Thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony in support of Senate Bill 469 relating to the conveyance of certain submerged lands to Brown County. I would also like to thank Sen. Kedzie for his timely hearing on this legislation.

This legislation is needed to allow the planned "Cat Island Restoration Project" to move forward. In 1988, the Lower Green Bay/Fox River Remedial Action Plan Workgroup recommended restoring the Cat Island Chain, in the lower Bay of Green Bay, to its approximate configuration prior to being washed out in the 1970's.

Wildlife habitat loss on the Bay of Green Bay is a critical factor in the health of the Lower Bay ecosystem. The Cat Island Chain historically protected a large expanse of shallow Bay waters and wetlands that served as fish and wildlife habitat. A restored Cat Island Chain will provide habitat for shorebirds, waterfowl, colonial nesting birds, amphibians and reptiles. Areas of submerged and emergent vegetation will be protected from destructive wave action and important plants will take root.

This legislation is before us today because the State of Wisconsin must approve a Lakebed Grant to Brown County in order for this project to move forward. This project has received input from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, the U.S. Corps of Engineers, the University of Wisconsin Sea Grant Institute, the Department of Natural Resources, and Brown County.

I would also like to specifically thank Mark Patronsky from the Legislative Council for his excellent work in drafting this legislation.

Again, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony to you on this important piece of legislation.

Good morning, My name is Joe Caputo. I am the current Conservation Congress Big Game Study Committee Co Chair. When I took over as Big Game chair two plus years ago I had in mind a direction for the committee that not only based it's decisions on the spring hearing vote but also on the input from all interested stake holders. This process has been taken further by our D.N.R.'s involvement in finding ways to incorporate the needs of the hunting community and still adequately manage our states deer herd. Consensus is hard to find in the deer world because opinions on what should be done to manage our deer vary between each group but this rule package before you dose exactly that. While The D.N.R. serves as the states manager of our deer herd the task ultimately becomes the responsibility of the hunters to keep our deer herd in check. When you task hunters with this job they need two things, a season structure they can work inside of and the access to property to harvest deer from. At this time I see both access and season structure potentially put at risk because of a special interest groups view that hunters should not be in the woods in December. This happened to hunters in 2001 when the deer 2000 package was shot down in the 11th hour by the snowmobile groups. It becomes interesting to me that a package such as this that has passed muster with a state wide vote, scrutiny from our D.N.R. and a vast array of stake holders can potentially be set aside by one group because of the dispute over 4 days in the woods. It is the Congress Big Game Committees position that if this happens to hunters again we will have no other choice but to ask land owners state wide to restrict snowmobile access on there property. If hunters should be restricted than it should also be prudent to restrict all user groups. Many of the trails especially in northern Wisconsin pass through private property and with these restrictions to those lands the snowmobile groups can share in the frustration of not having access to the lands needed to enjoy their sport. I urge the committee to vote in favor of the rule before you. Give this package time to work. Give hunters the opportunity to do there job. Let the season structure demonstrate it will be safe and that it will aid in our states deer management. Thank you.

CR 05-086 POTENTIAL MODIFICATIONS

- 1. Delete the 4-day December hunt and replace with the following:
 - a. **North of Highway 8:** A 4-day season beginning the first Thursday following the Thanksgiving holiday.
 - b. **South of Highway 8:** A 4-day season beginning the second Thursday following the Thanksgiving holiday
- 2. Move the 2 day youth gun hunt from September to the second weekend in October.





Options for Executive Action on Deer Hunt rule – CR 05-086

- 1. **Do nothing.** Allow the 10 day review period to expire on February 15, 2006.
 - This option leaves it to the Assembly NR committee to potentially ask for more modifications and assuming the DNR again won't go along with it, the Assembly would object to the rule. Then, the hunting groups would be upset with the Assembly and not the Senate.
- 2. Waive jurisdiction on February 8, 2006. This would essentially be the same as Option 1, except that it would be moved up sooner. The Assembly would probably still ask for modifications, not get them, and then again the Assembly would object to the rule and catch the heat from the hunting groups.

3. Ask for modifications to the rule. I would advise only asking for the following:

Delete the 4-day December anterless gun hunt and replace with the following:

ii. South of Highway 8: A 4-day anterless gun hunt beginning the second (W/O Zyr.

Thursday following the Thanksgiving holiday

DNR has already agreed to i. North of Highway 8: A 4-day anterless gun hunt beginning the first

- The DNR has already agreed to move up the youth hunt and has rejected the 2 year sunset provision requested by the snowmobilers. They have also rejected the request to end the bow hunt season on a different day, which quite frankly was not that big of a deal. So essentially, we make one final request for the "P" zone.
- More than likely, the DNR will again reject this request and we would then object to the rule. As the Assembly would also be making a similar request, and be rejected, they too would probably object to the rule. Then both committees would suffer the wrath of the hunting groups under this option.
- 4. Object to the rule on February 8, 2006. If this is done, then the Assembly would not be able to ask for any modifications to the rule. Gundy (and Gard) is looking for cover before an outright objection is made, which is the reason why they will ask for the same modifications from the DNR. But if the Senate objects first, they can't make that request, which in a sense gives them the cover they need. But, if the Senate objects without the Assembly concurring on that objection, then the Senate committee will catch all the heat from the hunting groups.

My advice at this point in time is to either do Option 1 or Option 3.

ORDER OF THE STATE OF WISCONSIN NATURAL RESOURCES BOARD REPEALING, RENUMBERING AND AMENDING, AMENDING, REPEALING AND RECREATING AND CREATING RULES

The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board proposes an order to repeal ss. NR 10.01(3)(e)1.b. and 4., (es)2., 10.104(8)(a), (b), and (c), (10)(a) and (b); renumber and amend ss. NR 10.01(3)(e)1.e., 5. and 6., (es)3., 10.104(8)(d) and (e); amend ss. NR 10.001(3t), 10.01(3)(e)1.(intro.), 1.a., (em), (em)3., (es)a., (ev), 10.104 (8) intro., (10)(intro.), (11)(intro.), 10.105(2), 10.40(3)(f) and 45.09(4); to repeal and recreate s. NR 10.01(3)(e)1.c., 2., 3., (em)2., and 10.104(7); and to create ss. NR 10.01(3)(ed), (ef), (em)4., 10.104(8)(a) note, and 10.28(4) relating to deer hunting season and permit issuance regulation changes.

Analysis Prepared by the Department of Natural Resources

Statutory Authority and Explanation: Statutes that authorize the promulgation of this rule order include § 29.014, 29.089(3), and 29.177(3m), Stats. These sections grant rule making authority to the department to establish seasons, regulations and bag limits for hunting that ensure the citizens of the state continued opportunities for quality hunting. Additionally, these statutes provide authority for the department to manage state owned properties and issue special antlerless deer permits. All rules promulgated under this authority are subject to review under ch. 227, Stats.

Statutes Interpreted and Explanation: In promulgating this rule § 29.014, 29.024(6), 29.089(3), 29.173(3), 29.177, 29.181, and 29.559, Stats., have been interpreted as providing the department with the authority to allow the department to establish deer hunting regulations as well as deer license and deer carcass tag issuance regulations.

Related Statute or Rule: There are no rules or statutes currently under promulgation that relate to the provisions that are proposed in the administrative rule order.

Plain Language Rule Analysis: This rule order reflects my attempt to incorporate the following recommendations:

- 1. There will be a 2-day youth either sex gun hunt in September (opening 7 days after the bow season opens). A mentor will be required to accompany a youth (only the youth will be allowed to carry a gun) and the youth hunter will be required to place their regular buck deer carcass tag on an antlered buck (only one buck per youth hunter). Youth hunters would be allowed to harvest as many antlerless deer as they have valid tags for.
- 2. The late archery season will close the Sunday nearest January 6th. This change will ensure that the late bow season will be open during the New Year's holiday every year.
- 3. There will be a statewide 4-day antlerless gun hunt beginning on the 2nd Thursday following the Thanksgiving holiday. The hunt will be open in all units to anyone with a valid antlerless deer permit.
- 4. In herd control units (currently Zone-T and EAB units) antlerless tags will be unrestricted. The first antlerless tag is free with the purchase of a gun and archery license. Additional tags will be available for a minimal handling fee (\$2 unless purchased on-line or over the phone in which case the standard processing fee (\$3) will be applied in addition to the \$2).
- 5. River Block Units would be treated the same as the rest of the state in season dates and tagging options.
- 6. The archery license would come with two tags valid statewide: one valid for one antlered deer only and the other valid for antlerless only. This change will retain the either sex hunt option for archery while simplifying tagging options. There will be only two types of tags: buck and antlerless. There will be no more either sex tags except for two very limited exceptions.
- 7. The Hunter's Choice program would be replaced by the sale of antlerless tags valid in limited quota (regular) units as additional deer. Antlerless permits would be sold first come, first serve for \$12 each (\$20 for non-residents). Tags would be available on August 1st, one per hunter per day.
- 8. There would be no October 4-day antlerless only hunt outside CWD zones in 2006 and 2007. (In the event that the average antlerless:antlered harvest ratio in herd control units statewide is below 1.4 in 2006, the rule may immediately sunset.) In the event that inadequate herd control is realized as a result of this trial, the 4-day October antlerless deer gun hunt would return in 2008. The start date would be the Thursday nearest October 15 and it would occur in DMUs where a regular season of buck plus quota will not bring the population to within 20% of the over-winter goal.

- 9. The Earn-A-Buck season structure would be an available tool (in 2006 and 2007) for recommendation to the Natural Resources Board based on the criteria currently used (EAB pre-qualification will be implemented).
- 10. A first come-first served system to sell bonus tags as the deer hunting access permission on state parks open to hunting.
- 11. None of these proposed changes apply to the CWD Zones or season structures.

Detailed Section Analysis:

- Section 1. Clarifies that the \$12 and \$20 bonus deer hunting permits identified in statute only pertain to the permits which are purchased. This allow us to give away permits in "herd control units" and are not bound by various statutory requirements associated with "bonus deer hunting permits".
- Section 2. Eliminates references to "Zones A M" as we no longer utilize these zones in our deer herd management or season structure. It will also help to relieve confusion now that we are referring to "deer management regions" later on in this rule.
- Section 3. Creates a 4-day December shotgun only antlerless deer hunt.
- Section 4. Eliminates the Mississippi River Block and special regulations for DMU 82.
- Section 5. Creates a 4-day December firearm antlerless deer hunt.
- Section 6. Creates the 4-day October antlerless deer hunt in those units that do not meet the performance measures (antlerless/antlered harvest ratio and population) established in Section 8.
- Section 7. Creates our "herd control" permit issuance procedures and criteria and sunsets our current Zone T and EAB authority. This section also includes an alternative EAB season authority in units that meet specific criteria.
- Section 8. Establish our performance measures for the 2006 and 2007 deer seasons. It is this section that would trigger the October hunt that we create in Section 6.
- Section 9. Recreates the State Park gun deer hunt subd. It clarifies and consolidates some seasons and by including a new introductory clause, along with Section 15 (archery State Park Seasons), eliminates the need for s. NR 10.27. Which reduces the number of cross-references for State Park Deer hunting seasons. Additionally, this section clarifies that a permit is required to enter state parks, but that permit is no longer a Hunter's Choice permit.
- Section 10. Creates a Federal Property deer gun season section.
- Section 11. Renames "Zone E" and "Zone M" and eliminates references to Hunter's Choice and adds 4-day statewide December antlerless deer hunt to the Metro gun deer season.
- Section 12. Extends the Archery season through the Sunday nearest January 6th, and eliminates references to Hunter's Choice.
- Section 13. Similar to Section 10, this section creates a Federal Property deer bow season section.
- Section 14. Removes the reference to Hunter's Choice in the Metro bow seasons subdivision.
- Section 15. Creates a State Park archery deer season section and along with Section 9., eliminates the need for s. NR 10.27. Now all of the state park deer seasons (gun, muzzleloader and bow) are in the season tables. Additionally, this section clarifies that a permit is required to enter state parks, but that permit is no longer a Hunter's Choice permit.
- Section 16. Eliminates the reference to Hunter's Choice in the Muzzleloader deer season section.
- Section 17. Eliminates the MRB muzzleloader season.
- Section 18. Amends the Loew Lake muzzleloader season subd. No hunter's choice and a permit is required.
- Section 19. Creates a two-day either-sex youth deer hunt in September.
- Section 20. Creates a description of the gun deer and archery deer carcass tags.
- Section 21. Repeals all references and code language associated with issuing Hunter's Choice and Bonus permits through a drawing.

Sections 22, 23, 24 and 25. Creates new antlerless permit issuance guidelines. It allows us to issue all antlerless permits first-come, first-serve over the counter.

Section 26. Clarifies the bag limit and license requirements for use of antlerless deer permits.

Section 27. Updates EAB transportation guidelines to include the EAB season proposed under the herd control season structure established earlier in the rule.

Section 28. Repeals the state park deer hunting section.

Section 29. Establishes deer management regions as referenced in our performance measures established in Section 8.

Section 30. Eliminates a reference to Hunter's Choice permits under the disabled hunt section.

Section 31. Updates the cross-reference to NR 10 where state park deer seasons are established.

Federal Regulatory Analysis: Provided state rules and statutes do not relieve individuals from the restrictions, requirements and conditions of Federal statutes and regulations, regulation of hunting and trapping of native species has been delegated to state fish and wildlife agencies. None of the proposed rules exceed the authorities granted the states in 50 CFR 10.

State Regulatory Analysis: Minnesota has deer seasons that run from early to mid-November, with a muzzleloader season that runs from the end of November to mid-December. There is a two-day youth deer hunt in northwest Minnesota. Gun and archery licenses are purchased separately. Minnesota only issues one tag with each license, with additional tags available for purchase. There is a lottery for these tags in "lottery deer permit areas".

Michigan has a firearm season that runs from mid-November to the end of November, an archery season that runs from October to January, and a nine-day muzzleloader season in December. There is also a two-day youth hunt in September. Like Wisconsin, hunters purchase either a firearm or archery deer license. A regular license allows the harvest of a buck and an antlerless license allows the harvest of an antlerless deer. An antlerless license may be applied for (for a fee) and a drawing is held to determine successful applicants who then may purchase an Antlerless License.

Illinois has multiple short gun seasons that falls between late November to mid-January. The archery season runs from the beginning of October to mid-January. There is also a two-day Youth Firearm Deer Season in October. Hunters must purchase separate gun and archery authorizations, similar to Wisconsin. All carcass tags must be purchased; additional tags may be acquired through a lottery.

Iowa has a split gun season in December, muzzleloader season from mid-December to mid-January, and a bow season that runs from October to December. There is a youth hunt open to Iowa residents only, which runs from mid-September to October. Iowa's deer license is not weapon specific. There is only one tag issued per license but additional tags may be purchased with the first antlerless tag costing \$26 and subsequent tags costing \$11 each. These tags are first come, first served until quotas are filled.

Overall, Wisconsin's deer hunting license and season structure is similar to those of neighboring states. One exception is that Wisconsin issues more than one harvest authorization with a deer license. Also, if the current proposal is approved, Wisconsin will be the only state to issue hunting authorizations to all hunters free of charge.

Summary of Factual Data and Analytical Methodologies: DNR support for not having an October hunt in this proposal is dependent upon a thorough evaluation of the antlerless harvest changes that occur. For two years (2006 and 2007), the department would carefully monitor the kill and the effects to the population in both regular and herd control units. After each season staff will evaluate the harvest and resulting population changes in relation to the population goals, and report to the Natural Resources Board. Deer population changes statewide and at regional and unit specific levels will be monitored to determine whether to extend the 2-year test for a longer period of time. Public opinion toward these changes will also be monitored. During the test, the department will continue to consider and recommend EAB based on current criteria.

If either of the criteria below are not fully met, the department will ask NRB to allow the rule to expire.

Criteria 1: The average antlerless:antlered harvest ratio in herd control units must meet or exceed 2.0 in all deer management regions.

Criteria 2: All sections of the proposed season structure must be implemented.

Due to concerns that rapid herd growth can occur in many DMUs if minimal antlerless deer harvest is not met, a one-year sunset criteria is included. If the average antlerless:antlered harvest ratio in herd control units statewide is below 1.4 antlerless deer per antlered buck in 2006, the Department may ask the Natural Resources Board to immediately sunset the rule.

The ramifications of this change to deer populations have the potential to be significant. If antlerless deer harvest in herd control units fails to meet that of previous October hunts, the department expects the need to recommend widespread use of EAB season structure at the end of the trial.

This structure is a test of the effectiveness of free herd control tags and a statewide December gun hunt in fully replacing the antlerless deer harvest realized during the October Zone T hunts. The rule will sunset to a 4-day October antlerless gun hunt starting the Thursday nearest October 15 in units identified based on the criteria currently in Administrative Code (NR 10.01 (3)(ez)2.) immediately at the end of this test (the term of the test ends with the end of the 2007 deer season) unless there is evidence that unequivocally demonstrates that the new season structure is at least as effective for population control as the current Zone T structure.

EAB pre-authorization will be implemented with a system of electronic tracking of registration stubs by using a contractor to key in information from stubs that will be mailed to them from registration stations. Under this protocol, a hunter would be issued a buck authorization only if and when the unit they harvested an antlerless deer in becomes an EAB unit in the year immediately following the harvest of an antlerless deer. With the electronic database of registrations, buck stickers can be mailed to hunters when EAB is approved. "Pre-authorization" has been a frequent request of hunters and hunting groups in response to EAB implementation. Further, without an October hunt (at least for 2006 and 2007), pre-authorization will facilitate implementation of the necessary EAB seasons.

Anticipated Private Sector Costs: Implementation of this rule is on a Deer Management Unit basis and based on the deer population in that unit, the fiscal effects on individual hunters vary. In Herd Control Units, antlerless permits will be available for a nominal processing fee (\$2, with an additional \$3 service charge for phone and Internet purchases). This will be cost savings for hunters, as in previous years, these permits were sold at the cost of \$12 for residents and \$20 for non-residents. In addition archers statewide will be receiving an additional antlerless tag. Therefore, bowhunters will not need to purchase an antlerless permit if they wish to harvest an antlerless deer in addition to a buck in any unit. However, in addition to these cost savings for hunters, there will be an added cost for those hunters in Regular Units. In these units, where the number of antlerless permits are limited, Hunter's Choice will no longer be used. As a result, a hunter can no longer apply to harvest a buck or an antlerless deer for \$3. Rather if the hunter wants the ability to shoot a deer of either sex, they will need to buy an antlerless permit (\$12 resident, \$20 non-resident). This will be an added cost for those hunters in Regular Units.

Effects on Small Businesses: These rules are applicable to individual sportspersons and impose no compliance or reporting requirements for small businesses, nor are any design or operational standards contained in the rule.



Analysis of the Rule - Rule Effect - Reason for the Rule

The proposed rules revise the regulations for the deer hunting seasons in 2006. None of these proposed changes apply to the CWD Zones or season structures. The revisions include:

1. There will be a 2-day youth either sex gun hunt in September (opening 7 days after the bow season opens). A mentor will be required to accompany a youth (only the youth will be allowed to carry a gun) and the youth hunter will be required to place their regular buck deer carcass tag on an antlered buck (only one buck per youth hunter). Youth hunters would be allowed to harvest as many antierless deer as they have valid tags for.

2. The late archery season will close the Sunday nearest January 6. This change will ensure that

the late bow season will be open during the New Year's holiday every year.

3. There will be a statewide 4-day antierless gun hunt beginning on the 2nd Thursday following the Thanksgiving holiday. The hunt will be open in all units to anyone with a valid antierless deer permit.

4. In herd control units (currently Zone T and EAB units) antierless tags will be unrestricted. The first antierless tag is free with the purchase of a gun or archery license. Additional tags will be available for a minimal handling fee (\$2 unless purchased on-line or over the phone in which case the standard processing fee (\$3) will be applied in addition to the \$2).

5. The archery license would come with two tags valid statewide: one valid for one antlered deer only and the other valid for antierless only. This change will retain the either sex hunt option for archery while simplifying tagging options. There will be only two types of tags: buck and antlerless. There will be

no more either sex tags - except for two very limited exceptions.

6. The Hunter's Choice program would be replaced by the sale of antlerless tags valid in limited quota (regular) units as additional deer. Antlerless permits would be sold first-come, first-serve for \$12 each (\$20 for nonresidents). Tags would be available on August 1 for purchase at a rate of one per hunter per

7. There would be no October 4-day antierless only hunt outside CWD zones in 2006 and 2007. (In the event that the average antierless:antiered harvest ratio in herd control units statewide is below 1.4 in 2006, the rule may immediately sunset.) In the event that inadequate herd control is realized as a result of this trial, the 4-day October antierless deer gun hunt would return in 2008. The start date would be the Thursday nearest October 15 and it would occur in DMUs where a regular season of buck plus quota will not bring the population to within 20% of the over-winter goal.

8. The Earn-A-Buck season structure would be an available tool (in 2006 and 2007) for recommendation to the Natural Resources Board based on the criteria currently used (EAB pre-qualification
