Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill creates an additional ground for termination of parental rights (TPR). The bill would allow parental rights to be involuntarily terminated on the ground that the parent has manufactured methamphetamine and that a child of the parent was present when the methamphetamine was being manufactured.

In 2004 there were 2,301 TPR actions filed in Wisconsin; in 2003, there were 2,587 TPR actions filed. These numbers include both voluntary and involuntary petitions for TPR and include actions brought by private parties as well by attorneys acting on behalf of the public (e.g. district attorney or corporation counsel). There is no data available to indicate which of the statutory grounds form the basis for these actions.

It is impossible to predict how many additional actions for involuntary TPR might be filed under this bill. It is possible that persons who meet the requirements for an involuntary TPR action under this bill are already subject to an involuntary TPR action based on existing statutory grounds.

Additional proceedings require additional judge, court reporter, court staff and juror time. These costs are borne by both the state and the county. An accurate estimate of the additional costs is impossible with the data available.
