## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This proposal would extend for two additional years the sunset for the Applied Technology Center program. Under this program technical college districts may expend up to \$5 million to construct an Applied Technology Center facility to provide training and technical assistance to business and industry in the district without seeking approval of the district voters in a referendum. The project is subject to approval by the WTCS Board's facilities approval process and must meet additional criteria with respect to ongoing financial particiaption in the construction and operation of the ATC facility by the business community.

The WTCS Office estimates that there would be no significant fiscal effect at the state level of the proposed legislation as no state funds are used in the construction of ATC facilities.

The WTCS Office is unable to estimate the short-term fiscal effects of the proposal at the local level. The Legislature gave technical college districts the authority to build ATCs in the 1999-01 Biennial Budget. To date, only two of the 16 districts have undertaken the construction of ATCs. Several districts have considered constructing ATCs and chosen not to pursue these projects; others may pursue the construction of ATCs if the sunset is extended. The exact number of projects being actively considered by the districts is unknown. In addition, districts must receive WTCS Board approval to develop projects and it is unknown if the Board would approve additional projects over the next several years.

## **Long-Range Fiscal Implications**

Their is no significant long range state fiscal effect associated with extension of the sunset for the ATC program.

The long range local fiscal effect is indeterminate. It is impossible to know at this time if any new ATCs would be constructed during the time of the proposed extension of the sunset.
