#### I. OVERVIEW

Merrill School will continue to show improvement in student achievement. Recently, Merrill School was included in DPI's new brochure, "Guide to the Achievement Gap," highlighted for success in increasing student achievement of diverse students. Test scores have steadily increased since 1997. For example 3<sup>rd</sup> grade reading scores increased from 59% proficient or above in 1997-98 to 80% proficient or above in 1990-00. One reason for continued success has been our Success for All Reading Program. We have completed our third year in the program and are looking forward to our fourth year. Finally, Merrill School was a recipient of school improvement awards for two years in a row. We believe school is part of our community family. We would like to thank our parents for their continual support.



The school did not exceed its 1998-99 performance in any subject area.




#### B. WRCT - Grade 3

The chart below shows the school's reading performance relative to District, Peer, and State benchmarks.



#### I. OVERVIEW

Wright's school motto is "Building a Strong Foundation." In order for students to be successful in the present and future world, they must have a solid beginning. With this in mind, the energy and expertise of Wright's staff members are directed toward providing the best possible environment for students to obtain a strong foundation. With the support of the school, home and community, all students can and will learn. Wright students and staff continue to work toward higher achievement on standardized and local assessments by focusing on data, delivery of instruction, staff development, parental involvement, and student preparation. Wright continues to use available community resources, such as Beloit College, Northeast Business Association, neighborhood churches and service organizations to assist with exposing students to every opportunity to broaden their knowledge and reward their efforts. Staff members look forward to the challenges and opportunities that come with each new school year. The District's strategic plan, "Student Success for the 21st Century," continues to serve as the foundation from which programs are built.

#### 1999-2000 School Year Highlights

- 1. Wright's 5<sup>th</sup> grade math team placed third at the P5 State Math Meet.
- 2. The 3<sup>rd</sup> grade Destination Imagination team placed first in the regional competition.

- Chris Brown, a 5<sup>th</sup> grade student, won first place in the Beloit College Poetry Contest.
   Wright's 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students placed first in the District Small School Track Meet.
   Wright's 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students sang at the Beloit College Commencement Ceremony.
- 6. Our 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade Peer Mediators made a video to promote the program and instituted recess patrol to help solve conflicts.
- 7. Mr. Victor Farrell, Beloit College President, was chosen as winner of the school's Martin Luther King Award.
- 8. All-day kindergarten was introduced. 84% of the kindergarten students scored above minimal proficiency in reading, with 57% scoring proficient or advanced, compared to only 3% scoring above minimal in the fall.
- 9. Our 2<sup>nd</sup> grade students' average holistic writing sample score was higher than both the district and the state P5 average.
- 10. Over 70% of 4th graders scored proficient or advanced in social studies on the WKCE.
- 11. We had continued success with our Family Game Nights.
- 12. Initiating a comprehensive needs assessment, we achieved a 98% response on parent surveys.
- 13. ESL support was increased by hiring a Spanish-speaking educational assistant and a translator.






