Dear Representative Suder,

A unique opportunity exists for the State of Wisconsin to finally make youth environmental education a priority. **Assembly Bill 910 and Senate Bill 496** make it a priority to teach our children the importance of Wisconsin's diverse natural landscapes and rich environmental legacy.

By directing the funding to go to the Natural Resources Board, it insures that the intent of this initiative will be used for youth environmental education. Such a permanent funding source would allow the focus to be on the program and teaching youth, not finding the money necessary to operate. The youth environmental education program can therefore focus and build on its successes.

As a result, the program can be used as a tool to deter future polluters, educate Wisconsin's youth on environmental issues, and promote our State's natural resources.
