





Testimony of State Representative Steve Wieckert
Regarding SB 33, Law Enforcement Use of Photos
Before the Senate Transportation & Information Infrastructure
Committee
March 19, 2003

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee,

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in favor of Senate Bill 33 regarding the access by law enforcement agencies to photographs on motor vehicle licenses and identification cards.

This legislation would allow Federal law enforcement agencies to have more direct access to photos maintained by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. This would allow our local law enforcement agencies, who are now required to obtain these photos for Federal investigators, to free up their own time, allowing them to perform less administrative duties, giving them greater opportunity to provide law enforcement services.

Local, State and Federal law enforcement agencies are unanimously in favor of this legislation. The Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association has stated that, "This legislation provides additional resources for federal law enforcement and enhances their ability to locate and apprehend fugitives in felony cases." The Wisconsin Chiefs of Police Association supports this legislation. The association states, "strong support providing Federal law enforcement officers equal access during this age of collaboration and teamwork between local, state, county and Federal officials. The current conditions has created undue delays and inconvenienced local law enforcement who must act as a middleman when direct access by Federal officers could expedite some investigations. This legislation is more critical than ever now that our Federal agencies are tasked with investigating crimes related to terrorism on American soil." The Wisconsin Professional Police Association, which represents 9,900 police officers, has endorsed this legislation.

This legislation received wide bipartisan support last year including from the Wisconsin Department of Justice Attorney General Jim

Doyle who stated that, "On behalf of the Department of Justice, we thank you for your leadership in this effort (on AB 167) and wish to support your efforts to pass this legislation."

By streamlining the process to obtain the photos, a wide variety of law enforcement cases can be helped: whether it is tracking down a suspect, helping identify a bank robber, a fugitive, a missing person and in this day in age, what seems to be coming more frequent, helping to apprehend terrorists, this legislation can be of help.

I would like to close by reading a letter I received from the Federal Bureau of Investigation regarding this legislation (FBI Letter).
