Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The Department of Tourism would need to work with the Foundation to specify the design of the golf license plates. Further, the department would act as a pass-through for the money going to the Foundation. It is likely this work could be absorbed within the agency's current staff and budget authority.

It is difficult to determine the increased dollars that could become available for the department to promote golf since it is dependent on the number of Golf Wisconsin license plates sold (the department would obtain 25% of the add-on fees that are charged to Golf Wisconsin plate owners).

Since the plates are somewhat "sports generic" (as opposed to team –specific, like Packer or Badger plates), and only 25% of the fees paid by motorists for the custom plates accrue to Tourism, the department does not anticipate significant funding to materialize from Golf Wisconsin plates. Perhaps a few thousand dollars annually. On the other hand, since 5 "major" golf championships have been planned for Wisconsin in the next 15 years, a much larger impact could be realized as well.
