- (g) "Out-of-state licensee" means an individual who is 21 years of age or over,
 who has been issued an out-of-state authorization and who is not prohibited from
 possessing a firearm under s. 941.29 or from possessing a firearm that has been
 transported in interstate or foreign commerce under federal law.
- 17 (h) "Private property" has the meaning given in s. 943.13 (1e) (e).
- (i) "Proprietor" means a person to whom a Class "B" or "Class B" license or
 permit has been issued under ch. 125.
- (ig) "Purpose of authorized analysis" means for the purpose of determining or
 obtaining evidence of the presence, quantity, or concentration of any intoxicant in a
 person's blood, breath, or urine.
- 23 (is) "Test facility" means a test facility or agency prepared to administer tests
 24 under s. 343.305 (2).

(j) "Weapon" means a handgun, an electric weapon, as defined in s. 941.295 (4),

(2) ISSUANCE OF LICENSE. (a) Except as provided in pars. (b) 1. and (c), each
county, through its sheriff, shall issue licenses to carry a concealed weapon to an
individual who meets the qualifications specified in sub. (3) and who completes the
application process specified in sub. (7). A license to carry a concealed weapon issued

(2g) CARRYING A CONCEALED WEAPON; CARRYING AND DISPLAY OF LICENSE DOCUMENT
OR AUTHORIZATION. (a) A licensee or an out-of-state licensee may carry a concealed
weapon anywhere in this state except as provided under sub. (15m) or (16) or s.
943.13 (1m) (c) or 941.20 (1) (b).

(b) A licensee shall carry his or her license document and an out-of-state
licensee shall carry his or her out-of-state authorization at all times during which
he or she is going armed with a concealed weapon.

(c) If he or she is carrying a concealed weapon, a licensee shall display his or
her license document and an out-of-state licensee shall display his or her
out-of-state authorization to a law enforcement officer upon the request of the law
enforcement officer.

(2i) PRELIMINARY BREATH SCREENING TEST. (a) *Requirement.* A person shall
provide a sample of his or her breath for a preliminary breath screening test if a law

enforcement officer has probable cause to believe that the person is violating sub.
 (16) (cm) 1. and if, prior to an arrest, the law enforcement officer requested that the
 person provide this sample.

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(b) Use of test results. A law enforcement officer may use the results of a
preliminary breath screening test for the purpose of deciding whether or not to arrest
a person for a violation of sub. (16) (cm) 1. or for the purpose of deciding whether or
not to request a chemical test under sub. (2k). Following the preliminary breath
screening test, chemical tests may be required of the person under sub. (2k).

9 (c) *Admissibility.* The result of a preliminary breath screening test is not 10 admissible in any action or proceeding except to show probable cause for an arrest, 11 if the arrest is challenged, or to show that a chemical test was properly required of 12 a person under sub. (2k).

(d) *Refusal.* There is no penalty for a violation of par. (a). Neither sub. (17) (b)
nor the general penalty provision under s. 939.61 applies to that violation.

(2j) IMPLIED CONSENT. Any person who carries a concealed weapon in this state
is deemed to have given consent to provide one or more samples of his or her breath,
blood, or urine for the purpose of authorized analysis as required under sub. (2k).
Any person who carries a concealed weapon in this state is deemed to have given
consent to submit to one or more chemical tests of his or her breath, blood, or urine
for the purpose of authorized analysis as required under sub. (2k).

(2k) CHEMICAL TESTS. (a) *Requirement.* 1. 'Samples; submission to tests.' A
person shall provide one or more samples of his or her breath, blood, or urine for the
purpose of authorized analysis if he or she is arrested for a violation of sub. (16) (cm)
1. and if he or she is requested to provide the sample by a law enforcement officer.
A person shall submit to one or more chemical tests of his or her breath, blood, or

1	urine for the purpose of authorized analysis if he or she is arrested for a violation of
2	sub. (16) (cm) 1. and if he or she is requested to submit to the test by a law
3	enforcement officer.
4	2. 'Information.' A law enforcement officer requesting a person to provide a
5	sample or to submit to a chemical test under subd. 1. shall inform the person of all
6	of the following at the time of the request and prior to obtaining the sample or
7	administering the test:
8	a. That he or she is deemed to have consented to tests under sub. (2i).
9	b. That a refusal to provide a sample or to submit to a chemical test constitutes
10	a violation under par. (e) and is subject to the same penalties and procedures as a
11	violation of sub. (16) (cm) 1.
12	c. That in addition to the designated chemical test under par. (b) 2. he or she
13	may have an additional chemical test under par. (c) 1.
14	3. 'Unconscious person.' A person who is unconscious or otherwise not capable
15	of withdrawing consent is presumed not to have withdrawn consent under this
16	paragraph, and if a law enforcement officer has probable cause to believe that the
17	person violated sub. (16) (cm) 1., one or more chemical tests may be administered to
18	the person without a request under subd. 1. and without providing information
19	under subd. 2.
20	(b) <i>Chemical tests.</i> 1. 'Test facility.' Upon the request of a law enforcement
21	officer, a test facility shall administer a chemical test of breath, blood, or urine for
22	the purpose of authorized analysis. A test facility shall be prepared to administer
23	2 of the 3 chemical tests of breath, blood, or urine for the purpose of authorized
24	analysis. The department may enter into agreements for the cooperative use of test
25	facilities.

2. 'Designated chemical test.' A test facility shall designate one chemical test
 of breath, blood, or urine which it is prepared to administer first for the purpose of
 authorized analysis.

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3. 'Additional chemical test.' A test facility shall specify one chemical test of
breath, blood, or urine, other than the test designated under subd. 2., which it is
prepared to administer for the purpose of authorized analysis as an additional
chemical test.

8 4. 'Validity; procedure.' A chemical test of blood or urine conducted for the 9 purpose of authorized analysis is valid as provided under s. 343.305 (6). The duties 10 and responsibilities of the laboratory of hygiene, department of health and family 11 services, and department of transportation under s. 343.305 (6) apply to a chemical 12 test of blood or urine conducted for the purpose of authorized analysis under this 13 subsection. Blood may be withdrawn from a person arrested for a violation of sub. 14 (16) (cm) 1. only by a physician, registered nurse, medical technologist, physician 15 assistant, or person acting under the direction of a physician and the person who 16 withdraws the blood, the employer of that person, and any hospital where blood is 17 withdrawn have immunity from civil or criminal liability as provided under s. 18 895.53.

19 5. 'Report.' A test facility which administers a chemical test of breath, blood,
20 or urine for the purpose of authorized analysis under this subsection shall prepare
21 a written report which shall include the findings of the chemical test, the
22 identification of the law enforcement officer or the person who requested a chemical

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(c) Additional and optional chemical tests. 1. 'Additional chemical test.' If a
person is arrested for a violation of sub. (16) (cm) 1. and if the person is requested to
provide a sample or to submit to a test under par. (a) 1., the person may request the
test facility to administer the additional chemical test specified under par. (b) 3. or,
at his or her own expense, reasonable opportunity to have any qualified person
administer a chemical test of his or her breath, blood, or urine for the purpose of
authorized analysis.

10 2. 'Optional test.' If a person is arrested for a violation of sub. (16) (cm) 1. and 11 if the person is not requested to provide a sample or to submit to a test under par. (a) 12 1., the person may request the test facility to administer a chemical test of his or her 13 breath or, at his or her own expense, reasonable opportunity to have any gualified 14 person administer a chemical test of his or her breath, blood, or urine for the purpose 15 of authorized analysis. If a test facility is unable to perform a chemical test of breath, 16 the person may request the test facility to administer the designated chemical test 17 under par. (b) 2. or the additional chemical test under par. (b) 3.

18 3. 'Compliance with request.' A test facility shall comply with a request under19 this paragraph to administer any chemical test that it is able to perform.

4. 'Inability to obtain chemical test.' The failure or inability of a person to
obtain a chemical test at his or her own expense does not preclude the admission of
evidence of the results of a chemical test required and administered under pars. (a)
and (b).

24 (d) *Admissibility; effect of test results; other evidence.* The results of a chemical
25 test required or administered under par. (a), (b), or (c) are admissible in any civil or

criminal action or proceeding arising out of the acts committed by a person alleged
to have violated sub. (16) (cm) 1. on the issue of whether the person had alcohol
concentrations at or above specified levels or was under the influence of an
intoxicant. Results of these chemical tests shall be given the effect required under
s. 885.235. This subsection does not limit the right of a law enforcement officer to
obtain evidence by any other lawful means.

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7 (e) *Refusal.* No person may refuse a lawful request to provide one or more 8 samples of his or her breath, blood, or urine or to submit to one or more chemical tests 9 under par. (a). A person shall not be deemed to refuse to provide a sample or to submit 10 to a chemical test if it is shown by a preponderance of the evidence that the refusal 11 was due to a physical inability to provide the sample or to submit to the test due to 12 a physical disability or disease unrelated to the use of an intoxicant. 4. Whether the person refused to provide a sample or to submit to a chemicaltest.

(2m) LICENSE DOCUMENT; CONTENT OF LICENSE. (a) Subject to pars. (b), (c), and
(d), the department shall design a single license document for licenses issued and

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1	renewed under this section. The department shall complete the design of the license
2	document no later than the first day of the 4th month beginning after the effective
3	date of this paragraph [revisor inserts date], and shall distribute the design for
4	the license document to any sheriff who issues licenses under sub. (2) (a) or (c) for the

20	extent possible, tamper proof. The contents of the license document shall be included
21	in the document in substantially the same way that the contents of an operator's
22	license document issued under s. 343.17 are included on that document.
23	(3) QUALIFICATIONS FOR OBTAINING A LICENSE. An individual is eligible for a
24	license under this section if all of the following apply:
25	(a) The individual is at least 21 years of age.

1	(b) The individual does not have a physical disability that prevents him or her
2	from safely handling a weapon. The department shall promulgate rules specifying
3	the procedures and definitions that the sheriff is required to apply when determining

6	(c) The individual is not prohibited under federal law from possessing a firearm

10	under s. 51.20 for being drug dependent.
11	(f) During the preceding 3 years, the individual has not been convicted for any
12	violation, or for the solicitation, conspiracy, or attempt to commit any violation, of ch.
13	961 or of a federal law or a law of another state that is comparable to any provision
14	of ch. 961.
15	(g) The individual does not chronically and habitually use alcohol beverages or
16	other substances to the extent that his or her normal faculties are impaired. A person
17	is presumed chronically and habitually to use alcohol beverages or other substances
18	to the extent that his or her normal faculties are impaired if, within the preceding
19	3 years, any of the following applies:
20	1. The individual has been committed for involuntary treatment under s. 51.45
21	(13).
22	2. The individual has been convicted of a violation of s. 941.20 (1) (b).
23	3. In 2 or more cases arising out of separate incidents, a court has found the
24	individual to have committed a drunk driving offense.
25	(h) The individual has done one of the following:

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2. Successfully completed a National Rifle Association firearm training or firearm safety course or class that meets the requirements under sub. (4m).

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3 3. Successfully completed a firearm training or firearm safety course or class 4 that meets the requirements under sub. (4m) and that is conducted by an instructor 5 certified by the state in which the course or class was conducted, by the National Rifle 6 Association, or by another national or state organization that certifies firearms 7 instructors.

8 4. Successfully completed a firearm safety or firearm training course or class 9 that is available to the general public and that is offered by a law enforcement agency, 10 a private or public school, institution, or organization, or a firearm training school, 11 if the course or class uses instructors certified by the National Rifle Association, by 12 another national or state organization that certifies firearms instructors, or by the 13 department or if the curriculum meets the minimum requirements of the law 14 enforcement standards board and the requirements under sub. (4m).

5. Successfully completed a firearm safety or firearm training course or class
that meets the requirements under sub. (4m) and that is offered for law enforcement
officers, correctional officers, special deputies, private detectives licensed under s.

(i) The individual has not been found incompetent under ch. 880 or, if the
individual has been found incompetent under ch. 880, he or she was subsequently
found to be competent and at least 5 years have elapsed from the date that he or she
was found to be competent.

(im) The individual was not the subject of a protective placement under s. 55.06
 as a minor unless at least 5 years have elapsed from the date on which his or her
 protective placement ended.

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- 4 (j) The individual has not been involuntarily committed for treatment under
 5 s. 51.20 due to mental illness or a developmental disability or, if the individual has
 6 been involuntarily committed for treatment under s. 51.20 due to mental illness or
 7 a developmental disability, he or she shows, through evidence from a psychiatrist
 8 licensed in this state, that he or she has not been disabled due to mental illness or
 9 a developmental disability for at least 5 years.
- 10 (k) The individual has not been found incompetent under s. 971.14 or, if the

1 (n) The individual has not been charged with a felony or a misdemeanor crime 2 of violence for which the prosecution was suspended under a deferred prosecution 3 agreement unless 3 years have elapsed since the date of the agreement.

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(o) The individual is not the subject of any pending civil or criminal case, the 5 disposition of which could disqualify him or her from having a license under this 6 subsection.

7 (p) The individual has not previously submitted an application for a license 8 under this section to any county and had the application denied, unless each reason 9 for the denial is no longer applicable because of changed circumstances or, if the 10 denial was based on a restriction under sub. (3) that applies for a specified period of 11 time, because that time period has run.

12 (q) The individual has not had a license that was issued under this section 13 revoked, unless each reason for the revocation is no longer applicable because of 14 changed circumstances or, if the revocation was based on a restriction under sub. (3) 15 that applies for a specified period of time, because that time period has run.

16

(r) The individual has not been convicted under sub. (17) (c), (d), or (e).

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(s) The individual is a Wisconsin resident.

18 (3m) FEDERAL PREEMPTION. The requirements under sub. (3) (e), (g) 1., (i), (im), 19 (j), (k), and (L), apply only to a person who may lawfully possess a firearm under federal law. 20

21 (5) APPLICATION AND RENEWAL FORMS. The department shall design an 22 application form for use by individuals who apply for a license under this section and 23 a renewal form for use by individuals applying for renewal of a license under sub. 24 (15). The department shall complete the design of the application form no later than 25 the first day of the 4th month beginning after the effective date of this subsection

An applicant shall swear under oath that the information that he or 23 she provides in an application submitted under sub. (7) and any document submitted 24 with the application is true and complete to the best of his or her knowledge.

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1	(7) SUBMISSION OF APPLICATION. An individual may apply for a license under this
2	section with any sheriff. An applicant shall submit all of the following to the sheriff

14	(e) A full-face photograph of the applicant taken within the 30-day period
15	immediately preceding the date of the applicant's application.
16	(9) PROCESSING OF APPLICATION. (a) Upon receiving an application submitted
17	under sub. (7), a sheriff shall request that the department conduct a background
18	check, as provided under sub. (9g).
19	(b) Subject to par. (c), within 30 days after receiving an application under sub.
20	(7), a sheriff shall do one of the following:
21	1. Issue the license and promptly send the licensee his or her license document
22	by 1st class mail.
23	2. Deny the application, but only if the applicant fails to qualify under the
24	criteria specified in sub. (3). If the sheriff denies the application, he or she shall

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inform the applicant in writing, stating the reason and factual basis for the denial to the extent permitted under federal law.

14	(am) The department shall maintain a computerized record listing the names
15	of all individuals who have been issued a license under this section along with the
16	information concerning each individual that is provided to the department by a
