I. OVERVIEW

Burdge School is a "Community of Learners." Staff members believe all students CAN and WILL learn. A variety of strategies and techniques are used to make sure all students learn. Every program implemented has academic achievement as the driving force, and is carefully planned and guided by the district mission and goals. While all programs are important, the following are key to enhancing student success: 1.) extended-day programs; 2.) arts infusion; 3.) technology training; 4.) home/school/community partnerships fostering open, collaborative decision-making. Students have the opportunity to be involved in a myriad of educational experiences that build upon their unique learning styles and enable them to be happy, productive learners. Students are also provided opportunities to use their individual strengths, gain confidence to become risk takers, develop personal character, and are taught that learning is a lifelong process.

1999-2000 School Year Highlights

- 1. The rate of parent involvement in the Lightspan Program was 81%.
- 2. Teams from 4 other districts visited Burdge to observe the TRIBES Process and Lightspan Program.
- 3. The Traveling Troupe performed at 15 different community events and participated in the National Choral Event, "America Sings," in Chicago.
- 4. Participants in a two day "Data Retreat" included 80% of the staff and site team community representative.
- 5. Two staff members facilitated "Data Retreats" for teams representing all elementary schools in the district.
- 6. Students' learning time was extended by 2,051 hours through the home component of the Lightspan Program.
- 7. Scores on the second and fifth grade P5 Writing Assessment were higher than the average for both the district and state P5 schools.
- 8. Burdge's third grade scores on the Wisconsin Reading Comprehension Test were highest in the district.
- 9. Burdge participated in the National Evaluation of the Comprehensive School Reform Demonstration, a study sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education.



The chart below shows the school's performance on the CTBS-5.



B.WRCT - Grade 3



Hackett Elementary staff believe that learning is a lifelong process and is a journey not a race. Students come to us with a variety of backgrounds, skills and abilities. 





I. OVERVIEW

McLenegan's reading scores on the WRCT were again high compared to other district elementary schools and exceeded the state average. This continuing excellence is attributed to the efforts of the whole staff. As a P5 school we are able to hire additional reading specialists who work with all students in small reading groups. This successful program has again allowed us to be above 80% advanced and proficient in reading. Again, for the third year in a row, we do not have any students in the minimal range in 3rd grade reading.

McLenegan has two schoolwide initiatives, one in reading and one in math. Our math goal was to increase our achievement by 10% schoolwide. We exceeded our goal. On the WCKE, 76% of our 4th grade students scored in the advanced/proficient range. Our scores on the 3rd grade WRCT indicated that 81% of our students scored in the advanced/proficient range.

McLenegan's staff has been trained in TRIBES. This program helps us teach our students social competencies that help maintain and improve a positive classroom atmosphere.

Our Home-School Coordinator increased our parent-school participation by 100% over last year.

- April Wilder, a 4th grader, won 3rd place in the Kappa Gamma Book Contest.



The chart below shows the school's performance on the CTBS-5.


The school exceeded the national performance benchmark (NCE-50) in 4 of 5 subjects.

The school exceeded or maintained its 1998-99 performance in 3 of 5 subjects.




B. WRCT - Grade 3
