## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

The bill would restrict access to social security numbers that are contained on certain public records of the state and local governments. It would also require state agencies to prepare privacy impact statements on bills impacting on personal privacy, and it would preclude taxation districts (municipalities) from putting photographs of residential property on the Internet.

The proposed restrictions on social security numbers are not expected to interfere with the Department of Revenue's administration of state taxes and in particular with enforcing compliance with those taxes. In addition, the proposed privacy impact statements could be prepared using existing resources.

Some municipalities currently place photographs of residential property on the Internet, for example, as part of the online information available on property assessments on such property or as advertising for the sale of foreclosed property. They would incur costs to remove those photos from the Internet, should this bill be enacted. Local governments may also incur additional costs as a result of the proposed restrictions on access to social security numbers. However, the impact on their costs is not expected to be significant.
