Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law, a school district does not receive state special education aid for the costs of contracting with a public or private agency for speech therapy services. This bill explicitly authorizes a school district to contract for speech therapy services and makes the costs of such a contract eligible for special education aid.

State Fiscal Effect:

This bill has no state fiscal effect.

Local Fiscal Effect:

Allowing school district eligibility for special education aid for costs relating to contracting for speech therapy services would possibly cause a redistribution of special education aid, but would not affect the total amount of special education aid that currently is distributed to school districts. Because it is unknown how many districts may contract for speech therapy services as allowed by this bill, the local fiscal effect of this provision is indeterminate.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications
