1 **AN ACT** *to renumber* 118.019 (2m); *to repeal and recreate* 118.019 (2m) (title);

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

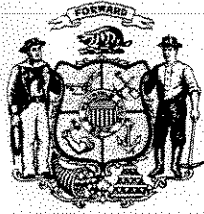
4 **SECTION 1.** 118.019 (2m) (title) of the statutes is repealed and recreated to read:
5 118.019 (2m) (title) REQUIRED SUBJECTS.

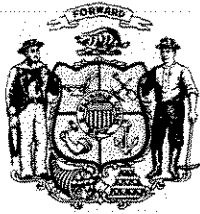



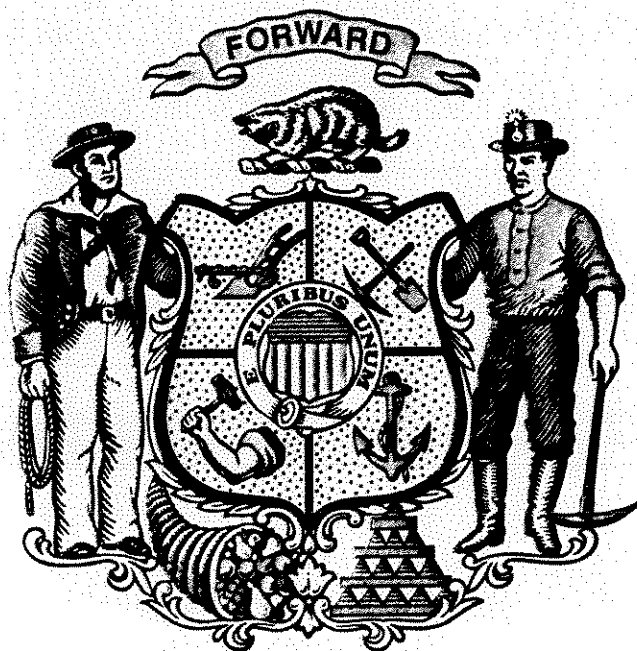

SB 286, sponsored by Senator Mary Lazich, requires that abstinence be the primary focus of human growth and development programs. This bill is scheduled for hearing before the Senate Education Committee on September 15, 2005. SB 286 would amend current law, which allows human sexuality education to include abstinence and contraception, to require that schools who teach human growth and development focus on abstinence-only messages. Sexually transmitted infection information is not currently included in human growth and development curricula. Planned Parenthood Advocates of Wisconsin supports a more balanced, responsible approach to human growth and development curriculum and urges you to reject SB 286.

Though abstinence is an important part of a sex education curriculum, the most effective programs at reducing and delaying teen sexual behavior involve balancing abstinence with prevention information. (Doug Kirby, *What Does the Research Say about Sexuality Education*, Educational Leadership, Oct 2000.) Focusing on both abstinence and contraception education is important so that young people learn healthy behaviors that reduce sexually transmitted infections and unintended pregnancy. SB 286 seeks to tip this balance so that abstinence only becomes the primary focus of human growth and development curricula.

SB 286 also makes the inaccurate assumption that within the confines of marriage there is no longer a danger of unintended pregnancy or sexually transmitted infections. We must teach our teens to make safe, responsible decisions now instead of leaving them to flounder and make risky decisions later in life as adults.

We invite all legislators to consider an Abstinence-Plus sexuality education bill, The Responsible Sex Ed Bill, LRB 2999/2, currently being circulated for co-sponsorship by Representative Tamara Grigsby and Senator Lena Taylor. We urge you to oppose SB 286.

Elevating Abstinence Education Above Prevention Endangers Wisconsin's Teens

Research shows that by age 18, over 60% of girls and 70% of boys have engaged in sexual activity.

It is important to focus on abstinence as part of a comprehensive sex education program, but to leave out essential lifesaving information for those teens that become sexually active is deeply irresponsible and dangerous. Despite millions of dollars that are allocated for abstinence-only sex education, this curriculum has not proven to work in delaying teen sexual behaviors, unintended pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections. For example:

- A study completed by the Minnesota Department of Health found no positive impact from its abstinence-only program on teen sexual behavior;
- Arizona's four-year evaluation of abstinence-only programs reported that sexual behavior rates did not appear to change;
- Pennsylvania found that its abstinence only program was "largely ineffective in reducing sexual onset and promoting attitudes and skills consistent with abstinence." (Sexuality Information and Education Council of the United States, Fact Sheet 2004.)

In Wisconsin, over 12,000 teens will become pregnant this year. Although nationally we rank 42 overall in teen pregnancy rates, Milwaukee has the second highest rate of the nation's cities. Over 80% of these pregnancies are unintended. In addition, the Institute for Women's Policy Research found that Wisconsin has the second highest Chlamydia rate and the 22nd highest syphilis rate in the nation.

The cost of unprotected teen sex is great, both socially and financially. The consequences for children of adolescent mothers are grave—they are 50% more likely to be low birth weight babies; they suffer poorer health; they are much less likely to grow up in single parent homes; they are far more likely to drop out of school; and daughters of teen mothers are 83% more likely to become teen mothers themselves. (Consequences and Costs of Adolescent Childbearing, Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services, 2001.) In addition, over 85% of the costs of teen pregnancies are assumed by Medicaid and state tax payers.

Abstinence Plus Education is Responsible and Effective

Sex education that includes both abstinence instruction and a clear prevention message is the most effective strategy. Examples of findings that support abstinence-plus sex education include:

- Research showing that teens who receive sexuality education that includes contraception information are more likely than those who receive abstinence-only to delay sexual activity and to use contraceptives when they do become sexually active. (National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy, 2001.)
- Research demonstrating that the current drop in teen pregnancy is attributed 75% to more effective contraceptive usage and 25% to increased abstinence. (AGI, 2004.)
- A report by then- Surgeon General David Satcher demonstrating that sex education programs that focus equally on abstinence and contraceptive use can help delay the onset of teen sexual activity, reduce their number of partners and increase contraceptive use when they do become sexually active. (*Call to Action to Promote Sexual Health and Responsible Sexual Behavior*, 2001).

- A report conducted in 2003 evaluated the effectiveness of 16 abstinence plus contraception programs. (Advocates for Youth, May 2003.) The results of the study found that:
 - 12 programs showed a statistically significant delay in the timing of first sex for adolescents, relative to control youth;
 - 16 of the programs demonstrated reductions in other sexual risk-taking behaviors;
 - 8 programs showed significant declines in teen pregnancy, birth and STI rates, relative to control youth.

- In a policy report released in July of 2005, the American Academy of Pediatrics concluded that only sexuality education programs including both abstinence and prevention components reduce teen pregnancy rates. In addition, the report recommends that all pediatricians help ensure that adolescents have knowledge of and access to contraception. (Pediatrics, July 2005.)

Thus, the evidence clearly shows that a strong abstinence-plus contraception message works to safeguard teens' health and lives.

Parents and the Public Overwhelmingly Support Responsible Sex Education

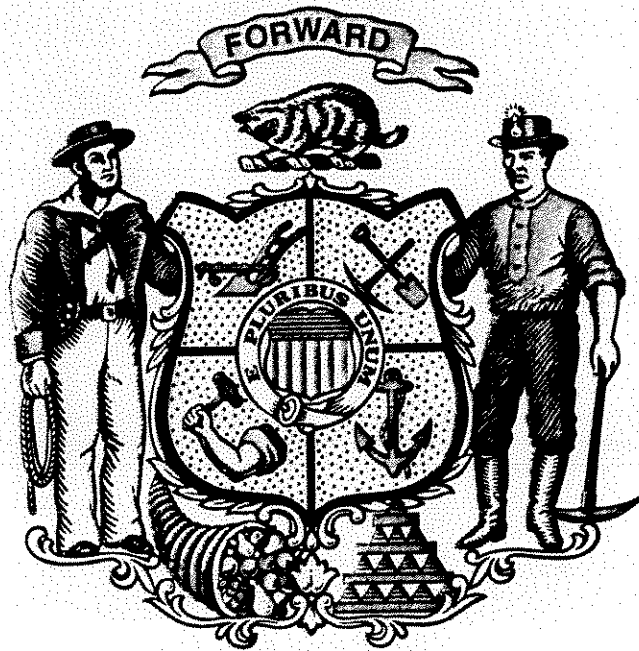
According to a recent survey by NPR, Kaiser Health Foundation and Harvard University, more than 8 out of 10 Americans believe that young people should have information about protecting themselves from unplanned pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections. (2004 Poll Sex Education in America.) In addition, recent polling in Wisconsin shows that over 77% of voters favor comprehensive sex education that includes abstinence and prevention instruction.

Countless medical organizations, like the American Medical Association, the American Nurses Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the American Public Health Association, and the Society of Adolescent Medicine support responsible sexuality education that includes abstinence and contraception.

To protect our teens and adults from unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections, sex education *must* treat abstinence and prevention as equally important components for an effective sex education curriculum. SB 286 fails to achieve this balance and places teens in danger.

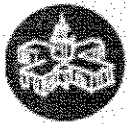

Planned Parenthood Advocates of Wisconsin urges you to join Senator Lena Taylor and Representative Tamara Grigsby in supporting LRB 3000/3 and 3505 with your co-sponsorship. This bill ensures that parents are notified by school districts if abstinence-only sex education is taught and students do not receive instruction on methods of contraceptive preventing unintended pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections (STIs). Planned Parenthood of Wisconsin, in cooperation with the Department of Public Instruction, encourages school boards to implement medically accurate, abstinence-plus prevention sex education curriculum and bypass dangerous, unproven abstinence-only programs in Wisconsin schools.

Abstinence Only Education is Irresponsible and Dangerous

It is important to focus on abstinence as part of a comprehensive sex education program, but to leave out essential lifesaving information for those teens that become sexually active is deeply irresponsible and dangerous. Despite millions of dollars that are allocated for abstinence-only sex education, including \$1,790,852 received in Wisconsin in 2004, this curriculum has not proven to work in delaying teen sexual behaviors, unintended pregnancies and STIs. None of this abstinence-only funding can be used to provide information about unintended pregnancy and STI preventing contraceptives. Not only are the federally funded abstinence-only programs ineffective, but last December, Rep. 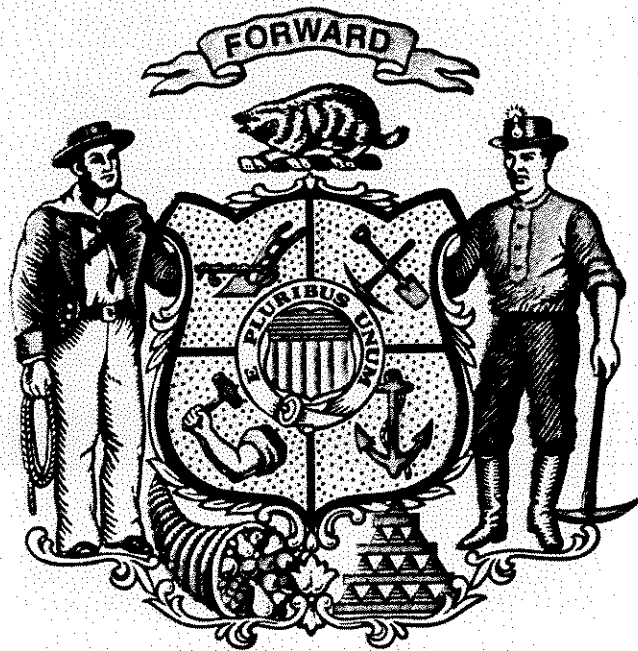

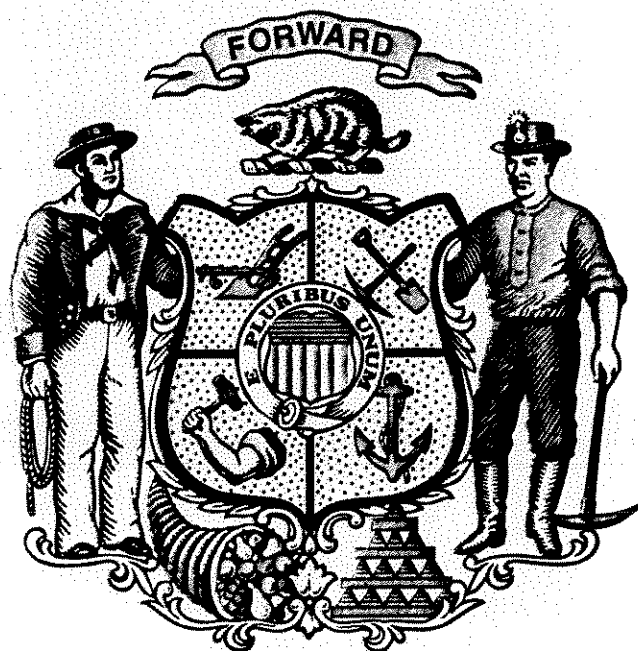

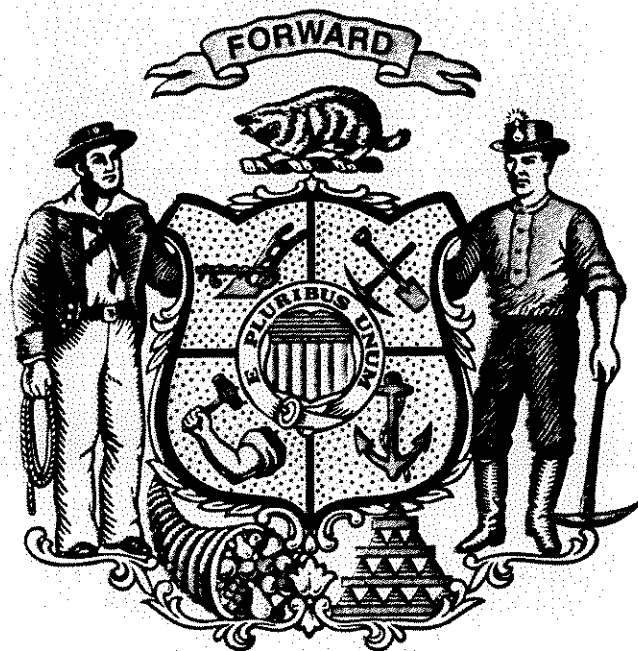

I respectfully urge the Senate Education Committee to strike down SB 286, the Irresponsible Sex Education bill. Promoting only abstinence in public school health and development courses ignores the fact that even before effective and safe contraception become available, teens engaged in unprotected sexual activity. Mandating abstinence education will do nothing to prevent teen sexual activity from occurring and in fact may make sex seem more enticing to teens, similar to the effect of barring a dieter completely from and all chocolate or salty indulgences.

More importantly, research compiled by the National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy shows that implementing a combined curriculum focusing on both abstinence education and safe contraception use spurs teens to both wait longer to have sex and then to engage in safer sex. Let's also keep in mind that Milwaukee, Wisconsin's largest city, has the second highest rate of teen pregnancy in the country. There is no evidence showing that if these teens--boys and girls--had been exposed to an abstinence only education that they would not have become sexually active, but research shows that 75% of the time teen pregnancy drops due to effective contraception use, which is promoted in a mixed education curriculum.

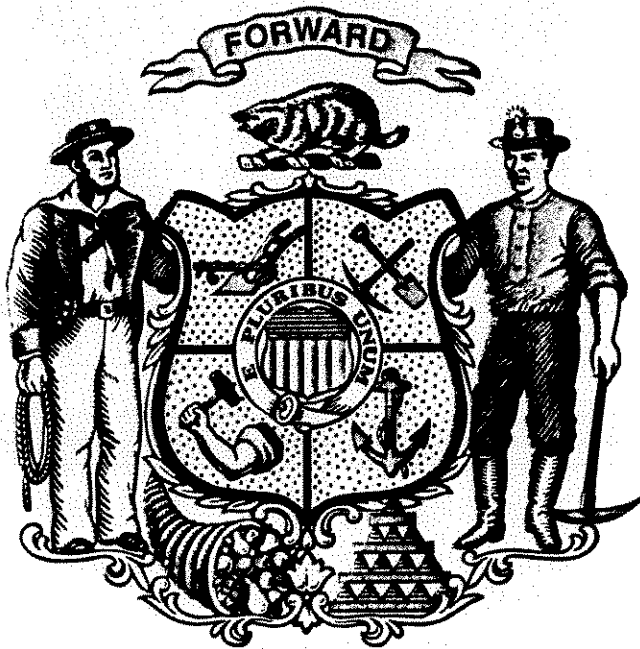

The Senate Education Committee will take up SB 286 on Thursday, 9/15. This bill requires instruction in human sexuality, reproduction, or family planning to emphasize abstinence.

My comments may not represent those of the entire Sun Prairie Area School Board. I am expressing my views to you as an individual board member, who has been elected and served on that Board for the past 10 years.

State law currently requires local school districts to have an advisory committee to formulate and review the human growth and development curriculum on a regular basis. That group of school district staff, parents and local clergy is very active in our community, and, I believe, this is where this type of decision must be made. Any curriculum regarding human growth and development MUST reflect the local values of the community in which it is delivered.

Thank you again for your time and all the hard work you do for education in this state.

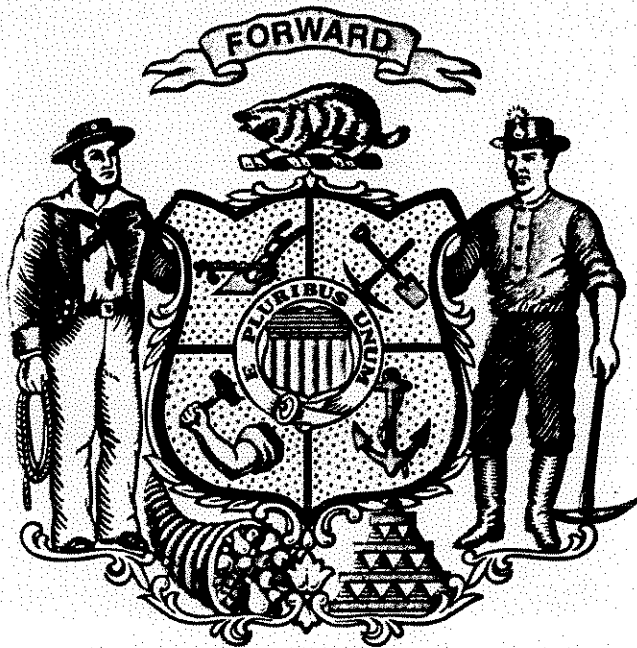

I wish to thank Senator Olsen and the members of the committee for the opportunity to present testimony on Senate Bill 286 that would require school boards that provide instruction in human sexuality, reproduction or family planning to present abstinence from sexual activity as the preferred choice of behavior for unmarried students.

The Family Research Institute of Wisconsin is glad to see such a bill introduced. We appreciate Senator Lazich's leadership and the support of the other co-sponsors. SB 286 is a good first step to improving human growth and development instruction in our schools and emphasizing abstinence.

While we support this bill, we do note a few problems with it. First, there is nothing in the bill that provides for enforcement of the bill's provisions. School districts will still have a lot of latitude in how they present material on abstinence. Wisconsin students deserve to hear that abstinence from sexual activity until marriage is the *only* way, not just the "preferred way" to prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Given how our Human Growth and Development law is written and how it is interpreted in school districts, it behooves the legislature to ultimately make abstinence-only education the only type of instruction students receive. We sell young people short when we assume that they will reject the abstinence message out of hand.

I repeat, this SB 286 a good first step. We look forward to your support of this bill and a continuing discussion of this issue, followed by even stronger abstinence-only education language in our state laws.
