



THIS LEASE AGREEMENT, made and entered into this day, March 22, 2005, by and between the WISCONSIN STATE FAIR PARK BOARD, State Fair Park, 640 S. 84th Street, West Allis, Wisconsin 53214, hereinafter known as the Lessor and

hereinafter known as the lessee.

WITNESSETH THAT: for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements herein contained by each of the said parties, it is agreed as follows:

1. The Lessor agrees to furnish the use of the following facilities: **Wisconsin State Fair Park TGT Youth Center Banquet Room 2** on, **March 22, 2005** for the purpose of **conducting a committee hearing.**

For the space and facilities to be provided by the Lessor, the Lessee will pay to the lessor the following sum as rental: **Banquet Room 2 @ \$187.50**

- A. Balance of service and equipment charges (if applicable) is due five (5) working days after the final billing.
- B. Payments not made when due are subject to a late payment charge of eighteen percent (18%) per year from due date until paid in full.

2. The Lessor shall retain concession rights and privileges. Catering, beverage and food concessions are controlled exclusively by the Lessor. No food or beverages shall be brought onto the premises except through licensed and Lessor approved caterer. No food or beverages may be given away or otherwise distributed without prior written consent of the Lessor. The Lessee may not sell items provided by the caterer to the public.

3. Lessor's employees showing proper credentials issued by the Lessor shall have access to the leased premises at any time.

4. The Lessee agrees to pay all expenses incurred in the promotion and operation of the event and to conform in all respects with the laws of the State of Wisconsin; the Wisconsin State Fair Park Rules and Regulations; the Fire Prevention Guidelines; and the Motor Vehicle Exhibition Guidelines (if applicable) and to promote and conduct the event in a manner creditable to the State of Wisconsin and the Wisconsin State Fair Park.

5. The Lessee agrees to pay the Lessor for all required and/or requested services at the rates set forth in the attached rate schedule.

6. The Lessee agrees to accept responsibility for all liability of every kind arising from negligence or intentional conduct which causes or is alleged to have caused injury to persons or property and to hold harmless the Lessor, the State of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin State Fair Park Director, and their agents and employees from any such liability. The Lessee shall carry worker's compensation insurance and public liability insurance with blanket coverage of \$1,000,000 for any one accident-bodily injury and any one accident-property damage. A certificate evidencing such insurance shall be provided to the Lessor at least thirty (30) days prior to occupancy. Such certificate of insurance shall designate the Lessor, the State of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin State Fair Park Executive Director, and their agents and employees as additional insureds.

7. It is specifically understood and agreed that this Lease Agreement shall not be construed to create or evidence a partnership or joint venture between the Lessor and the Lessee and that both parties hereto are individually responsible for their respective debts and financial obligations. The Lessee shall not make representations to third parties contrary to the terms of this paragraph.

8. The Lessee shall inspect the facility and adopt proper safety precautions; take good care of the premises; suffer no injury to be done to the same; and return the possession of the same to the Lessor at the expiration of the occupancy under this Lease Agreement, reasonable wear and tear excepted. Damage to the premises shall be paid for by the Lessee at prevailing rates for time and materials. The Lessee agrees to use the premises for no other use than that specified herein. The Lessee shall not assign this Lease Agreement nor sublet the premises, or any part thereof, nor make any alterations to the premises without the written consent of the Lessor. In the event consent is granted to assign or sublease, the Lessee shall not permit any assignee or sublessee to engage in conduct prohibited to the Lessee by the terms of this Lease Agreement.

9. In the event that the Lessee fails to make any payment when due or fails to comply with any of the other terms of this Lease Agreement, the Lessor shall have the option of terminating this Lease Agreement and/or pursuing any other remedies provided by law. No such remedy shall be exclusive. Any payment obligations of the Lessee under this Lease Agreement shall survive a termination under the terms of this paragraph.

10. In the event that the Lessor is unable to perform the terms of this Lease Agreement by reason of war, insurrection, riot, civil commotion, strike, lock-out, weather, flood, fire, disaster, pestilence, epidemic, act of God, or other cause beyond the control of the Lessor, then this Lease Agreement shall, at the option of the Lessor, be canceled and all charges provided to be paid pursuant to the terms of this Lease Agreement by the Lessee prorated. In no event shall the Lessor be liable for any incidental or consequential damages sustained or alleged to have been sustained by the Lessee by reason of such cancellation or by reason of any other cause whatsoever.

General Terms and Conditions of Use**

DEPOSIT

Deposit payments are due and payable 30 days prior to use. **Deposits are non-refundable.**

PAYMENTS/BALANCES

Groups agree to the payment schedule described in their contract with Wisconsin State Fair Park. The non-refundable deposit will be applied to the final bill. The final bill will include incidental charges accrued during the event, will be prepared by Wisconsin State Fair Park, is due and payable within 30 days of the issue date.

CANCELLATION CLAUSE

If your group cancels its contract or reduces the total amount of its contract 15 to 30 days prior to scheduled arrival, the group agrees to payment of 50% of the initial requested services per the contract. If the group cancels 14 days or less prior to scheduled arrival, the group agrees to payment of 100% of the initial requested services per the contract. Any payment due to cancellation shall constitute liquidated damages, and shall not constitute a penalty.

LATE REQUEST FEE

Wisconsin State Fair Park may charge a \$50.00 late fee if a group makes additions or changes to function, lodging, or food and space arrangements within 7 days prior to scheduled arrival.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE POLICY

All food and beverage consumed at the Wisconsin State Fair Park Youth Center must be ordered and/or purchased through the Youth Center Caterer.

SMOKING POLICY

The Wisconsin State Fair Park Youth Center is a smoke-free facility. Smoking or the use of other tobacco products is prohibited in all banquet rooms, meeting rooms, guestrooms and common areas. Smoking is permitted in outdoor areas only.

ALCOHOL POLICY

The Wisconsin State Fair Park is the sole authority and will establish policy regarding alcoholic beverages on a case-by-case basis. The group contract shall contain the operating policy for alcoholic beverages during the period of the group contract.

Dear Honorable Senators and Chairperson Reynolds:

It is our hope that meaningful election reform takes place in Wisconsin. We are proud of our state's commitment to democracy and commend the committee for its work on behalf of citizens from every corner of our great state.

Here in Wisconsin, we take our right to vote very seriously. We've passed laws that have helped create one of the nation's most accessible election processes. At the same time, we've put in place strict guidelines to prevent fraud and cheating. Our process is better than most, but we can do more. Being one of the best has never been good enough for Wisconsin and it shouldn't be in this case, either. We must continue to make it easier to vote and harder to cheat.

Unfortunately, there is legislation before you today, Senate Bill 42, that seeks to chip away at this tradition of openness and this fight for clean and voter-friendly elections. Senate Bill 42, or, the "photo-ID bill", does nothing to increase voter turnout or the possibility of fraudulent votes being cast. Not only does the bill miss the two major aims of any real election reform, it also harbors potentially devastating consequences for our state's disabled, low-income, elderly and student populations. These constituencies already face nearly insurmountable burdens when wanting to cast a ballot. As a state, we cannot place any more limitations on citizens wishing to exercise their right to vote. We must be looking at finding ways to make it easier for our most vulnerable citizens to cast ballots. Real reform cannot be another limitation on our rights; right reform must include more poll workers and more training, better data collection, and more public awareness of voting laws and procedures.

It is our hope that, in sticking with the democratic tradition of our great state, the committee will work to achieve this type of reform and refuse to allow bills like SB 42 to erode our commitment to democracy.

We, the undersigned, hereby voice our opposition to Senate Bill 42, along with any other bill that fails to protect the voting rights of our state's citizens. Our petition to the committee is attached.



Senate Committee on Labor and Election Process Reform

Dear Members:

I am sorry I cannot attend today's hearing on SB 42 in person but prior commitments prevent me from doing so. I do, however, want to share my thoughts on the subject.

I am not opposed to the goal of verifying a person's vote. I am, however, opposed to restrictions that could unfairly deny or prevent anyone from voting. Wisconsin has a proud tradition of open and accessible voting. Our higher than average voter turnout is something to be proud of and we should not make changes that would reduce it. The proposed legislation that would require voter identification without a mechanism for a potential voter to receive the acceptable identification the same day would be a step backwards and not worth what little it would gain. Requiring voter identification is not fool proof. In fact, we recently learned that hundreds of licenses were wrongly issued to residents of Illinois.

The City of Milwaukee has received a great deal of attention since the November election. For the record, we processed and counted 277,535 voters successfully and the votes in question are a fraction of a percent of the total votes cast. In addition poll workers registered nearly 75,000 voters on election day which was a huge strain on the system in place. I have said that mistakes were made and reforms are necessary so we do not repeat those errors. Reducing access and increasing obstructions to voters will not solve the problems most talked about.

Specifically, requiring voter identification would not have prevented 82 felons from voting on Election Day since the Department of Transportation does not prevent felons from applying for a driver's license or document anywhere on the license that the recipient is a felon. I have said previously, if someone has violated the law, they should be held responsible for that action.

The majority of mistakes in Milwaukee and throughout the state were clerical and human in nature. This committee should focus its efforts to how it can assist municipalities by giving them the necessary resources to insure well-run elections and integrity in the returns. Better elections will require more poll workers and better training for those involved. The new statewide voter list provides an excellent opportunity to purge old voter information and implement uniform technology to provide better access and more cooperation. All of these require more resources at a time when we all want to hold the line on property taxes. It would be a better investment to use the voter identification dollars in the area of election administration at the local level than at DMV offices to issue identification cards that don't solve the problems.

Statement to the Senate Labor and Election Process Reform Committee Regarding AB63/SB42 relating to requiring certain identification in order to vote at a polling place or obtain an absentee ballot. **March 22, 2005**

The aftermath of Wisconsin's November 2 election has produced a firestorm of questions and accusations regarding discrepancies in registration lists and voting totals and possible fraud. Although the media focus has centered on heavily populated Milwaukee, similar problems occurred in Waukesha County and other areas of the state. In response to these problems the Legislative Audit Committee approved a review of voter registration procedures of municipalities statewide. The results of the audit will be completed later in the year. Also, an investigation has been launched by U.S. Attorney Steven Buskupic and Milwaukee County District Attorney E Michael McCann into Milwaukee's problems.

Despite this scheduled audit and investigation, there is a rush to pass legislation which its authors claim will correct these problems. Their proposal is to require all voters to present a photo ID in order to exercise their right to vote. (According to the Department of Transportation, 122,797 Wisconsin residents age 18 and older hold neither a photo driver license nor a photo ID card.) The League of Women Voters of Milwaukee County is very concerned about the rush to judgment before problems are identified.

A careful review of the reported irregularities in municipal voting overwhelmingly point to process errors. When voters registered, the required information of name or address or other vital information was not recorded properly. Poll lists contained invalid names, addresses or double registrations. In some cases absentee ballots were not assigned voting numbers. All of these situations result when there are faulty election procedures. These are process errors. They are not the fault of the voters.

Our questions regarding the ID bills concern not only election process, they raise the serious issue of denying qualified voters to vote. Photo ID does not identify whether or not you are a felon, does not even identify whether you are a citizen, nor does it reflect a voter's current address. A much better idea is the statewide voter registration list which will address these issues.

We believe that our concerns reveal the need for a more deliberate approach to election legislation. Until all investigations such as the audit review and current investigation have determined the actual problems, it is unreasonable to proclaim solutions.

The League of Women Voters of Milwaukee County opposes the ill-founded Voter ID legislation. Instead, we ask you to determine carefully how to maintain election procedures that continue to encourage the right of citizen participation.

Testimony on Senate Bill 42 – Assembly Bill 63

Good afternoon Chairman Reynolds and distinguished Committee Members.

Sunday, January 30th was an inspiring day; a day in which we witnessed the hopeful start of a new democracy in Iraq. The foundation of this new democracy was a free election in which nearly 8 million Iraqi citizens, roughly 60 percent, participated by casting a vote.

One key block in the foundation of our free country, our democracy in America, is our election process and the ability of our citizens to make a difference by casting a vote.

Unfortunately, this foundation has been softened, if not eroded, over recent years due to legitimate concerns regarding human administrative error and fraudulent voter activity. Each election year, we have witnessed increasing problems and frustrations with the process here in Wisconsin while the faith of our voters continues to erode. After hundreds of thousands of Iraqis risked their lives to cast a vote, there are far too many people in our country who do not go to the polls. Too many of our citizens wonder whether their vote will even count.

In the 2000 elections we learned of paid political operatives from New York offering cigarettes to homeless people in Milwaukee in exchange for votes, college students bragging about how many times they voted and known felons casting ballots. The 2002 elections were marked with questionable voting at bingo parties, unusual absentee voting schemes and ballots cast under names of people who had passed away.

Unfortunately, these concerns may eventually pale in comparison to the questionable activities and irregularities associated with the 2004 elections. Over the last few months, we have learned through numerous investigations and media reports, that the Milwaukee City Election Commission could not verify the addresses of approximately 10,000 people who registered to vote in Milwaukee in November 2004. In fact, the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reported that 17 polling places in the City of Milwaukee had approximately 100 votes more than the number of voters registered to have cast a ballot. Two polling places reportedly have 500 or more cast ballots in comparison to the number of voters who registered to vote. Just last week, we learned that 82 felons voted in the City of Milwaukee.

Due to concerns raised by myself and other legislators, each of these issues is being investigated. Currently, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and local police are conducting a joint investigation into these concerning events. In addition, the non-partisan Wisconsin State Legislative Audit Bureau is slated to begin an audit into these

discrepancies in the City of Milwaukee, and a number of other municipalities across the state later this year.

Clearly, these incidents suggest a pattern of activities that undermine Wisconsin's tradition of open and honest elections. That is why I have joined Representative Jeff Stone (R-Greendale) and 63 of our legislative colleagues in introducing Senate Bill (SB) 42, legislation that will require eligible voters to present a valid state-issued photo identification (ID) card at the polls before voting in any Wisconsin election.

Under this proposal, voters could use a valid Wisconsin Driver's License, a valid Wisconsin ID Card or an active military ID. For individuals who do not currently have one of these standard forms of identification, S.B. 42 would provide WI ID cards at no cost.

Furthermore, this legislation will allow elderly or infirmed voters who either cast their votes via absentee ballots via mail or vote in a nursing home or community based residential facility that is treated like a nursing home with regards to voting to include a signed written statement from a witness verifying their identity in lieu of a copy of a valid photo ID.

Together, Representative Stone and I have worked diligently to address previous concerns with this legislation. In fact, recently I conducted a survey of all clerks from municipalities with 5,000 or more people, clerks required by law to maintain poll lists, to ask them if they supported a photo ID requirement to vote.

Out of the 129 clerks who responded, 90 clerks, or 70 percent, supported this initiative while 29 clerks, or 23 percent, were opposed to it. These are the frontline people who are responsible for administering our election process and these are the people who understand that asking voters to present a valid photo ID will help to restore integrity to Wisconsin's electoral process.

While Governor Doyle vetoed similar legislation last year, I believe this is a sensible and reasonable first step to restoring the integrity of our elections and protecting your legally cast vote. Just think about it, if we confirm that just a portion of the ballots in the City of Milwaukee are fraudulent, they would cancel out the votes cast legally by all the people living in Plymouth, or half of the people who voted in Sheboygan or in Manitowoc. As a State Senator, I would challenge the Governor to defend the current process that would allow this to occur.

As an American, I understand and appreciate the value of a vote and I respect the great right that is provided to us as citizens of this country. That is why I ask for your support to get the photo identification bill passed into law and join me as I introduce additional legislation over the next couple of months that seeks to restore and strengthen this key foundation block of our free nation.

Thank you for your service to our state. It is an honor representing the residents of the 9th District in the State Senate!

Seventy Percent of Municipal Clerks Support Photo ID Legislation *Senator Leibham Releases Survey Results During Photo ID Testimony*

Milwaukee, WI... This afternoon, while testifying in front of the Senate Labor and Election Process Reform Committee in Milwaukee, Senator Joe Leibham (R-Sheboygan) released survey results demonstrating that 70 percent of municipal clerks from around the state support a photo ID requirement to vote.

In late February, Senator Leibham conducted a survey of all clerks from municipalities with 5,000 or more people, clerks required by law to maintain poll lists. Specifically, Senator Leibham asked the following question and received the following response from 129 of the clerks surveyed.

Do you support a photo ID requirement to vote?


“Support for a photo ID requirement to vote remains strong across the state,” Senator Leibham said. “These results demonstrate support from the very people who are responsible for conducting elections at the local level across the state. They understand the positive impact showing a photo ID will add to the process, and they understand that restoring integrity to Wisconsin’s elections should be one of our top priorities.”

In addition to support from citizens and clerks from across the state, a number of newspapers have recently endorsed a photo ID requirement to vote. These endorsements include the Appleton Post-Crescent, the Oshkosh Northwestern, the Eau Claire Leader-Telegram, The Janesville Gazette, the Beloit Daily News, the La Crosse Tribune, the Fond du Lac Reporter and the Green Bay Press Gazette.

“As elected officials, we must do everything possible to make it easier to vote and tougher to cheat. This legislation puts reasonable safeguards in place to do that while serving to restore integrity and confidence in Wisconsin’s electoral process,” said Senator Leibham.

The Wisconsin State Assembly recently passed this measure with strong bipartisan support. The Wisconsin State Senate is expected to take this measure up on the floor in mid-April.

Wisconsin Coalition for Advocacy (WCA)

Thank you holding a public hearing on the Voter ID Bill in West Allis. The Wisconsin Coalition for Advocacy has already provided testimony to the Assembly Committee on issues faced by people with disabilities with regard to the election process at previously scheduled public hearings. Today we are submitting the following testimony to your committee.

The Voter ID Bill would impose a burden on individuals with disabilities, even with the provision that would allow individuals who are in nursing homes, community-based residential facilities, or retirement homes to provide a statement signed by special registration deputies to verify the name and address of an individual in lieu of requiring a state issued photo identification card or drivers' license.

Here are some important things to consider regarding the proposed Voter ID Bill:

- There are approximately 600,000 people with disabilities who are voting age in Wisconsin. Currently, individuals with disabilities face many barriers to the polls. Examples include being wrongfully turned away from the polls because an individual with a disability does not "appear" to be eligible to vote, not being able to access the polling site because it is not accessible, and not being able to cast a private and independent ballot. These barriers are reflected in statistics which highlight that individuals with disabilities vote at a rate that is 15 percent below the rate of the general population. A voter ID bill could increase barriers to the polls faced by many individuals with disabilities.
- Federal legislation requires the establishment of a statewide voter registration list by January 1, 2006. This requirement was implemented to address potential voter fraud. To date we have not allowed this system to work. Before we add another potential barrier to the voting process, let's first analyze whether the registration system works.
- The bill eliminates the option for an individual to have their residence corroborated by another elector in the municipality. Many individuals with disabilities rely on this option because they:

- 1) do not currently have a drivers' license or photo identification card,
 - 2) do not receive bills and other documentation required under current election law to verify their residence, and/or
 - 3) may move often or are homeless and do not have the required documentation to verify their residence.
- Transportation is a barrier to many people with disabilities, so making a visit to the nearest Division of Motor Vehicle (DMV) office can be an insurmountable problem, especially if the office is many miles from their residence. This is especially a problem for individuals living in rural areas. This problem is compounded by the fact that many small DMV offices were closed in the last budget.
 - There is a hidden cost to people with disabilities in the form of lost wages and additional transportation expense in order to obtain a photo ID.
 - Many DMV offices are not equipped to meet the access needs of people with disabilities, which could make it difficult or impossible to obtain the necessary photo ID to vote.
 - Those who do not know that the photo identification is necessary, would be forced to vote provisionally, and may find it more difficult to meet the identification requirements by the imposed deadline. For example, in many Wisconsin communities, people who need specialized accessible transportation must request the ride at least 24 hours in advance. Under the provisional ballot laws, an individual is required to produce necessary documentation by 4:00 PM the day after the election. It would be impossible under these circumstances to meet the deadline. Not only would these votes not be counted, but these individuals would likely be discouraged from voting in the future.
 - WCA played a leadership role in the formation of the Milwaukee Mental Health Task Force over the course of the past year. A 2004 survey of Milwaukee's adult homeless population, Under the Radar found that of the 761 homeless adults surveyed in Milwaukee, 50% cited a need for mental health services. These individuals are increasingly disenfranchised and in many cases do not have a driver's license or a State ID. The passage of the Voter ID Bill would result in many individuals who cite a need for mental health services to be further removed from participation in society and their individual right to vote on the policies that effect their life, making their pursuit of recovery and stability even more difficult.

For all of the reasons above, Wisconsin Coalition for Advocacy is against the passage of a Voter ID Bill.

Once again, thank you for coming to West Allis and thank you for the consideration of these important issues.
