Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill requires that the principal prenatal health care provider of a woman who is known to be pregnant offer to the pregnant woman information, by the 35th week of pregnancy, on the options to donate blood extracted from the umbilical cord of her newborn child to a blood bank. The bill provides that the offer of information on donation applies if the donation may be at no monetary costs to the donor, to the donor's health care insurance provider, or to the hospital in which the delivery will occur. Health care providers who refuse by reason of religion or personal conviction are exempt from this requirement.

This bill will not have a fiscal effect on the Department, counties, or local health departments.
