Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Under current law penalty enhancers are provided for crimes committed that are considered more severe than ordinary crimes. This bill creates a new penalty enhancement when a person commits a crime against another person who is age 65 or older.

The Department of Corrections (DOC) is unable to project the number of offenders who may be subject to the criminal penalty provisions of this bill and is therefore unable to estimate the fiscal impact on state or local government.

DOC will incur increased costs if courts sentence offenders to longer periods of confinement in a state prison. In addition, since a Class A misdemeanor becomes a felony if the victim is 65 or older, this could result in offenders being admitted to a state prison who may have otherwise received a jail term. This would further increase state costs and decrease local costs. The FY05 annual cost for an inmate in a DOC institution is approximately \$26,200 and \$2,000 for a community supervision placement.

Local costs would increase if longer sentences result from the raising of the maximum penalty for a Class B and C misdemeanor to one year in jail.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications
