450,000 for competitive community youth grants for programs throughout Wisconsin, while also allocating additional funding for the Boys and Girls Club.

##### **Why Additional Boys and Girls Club Funding is so Crucial-**

- This proposal reaffirms our state's commitment to target at-risk youth in order to prevent delinquency, drug abuse and misconduct statewide.

- The Boys and Girls Club Youth Outreach Program began when \$2.6 million TANF was allocated in the 1999-2001 budget and has demonstrated its effectiveness through the Programs' positive results in reaching almost 2,000 at-risk children (1,935) in over 21 locations across Wisconsin (see attached data results that illustrate the effectiveness of the youth outreach program).
- Currently, the Youth Outreach Program is budgeted \$100,000 this biennium. Obviously, this statewide organization will have to dramatically cut staff and program from its budget if no additional funding is allocated. The Boys and Girls Club is fighting for an additional \$900,000 TANF under this proposed amendment, still a huge deficit from the \$2.6 million that was allocated last biennium.
- Targeted Outreach Program has proven its effectiveness through its referral network intervention, aggressive community outreach and educational activities.
- The Targeted Outreach Program fosters alternatives for at-risk children, which prevents them from becoming involved in gang activity and keeps them out of the judicial system.
- Tutoring, computer access, sports and arts and crafts are just a few examples of the many activities low-income children have received through the Targeted Outreach Program.
- The Targeted Outreach is provided in Boys and Girls Clubs to the following communities: Antigo, Appleton, Beloit, Fond du Lac, Ft. McCoy, Green Bay, Hayward, Janesville, Kenosha, La Crosse, Madison, Milwaukee, Neopit, Oshkosh, Sheboygan, Sparta, Superior, Tomah, Wausau, West Bend and Wisconsin Rapids.
- Our children deserve every chance to meet their potential. Making sure they have safe and structured programs after school gives our youth additional opportunities in which to succeed.
- It is important that the state continues its strong partnership with Boys and Girls Clubs, a statewide nationally recognized organization, and ensure our children's bright futures through the continuation of funding for the Targeted Outreach Program.

### WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

#### Community Youth Grants—Boys and Girls Clubs of America

Proposal:

Increase funding for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America by \$450,000 annually for a total allocation of \$500,000 annually in 2001-03. In 2001-02, transfer \$450,000 from the W-2 contracts administration and services line item in the temporary assistance for needy families (TANF) program to the community youth grants line item and designate the funding for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America. In 2002-03, increase funding for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America using \$450,000 that was placed in unallotted reserve by the Governor's partial veto of Wisconsin Act 16 (the 2001-03 biennial budget act).

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Note:

The community youth grant program is funded by the TANF block grant. As passed by the Legislature, Senate Bill 55 (the 2001-03 biennial budget bill) would have provided \$500,000 annually for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America through the community youth grant program. In Act 16, the Governor's partial veto reduced the amount of funding available for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America from \$500,000 annually to \$50,000 annually. For 2001-02, the overall allocation for community youth grants was not changed, meaning that \$50,000 is designated for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America and \$450,000 is available for competitive grants under the community youth grant program. For 2002-03, the overall allocation for community youth grants was reduced by \$450,000 but the funds remain appropriated to DWD. The veto message requested that the Secretary of the Department of Administration place this \$450,000 in unallotted reserve in 2002-03.

The proposal would increase funding for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America by \$450,000 annually for a total allocation of \$500,000 annually. This would be accomplished without increasing appropriation levels in the Department of Workforce Development.

In 2001-02, \$450,000 would be transferred from the W-2 contracts administration and services line item in the TANF program to the community youth grants line item and designate the funding for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America. Under this proposal, \$450,000 would still be available for competitive grants under the community youth grant program. The funds being

## *Data Results illustrating effectiveness of Youth Outreach Program of Boys + Girls Club.*

The Center for Urban Initiatives and Research (CUIR) at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee entered into a contract with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Wisconsin in February 2000 to provide evaluation services for the Targeted Outreach program. As part of the evaluation, CUIR worked closely with the Boys and Girls Clubs to develop an alternative to the cumbersome and unreliable method of collecting individual monthly tracking forms on paper that was in effect at the start of the program. In its place, CUIR and the Boys and Girls Clubs implemented an internet-based tracking system that both reduced the time required for data collection and increased the quality of the data that were collected. This system could serve as a model for future data collection efforts that involve multiple program sites.

The data collection system has yielded a very rich set of data that we are in the process of analyzing. We are, however, able to share at this time certain results relating to some of the specific goals of the Targeted Outreach program.

The goals for the Targeted Outreach program were to identify 1300 at risk children, reduce further involvement with law enforcement, maintain or improve school performance and build self-esteem. Targeted Outreach was funded through TANF funds from January 2000 to December 2001. The program existed in 26 locations throughout the state.

- Goal:** Enroll 1300 at risk youth in the program.  
**Result:** A total of 1999 youth participated over the course of the first two years of the program. At the close of 2001, 1408 youth were actively enrolled.
- Goal:** Promote active participation in programming to avoid negative behaviors.  
**Result:** In an average month, 56% of youth attended clubs two or more times per week; 32% attended clubs four or more times per week.
- Goal:** Maintain or improve scholastic performance.  
**Result:** Among youth for whom academic performance was tracked (77% of youth), 73% maintained school grades, and 23% improved their grades. Forty-two percent (42%) of youth participated in tutoring programs
- Goal:** Improve self-esteem and leadership.  
**Result:** 6650 occurrences of achievement in club (2137), volunteering (3053), or assignment of responsibility within club (1460) were documented.
- Goal:** Reduce involvement with law enforcement  
**Result:** Over half these at risk youth were referred to the program by law enforcement, schools, or other local agencies. Studies have shown that of all Boys and Girls Clubs participants who had previous criminal activity, 72% had no further involvement with law enforcement. In the Targeted Outreach program, contact with police was reported for only 5% of participants.
- Goal:** Target at risk children of poor, working parents.  
**Result:** All children in Targeted Outreach met TANF poverty eligibility criteria.

# State panel restores club funds

## Joint Finance puts back \$900,000 into budget

With bipartisan support, state budget writers voted Monday to restore \$900,000 in federal funding for Boys and Girls Clubs, money that Gov. Scott McCallum removed in August.

The Joint Finance Committee would mean the Kenosha club

over the next two years if the bill drafted by Sen. Robert Wirch, D-Kenosha, makes it through the Senate and Assembly and survives the governor.

The Senate may vote this week.

"It's looking pretty good," Wirch said Monday. "Seven of the eight Republicans on the committee supported it, and

Lawmakers had approved a \$1 million allocation for the state's 21 clubs when they sub-

mitted the budget to McCallum. The governor trimmed \$900,000, insisting that social service organizations had to share the pain in a tight budget.

Wally Grafien, executive director of the Kenosha club and government relations coordinator for clubs statewide, praised Wirch and his colleagues for recognizing a worthy program.

"Bob has worked hard and our members have worked hard contacting key legislators, especially those serving on Joint Finance," Grafien said.

The money would be used to provide recreational activities for children who have the poten-

tial to become involved with gangs or have had contact with gangs. Under the supervision of a case manager, the kids participate in activities like tutoring, computer skills, athletics and arts and crafts.

The local club had \$90,000 to use for the program during the last biennium and served more than 100 kids, Grafien said.

"This is important at a time when local governments and community agencies are strapped for cash," Wirch said. "The clubs are trying to reach out and keep kids away from gangs and away from the judicial system."

# Lack of funds risks gang prevention program

Boys and Girls Club staff member's job would be at risk

A gang prevention program managed by the Boys and Girls Club of Kenosha/CYC Sports will be scaled back if the Legislature doesn't restore funds earmarked for the club.

The state has helped support gang prevention programs for the last two years, said Wally Graffen, executive director of the Boys and Girls Club of Kenosha/CYC Sports. If the funding, most of which was vetoed by Gov. Scott McCallum, is not restored, a staff member would have to be eliminated, Graffen said.

The Legislature approved \$1

million for the 21 state clubs in the 2001-2003 budget. McCallum vetoed all but \$100,000 of that in August, insisting that social service organizations share the pain of a tight budget. Legislators voted to resubmit the proposal on Nov. 5, but last Thursday, the final day of the fall session, several Assembly Democrats halted the proposed funding restoration through a procedural tactic.

Efforts to keep the measure alive will resume when the Legislature reconvenes in late January, said Sen. Robert Wirch, D-Kenosha, the primary author of the bill.

"I think the governor perhaps made a mistake with his veto," Wirch said. "It's important to realize we need a prevention fund in the budget. The counties are using ... youth aid money to lock up offenders. We need some

money to work with gang prevention and at-risk youths. The Boys and Girls Club proved to be an excellent advocate for at-risk youths."

Several Assembly Democrats want to make the money available to other organizations that serve at-risk youths "but that is like diluting the soup with too much water," Wirch said.

State Rep. David Travis, D-Madison, was one of those who worked to halt the proposal.

"This sounds real good but the fact is they are taking the funding for this from 28 other organizations that are already doing this job," Travis said. "It's taking money away from organizations who received grants through competitive bidding. The Boys and Girls Clubs do great jobs, but money should not be taken away from other

organizations." Part of the bill's suspension comes from waiting to find out the amount of Taniff funds available for this program, Wirch said. Taniff funds are federally distributed funds set aside for temporary assistance for needy families. Because of other competing interests for Taniff funds, it's important the Legislature knows the amount accessible. The bill would be drawing out of these funds.

Kenosha's Boys and Girls Club received \$50,000 the last two years and will receive that amount for 2002 if the proposal is approved.

The money helps pay for at-risk youth staff members. Each staff member works with 50 to 75 at-risk youths. If the proposal is rejected, a smaller staff will limit the number of new students able to participate in the program.

"Any child already in the program would not receive reduced services," Graffen said. "We would never turn a child away that is already in the service. We won't be able to take as many referrals as we had before."

Currently, between 250 and 400 students, ages six and older, are involved with the program. About 95 percent of at-risk youths do not participate in juvenile or criminal behavior after joining the gang prevention program, Graffen said.

# Lawmakers vote to fund group Assembly bill restores local and state money

The state assembly backed a bill Wednesday that would restore funding to the Boys and Girls Clubs of America. The loss of funding has already made the local club lay off gang prevention staff.

Lawmakers voted 86-13 in favor of the bill, sending it to the state Senate.

The bill would restore the group's grant to \$500,000 in fiscal year 2002 and fiscal year 2003 by taking the money out of reserves.

In August, Gov. Scott McCallum vetoed all but \$100,000 of a

Legislature approved \$1 million for 21 state clubs in the 2001-2003 budget.

As of January, the Boys and Girls Club of Kenosha/CYC Sports had to lay off two part-time staff, said Wally Grafen, director of the social service.

The gang prevention program has been scaled back this year.

Kenosha's Boys and Girls Club received \$90,000 in 2000 and 2001 and would receive that amount for 2002 if the funding is restored.

He was ecstatic yet cautious of the bill's approval.

"It's great news," Grafen

said. "It's one of the few hurdles we need to overcome to get it reinstated into the budget."

Senator Bob Wirch agreed the battle is not won.

"There is opposition in the Senate," Wirch said.

The threat to block the legislation comes from several legislators who represent areas without Boys and Girls Clubs in their area, he said.

"We're hopeful," Wirch said. "Our argument is the cuts to local government would def-

ninitely jeopardize these services in the community and the Boys and Girls Club are uniquely tar-

geted to deal with these youths." If it's backed by the Senate, it goes back to McCallum for approval.

"There are precious few dollars there," Wirch said. "This is separate federal money but there are a lot of different groups who want to use the funds out there."

The Tanft funds are federally distributed funds set aside for temporary assistance for needy families.

"It shows that in an extremely tight fiscal atmosphere, the haves and have-nots for taking care of an area," Wirch said.

I received the redrafting instructions relating to the above-captioned Caucus Motion. i.e., "Reduce from \$450,000 to \$250,000. Keep reserve language."

My question is whether your intent is to reduce the amount in both fiscal years or only in the first fiscal year. Currently, the amendment calls for appropriating \$450,000 in new money in FY 01-02 and allocating \$450,000 from unallotted reserve as a result of the Governor's veto for FY 02-03.

Unless I hear otherwise from you, I am construing "keep reserve language" to mean "do **not** reduce the amount from unallotted reserve in the 2nd year from \$450,000 to \$250,000.". If that is not your intent, please advise and I will reduce the 2nd-year amount to \$250,000 as well.
