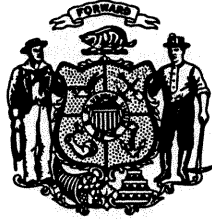

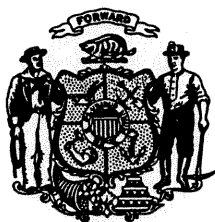

CLEARINGHOUSE RULE 99-072

Comments

[NOTE: All citations to "Manual" in the comments below are to the Administrative Rules Procedures Manual, prepared by the Revisor of Statutes Bureau and the Legislative Council Staff, dated September 1998.]

2. Form, Style and Placement in Administrative Code

a. In the analysis to the rule, the first two lines in the second paragraph under the heading "Background" are set forth twice--once on page 1 and again on page 2.

b. In the analysis to the rule, under the heading "Rule Contents," the phrase "exhibitors when showing a bull calf" is incomplete.

c. In s. ATPC 160.02 (4) (c), subd. 1. was inadvertently listed twice.

d. The rule should be changed in a number of provisions that refer to "this premium level" to refer instead to, for example, "premium level one." For example, see s. ATPC 160.24 (1), (2) and (3). Titles are not part of the substance of a rule. [See s. 1.05 (3) (a), Manual.]

e. In the third sentence of s. ATPC 160.53 (2) (intro.), it appears that "board" should be inserted after "fair."

f. In s. ATPC 160.55 (1), it appears that pars. (a) to (h) were inadvertently not included.

g. In s. ATPC 160.64, "naturespace" should be separated into two words, as it appears in the current rule.

4. Adequacy of References to Related Statutes, Rules and Forms

Section ATCP 160.51 (3) refers to s. ATCP 160.60 (b). A subsection number should be included before "(b)."

5. Clarity, Grammar, Punctuation and Use of Plain Language

a. Must the department approval referred to in s. ATCP 160.02 (4) (b) be in writing, as is required under the current rule?

b. Section ATCP 160.04 (1) refers to exhibitors who ". . . have completed any school grade at or below grade 13." Should "grade 12" be substituted for "grade 13"?

c. Section ATCP 160.15 (2) (intro.) should end with a colon.

d. In s. ATCP 160.16 (5), a comma should be inserted before "respectively" for consistency with other provisions of the rule.

e. In s. ATCP 160.72 (intro.), "equine" should be changed to "equestrian."

(Clearinghouse Rule #99-072)

In accordance with Wis. Stats. § 229.19 (2) and (3), the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection hereby transmits the above rule for legislative committee review. We are enclosing three copies of the final draft rule, together with the following report. In accordance with Wis. Stats. § 227.10 (2), the department will publish a notice of this referral in the Wisconsin Administrative Register.

Background: Explanation of Need for Rule Revisions

Under Wis. Stats. § 93.23, the department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection ("department") is authorized to distribute state aid moneys to county and district fairs. Currently, about 76 county and district fairs receive state aids from the department. State aid moneys appropriated under Wis. Stats. § 20.115 (4) (b) and (g) are used to reimburse county and district fairs for premiums awarded to fair exhibitors. In each year of the 1997-99 biennium, the Legislature allocated \$585,000 of state gaming revenues for that purpose.

Under Wis. Stats. § 93.23, the department may reimburse a county or district fair for 95% of the first \$8,000 in net premiums awarded by the fair, and 75% of all net premiums over \$8,000. The maximum amount of reimbursement is \$15,000. In order to qualify for state aid under Wis.

Stats. § 93.23, a county or district fair must award premiums according to a uniform premium list which the department adopts by rule.

The department's current rules under Wis. Adm. Code ch. ATCP 160 specify detailed entry classes for county and district fair exhibits. For each entry class, current rules specify uniform premiums for first place to fourth place premium awards. The department will pay state aid only on that portion of a premium award that is within the maximum amount specified by department rule. Under this rule, premiums for most exhibits range from \$1.00 to \$3.00, although higher amounts may be awarded for some classes of exhibits.

The department updates its county and district fair rules every 5 years, based on recommendations from the Wisconsin association of fairs. The Wisconsin association of fairs is a state association of organizations that sponsor county and district fairs in this state. This rule is adopted as part of the department's regular 5-year update cycle, and incorporates the most recent recommendations of the Wisconsin association of fairs.

Rule Contents

This rule specifies a number of new and revised entry classes for county and district fair exhibits. It also specifies a number of new and revised premium awards in various entry classes. This rule makes the following changes to current rules, among others:

- It adds a specific department or entry class for computers and computer programs.
- It restates the age requirement for eligibility to exhibit in the junior fair division. Current rules specify that junior fair division exhibitors may be 8 through 19 years of age. This rule eliminates the lower age limit from the rule and authorizes the department to pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under age 20 on January 1 of the current fair year. The rule also permits a county or district fair board to establish subgroups within an entry class based on the exhibitor's grade level in school.
- It eliminates specific breeds as entry classes in the dairy goats, poultry and rabbits departments for both the open division and junior fair division. The new rules allow the local fair to establish entry classes comprised of a single breed, or a combined breed class consisting of two or more breeds within the same group, none of which are offered by the fair as a separate entry class.
- It adds a poultry market entry class in the open class division.
- It simplifies the rule by eliminating specific entry classes for departments 18 to 32 in the open fair division. The affected departments include exhibits such as flowers and houseplants, clothing, home furnishings, and foods and nutrition. The new rules simply list the premium levels and authorize the local fair board to establish specific classes and groupings under each premium level.

- The language for specific classes was eliminated in the open division in departments 18 through 32. Premium levels only were listed, as well as an opening statement that fairs may establish their entry classes.
- Bull calves were removed from the junior dairy cattle department.
- All showmanship classes were revised so that premium levels only were listed along with the suggestion to sub-divide entry classes.
- A "dairy sheep" class was added to the sheep department.
- In the junior division departments 14 through 34 were repealed and recreated. The language for specific classes was eliminated and only premium levels were listed, along with an introductory statement outlining the exhibit guidelines.

This rule also makes a number of technical and drafting changes to current rules.

Changes from Hearing Draft

On May 13, 1999, the department held two public hearings on the proposed rule revisions in Madison and Wausau. In addition to the normal hearing notice, the department provided specific notice to the Wisconsin Association of Fairs. Two people registered and testified at the hearing. Both people supported the revisions in general, except one person disagreed with using grades versus age, in setting youth exhibition guidelines. The other person wanted the terms and classes rewritten for open class draft horses.

In written responses, letters from three University Extension offices requested changes in the Jr. Horse department to allow all classes to receive premiums following the Danish judging system. One of these letters attached 16 signatures supporting the request. There was one written request from the Wisconsin 4-H Horse Association to add and replace various classes, along with a request to change all premiums paid out to exhibitors to follow Danish system.

The department did not make any revisions to the final draft other than a couple of technical changes.

At the October meeting of the State Board of Agriculture, an individual commented on the proposed final draft rule during the public appearances section of the agenda. He voiced concern over changing the eligibility for junior fair exhibitors from an age-based criterion to one based upon the academic grade level of the exhibitor. His concern was the highest grade-level at which an exhibitor would still be eligible to participate in the junior fair division. The department thoroughly investigated this issue and its recommendation to keep age as the junior fair eligibility criterion was approved by the State Board of Agriculture. This rule eliminates the lower age limit from the current rule and authorizes the department to pay state aid on prizes offered to exhibitors who are under age 20 on January 1 of the current fair year.

Response to Rules Clearinghouse Comments

The Legislative Rules Clearinghouse report suggested minor changes in the form, style, and placement in the Administrative Code, as well as some clarity and grammar changes. These changes have been incorporated into the rule.

Fiscal Estimate and Small Business Analysis

This rule will have no significant fiscal impact on the department or local units of government (see fiscal estimate attached); nor will it have any significant impact on small business.

Regulatory Flexibility Analysis

The proposed rule, Wis. Adm. Code ch. ATCP 160, County and District Fairs, has been reviewed pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 227.114. and the rule will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small businesses.

**Analysis Prepared by the Department of

Statutory Authority: ss. 93.07(1) and 93.23(1)(a)2., Stats.

Statutes Interpreted: s. 93.23, Stats.

This rule updates the department's current rules related to county and district fairs. Among other things, this rule establishes new and revised entry classes for county and district fair exhibits, and specifies uniform premium awards for various entry classes.

Background

Under s. 93.23, Stats., the department of agriculture, trade and consumer protection ("department") is authorized to distribute state aid moneys to county and district fairs. Currently, about 76 county and district fairs receive state aids from the department. State aid moneys, appropriated under s. 20.115(4)(b) and (g), Stats., are used to reimburse county and district fairs for premiums awarded to fair exhibitors. In each year of the 1997-99 biennium, the Legislature earmarked \$585,000 of the state's gaming revenues for that purpose.

Under s. 93.23, Stats., the department may reimburse a county or district fair for 95% of the first \$8,000 in net premiums awarded by the fair, and 75% of all net premiums over \$8,000. The

- It eliminates all bull calf entry classes from the dairy cattle department in the junior fair division. This change is made for safety reasons because of the potential for injury to youth exhibitors when showing a bull calf.
- It amends the showmanship class in each department in which it occurs in the junior fair division by eliminating exhibitor classes for beginners, intermediates, and seniors. The revision also gives the local fair board discretion to establish specific entry classes and subdivisions of entry classes.
- It creates an entry class for dairy sheep in the junior fair division's sheep department.
- It repeals and recreates rules for departments 14 to 34 in the junior fair division. The affected departments include exhibits such as flowers and house plants, clothing, home furnishings, and foods and nutrition. The new rules simply list the premium levels and authorize the local fair board to establish specific classes and groupings under each premium level.

This rule also makes a substantial number of technical and drafting changes to current rules.

SECTION 1. ATPC 160.02(4) is repealed and recreated to read:

ATPC 160.02(4) SPLIT FAIR DATES. (a) For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.

(b) Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat a demonstration or exhibit.

(c) The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates, regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:

1. Clothing revue.

1 2. Demonstrations.

2 3. Favorite foods revue.

3 4. Dogs.

4 5. Small animals.

5 6. Rocketry.

6 7. Shooting sports.
