Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill makes substantive changes to the laws governing the education of children with disabilities. Many of the changes are the result of changes to the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) that were adopted in 2004. The bill has an effective date of July 1, 2006.

State Fiscal Effect:

This bill has no state fiscal effect. The bill changes, eliminates and adds various statutory requirements of school districts and the department. While these changes may have a fiscal impact on individual school districts and would possibly cause a redistribution of special education aid, the bill would not affect the total amount of special education aid currently distributed statewide. Changes to department responsibility under the bill would be managed with existing staff.

Local Fiscal Effect:

The bill makes a number of changes to statutory requirements placed on local education agencies with regard to the education of children with disabilities. Although the bill would not affect the total amount of special education aid currently distributed statewide, individual school districts may incur some costs as a result of the bill. Because it is unknown how many school districts would be affected, or the extent to which they would be affected, the local fiscal effect is indeterminate.
