Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau EDUCATION

This bill repeals and recreates the appropriation schedule in chapter 20 of the statutes as it relates to s. 20.255(2), stats., thereby setting the appropriation levels for school aids for the 2007–09 fiscal biennium.

The bill also makes the following changes in the laws relating to primary and secondary education:

1. Current law limits the amount that each school district can increase per pupil revenue over the per pupil revenue of the prior school year. The limit does not apply to school districts in which the amount of per pupil revenue is less than a statutory revenue ceiling, currently set at \$8,400. This bill increases the per pupil revenue ceiling to \$8,700 for the 2007–08 school year and to \$9,000 for any subsequent school year.

- 2. This bill increases the annual reimbursement rate for school districts that transport pupils more than 12 miles to school from \$180 per pupil so transported to \$220 per pupil so transported.

If funds in any fiscal year are insufficient to pay all claims, the funds are prorated among eligible school districts.



At your request I added the phrase "state finances... for the 2007–09 fiscal biennium" to the bill's relating clause. A phrase similar to this is typically used in the relating clause of the executive budget bill. Note that use of the phrase in this bill may not serve to avoid the requirement of s. 16.47 (2), stats., which precludes the passage in either house of certain fiscal bills before enactment of the budget bill. When s. 16.47, stats., is read in its entirety, I think it becomes clear that the "budget bill" referred to in s. 16.47 (2), stats., is the "executive budget bill" referred to in s. 16.47 (1), stats. Moreover, if one could avoid the requirement in s. 16.47 (2), stats., by simply adding the phrase "state finances..." to the relating clause of an appropriation bill, the requirement would be meaningless. Presumably, that was not the legislature's intent.
