Doyle-aide appointee loves political process

608-252-6149 Steve Bablitch was making courtesy calls at the State Capitol recently when he dropped in on Rep. Dean Kaufert, R- Neenah, co-chairman of the Legislature's budget committee.

"I can't figure it out," Kaufert told Bablitch. "Why do you want to get into this political zoo we live in sometimes?"

Bablitch, 51, a former Dane County prosecutor who most recently led a Fortune 1000 company, was tabbed Sept. 12 by Democratic Gov. Jim Doyle to be secretary of the Department of Administration.

He starts Monday, although the full Senate must confirm him. He will earn \$131,767 annually, the same as his predecessor, Marc Marotta.

The deceptively bland title masks a powerful position. Bablitch will be one of Doyle's chief aides, cutting deals with legislators, advising Doyle on issues and helping craft and implement the state budget.

"We've had DOA secretaries who some people have thought have actually been the governor," said Dennis Dresang, a UW-Madison political science professor.

Bablitch said he's getting a lot of the "Why take this job?" question. His answer: "I love government, I love public policy, I want to make a difference and I've known and admired (Doyle) for 28 years."

Doyle hired Bablitch as a college-aged law clerk when Doyle was Dane County district attorney. Bablitch went on to become a deputy district attorney, prosecuting one of the county's most notorious crimes.

Contract killing Carolyn Hudson, 37, was in her Madison home Oct. 14, 1983, when an armed man gunned her down. Her 14-year- old daughter, Jacqueline Wheeler, witnessed the killing and chased the man to his car, memorizing his license plate.

The man, Joseph Hecht, pleaded guilty to first-degree murder, saying he was paid \$9,300 to kill Hudson. He refused to say who hired him. A lengthy investigation and prosecution led to the convictions of Hudson's ex-husband, Richard Wheeler, and a middleman, James Stomner, for arranging the killing.

"It was a super tough case, because it was all circumstantial evidence," said Jacqueline Wheeler, now 36 and a corporate attorney in the Milwaukee area. She credits lead prosecutor Bablitch with drawing the essential connections for jurors to convict Stomner and her father.

Wheeler said she was so impressed with Bablitch's courtroom performance and ethics that she became an attorney herself. She calls Bablitch her hero and mentor and said he helped her get her current job as an attorney with WellPoint Inc., which owns a number of BlueCross & BlueShield insurance franchises.

She thinks Bablitch has remained in her life not only because he's a decent guy but also because her mother's contract killing by her father shook him hard. "Perhaps it was just such a betrayal that he couldn't come to terms with it and had to do as much as he could to try and fix it."

Bablitch calls the case "beyond traumatic" and said it created an enduring bond between himself and Wheeler. "When I've had the ability to help her later in life, I figured that's what her mom would have wanted me to do."

Bablitch left the district attorney's office in 1985 for private practice in Madison.

"He accomplished enough as a trial lawyer in a few years to last perhaps a lifetime," said Hal Harlowe, who was district attorney at the time and calls Bablitch "intellectually gifted" and "a brilliant strategist."

Working for Thompson In 1986, Republican Gov. Tommy Thompson tapped Bablitch, a Democrat, to lead the state's prison system, a position Bablitch held until 1991.

Bablitch's older brother, Bill, a former Senate Democratic majority leader, knew Thompson from the years they served together in the state Legislature. Thompson and the Bablitch brothers socialized together, along with people such as Jim Klauser, Thompson's DOA secretary, and Tim Cullen, a former Democratic state senator who Thompson chose to head the Department of Health and Social Services.

"People worked together back then," Steve Bablitch said. "They had disputes, but it wasn't rancorous. That's a good model and one I'd like to follow."

Bablitch spent 1996-2002 in the corporate world, first as a lobbyist and attorney for BlueCross & BlueShield United of Wisconsin and later as board chairman and chief executive officer of Cobalt Corporation, an insurance holding company and No. 802 on Fortune Magazine's list of the largest U.S. companies.

It was during Bablitch's tenure as general counsel for BlueCross & BlueShield that the company went from being a nonprofit organization to a for- profit, publicly traded one. As a payment back to taxpayers for the years it was tax-exempt, the company created a foundation that divided nearly \$800 million between two state medical schools.

"(Bablitch) gets a lot of credit for that," said Cullen, a senior vice president with WellPoint Inc. "He quarterbacked the transaction, working with the medical schools, the insurance commissioner and the board of directors."

A tough job Bablitch hails from a family of public servants - his father was a longtime member of the Portage County Board of Supervisors - although he has never run for public office. Bill Bablitch said his brother isn't very partisan.

"Being as well-liked as he is on both sides of the aisle, I hope he can curb some of that excessive partisanship that goes on down there," said the older Bablitch, who retired in 2003 after 20 years on the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

Kaufert, the Republican assemblyman, said he has a lot of respect for Steve Bablitch but warns that the year ahead could get ugly as Doyle runs for reelection.

"(Bablitch) has a big job ahead of him in trying to keep (the partisanship) to a level that doesn't blow up the place," Kaufert said. "His challenge will be to get a governor - one who at times can be vindictive and very, very difficult - to work with the Legislature and get some things done. He can't be a partisan flak."

Sen. Neal Kedzie, R-Elkhorn, assistant Senate majority leader, said Bablitch's appointment will be closely scrutinized. "This is an extremely high-profile appointment. It's basically the right hand of the governor. I'm hopeful that the governor has forwarded us a qualified candidate."

Bablitch targets health care

New chief reaches across agency walls

Newly appointed Administration Secretary Steve Bablitch says he wants his agency to take the lead in making sure all Wisconsin citizens have health care coverage.

"I know a lot about health and health care coverage, and I know the landscape in this state. I also know that even though Wisconsin has one of the best insurance coverage rates in the country, there are still unmet needs out there," Bablitch said in an interview.

Bablitch, who took the reins of the state's most powerful agency last week, said he sees the Department of Administration as "a talent pool of problem-solvers. I want to bring them together and look at some health care issues."

He said he does not envision a turf battle with the Department of Health and Family Services, which administers the \$4 billion-a-year Medicaid program for the poor, elderly and disabled.

But he said that health care - from health insurance for state employees to health care coverage for the uninsured - is a major state issue that needs a fresh review.

Bablitch, who served as secretary of the Department of Corrections under Gov. Tommy Thompson, most recently

headed Cobalt Corp., the publicly traded successor to Blue Cross Wisconsin. Bablitch left Cobalt when the firm was bought out in 2003.

"When I was at Blue Cross, we went around the state ... and listened to what the public had to say" about health issues, he said.

"This is about improving public health. For example, are we doing a good job of doing childhood immunizations in this state, a good job of taking care of kids' teeth? These are not grandiose ideas."

Typically, the issue of medical care for Wisconsin citizens has been the province of the Department of Health and Family Services, which in addition to administering the Medicaid budget also oversees the Division of Public Health and a host of other health programs.

The Department of Administration, in turn, generally oversees the operations of state government, including the development of the state budget.

But with the Medicaid program one of the top five most expensive state programs and consuming an ever-growing share of the budget, "I don't think you can say it's just the job of one state agency.

"I'm not into drawing lines. I'm into finding solutions," he added. "This is not a credit thing. We have tremendous resources. We've just got to bring them to bear and try to devise solutions."

Bablitch's background: In a wide-ranging interview, Bablitch talked about his own varied background as a former Dane County prosecutor, private practice lawyer and health care executive, as well as his approach to the new job.



Bablitch has known Gov. Jim Doyle since 1978, when Doyle, then Dane County district attorney, hired Bablitch as a law school intern in the DA's office. Doyle hired him full-time as an assistant district attorney the following year after Bablitch graduated.

Bablitch stayed in the DA's office, moving up to become deputy district attorney and head of the sensitive crimes unit, until 1985.

He tried one of the highest-profile cases of the 1980s, the murder-for-hire killing of a Madison police officer's wife on the city's east side, just before he left the office.

Bablitch then went into private practice, joining the law firm of DeWitt Schumacher, now known as DeWitt Ross & Stevens, where he came to know Jim Klauser, a longtime Republican activist.

When Tommy Thompson was elected governor in 1986, Klauser became Thompson's

secretary of administration, and Thompson and Klauser tapped Bablitch to head the state Department of Corrections.

Bablitch's political ties extend to both sides of the aisle. His older brother, Bill, was the Democratic majority leader of the state Senate and later a state Supreme Court justice. And Bablitch counts among his longtime friends Tim Cullen, who served as both the Democratic Senate majority leader and then secretary of Health and Family Services under Thompson.

Cullen preceded Bablitch in joining Blue Cross, where Bablitch became vice president and general counsel and helped shift the firm from being a nonprofit to a publicly traded company.

Upon the retirement of Tom Hefty in 2002, Bablitch was promoted to CEO of Cobalt Corp., where he remained until 2003.

"I left the company because there wasn't a lot for me to do at that point," Bablitch said.

After leaving Cobalt, Bablitch began exploring several options, including a volunteer teaching job at the UW's Remington Center that provides legal assistance to low-income clients.

"The most often asked question I get is, 'Why are you doing this?'" he said. "I don't have to do this job. I want to do this job. That's a big dividing line. You have all the levers of government in this agency, and if you want to make a difference, this is a good place to do it."

Bablitch said there was one other factor in his decision to take the administration post: a chance to work with Doyle again.

"I wouldn't go to work for just anybody who's governor. I've known this governor since 1978. I admire and I respect him, and I share his values. So I feel very comfortable working for him," he said.

Bablitch added that he shares Doyle's vision of a state government that runs more efficiently and is accountable to taxpayers.

In the nearly 20 years he's been gone from state government, though, Bablitch said he has noted a growing partisanship in politics - a trend he hopes to moderate.

Bablitch reaches back to his days as a prosecutor when he and defense lawyers would fight tooth-and-nail in the courtroom and then go out for a drink after work.

"That's a good model. We were advocates and adversaries, but when we left the courtroom, we were human beings who treated each other with dignity and respect."

He describes himself as "not excessively partisan" and believes his job "is to get things done."

He said he knows both Republican leaders in the Legislature, Assembly Speaker John Gard and Senate Majority Leader Dale Schultz.

"I've gotten along with them in the past, and I expect to get along with them in the future.

And the way I do that is to treat them with courtesy and respect.

"There will be differences. But for everybody to say we don't like how life under the dome has become - it's too partisan, there's too much bitterness - it's not like 'they' are doing this to anybody. It's an environment we create for ourselves. If we want to, we have the ability to change the environment."

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
