



My name is Mike Murray and I am the policy specialist for the Wisconsin Coalition Against Sexual Assault, Inc. [WCASA]. WCASA represents nearly 200 individual, affiliate and organizational members across the state. Our goal is to work toward ending sexual violence in Wisconsin.

I am submitting this testimony to urge this committee to support SB 569, which would require that any person who is sentenced or placed on probation for a conviction of a fourth-degree sexual assault or the crime of exposing oneself to a child or causing a child to expose himself or herself to provide a DNA specimen to the crime laboratories. This sensible piece of legislation would correct an oversight when Wisconsin's laws were amended in 2000 to require that anyone convicted of a felony must submit a DNA sample. Unfortunately, the 2000 law accidentally eliminated DNA convictions for convictions of Fourth Degree Sexual Assault because it is a misdemeanor. This oversight is regrettable because often times Fourth Degree Sexual Assault convictions are the result of plea agreements stemming from very serious sexual assaults that would constitute a felony. In addition, the two other sexually motivated crimes against children (exposing oneself to a child or causing a child to expose himself or herself) included in this bill that should require DNA collection are not included under current law.

SB 569 would help promote public safety and hold offenders accountable for their actions. DNA evidence is often the most critical piece of evidence used to link sex offenders to a crime. Wisconsin has already used its DNA database to connect convicted felons to a specific crime, many of which were sexual assaults. This crucial evidence plays a key role for successful prosecution of sex offenders, which in turn helps provide closure for victims and promotes community safety. SB 569 will make Wisconsin's DNA database more effective by adding more DNA profiles of convicted criminals to the databank.

WCASA and its members thank Rep. Gundrum and Sen. Reynolds for sponsoring this important piece of legislation. Please help hold sex offenders accountable and protect our communities by supporting SB 569. Thank you.
