Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill proposes to create a complex, new post-conviction process for several classes of offenders that would offer them treatment, rather than incarceration, and the ultimate possibility of expunging their records. While this bill would not change the number of cases referred to district attorneys offices by law enforcement nor the prosecutors' work in obtaining an initial conviction, it has the potential to increase significantly the post-conviction workload of prosecutors. This is because, as the convicted person goes through the post-conviction treatment processes that would be offered under this bill and either meets or fails to meet the expectations placed upon him or her, various judicial determinations are required. To the extent that the district attorneys' offices would be required to present the state's positions on the various matters before the court regarding the person's satisfactory compliance with the process to date and the appropriate next steps, there could be a significant workload and therefore a significant cost were this bill to be enacted.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications

Unknown. The actual impact on the district attorneys office would have to be carefully monitored to determine if additional state resources are needed.
