Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill provides protection for victims of identity theft who could be denied utility services because of credit issues arising from the theft. The bill creates a affidavit process for the individual to provide information, including police reports, to the utility in the event services are disconnected. If the utility does not accept the affidavit and related information, the individual may petition the PSC to intervene.

The requirements of the bill to insure utility services to victims will not significantly affect either the PSC or local government as it relates to those governments who provide certain basic utility services. The assumption is that there will be very few times where the utility would not accept the affidavit and supporting documentation. Therefore, the PSC will probably be petitioned on a very infrequent basis. Even if there were more than infrequent instances where petitions were forwarded to the Commission, the Commission has staff skilled in working with consumers and the utilities to insure protection of services and to investigate the situation for the Commission.
