Under current law, a person who creates an ice hole in a lake by aeration of water must either place around the hole a fence made either of fence board or of plastic roll fencing or a barricade consisting of uprights and a continuous rope or similar material. This bill allows a person who is creating an ice hole by aeration to use alinvisible warning system if the person provides notification to the public as to the location of the ice hole. To meet these notice requirements, the person must provide written notice to each member of any lake association established for the lake, must twice publish a notice, with a map, in a newspaper most likely to give notice in the area affected, and must post notices, with maps, at each site where public access to the lake is allowed.
