4 and (i) of the statutes and SECTION 210 (1) to (4) of this act take effect on the initiation
5 date specified in SECTION 209 (1) or on the day after publication of the 2007 biennial
6 budget act, whichever is earlier.

7 **SECTION 9101. Nonstatutory provisions; Administration.**

8 (2) EMPLOYEE TRANSFERS TO PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION. On the effective date
9 of this subsection, all incumbent employees holding positions having responsibility
10 for administering energy conservation and efficiency and renewable resource
11 programs under section 16.957 of the statutes, as determined by the secretary of
12 administration, are transferred to the public service commission. The employees
13 transferred under this subsection have all the rights and the same status under
14 subchapter V of chapter 111 and chapter 230 of the statutes in the public service
15 commission that they enjoyed in the department of administration immediately
16 before the transfer. Notwithstanding section 230.28 (4) of the statutes, no employee
17 so transferred who has attained permanent status in class is required to serve a
18 probationary period.

19 (3) TREATMENT ALTERNATIVES AND DIVERSION GRANT. By August 15, 2007, the
20 county that has the highest violent crime rate, as reported by the office of justice
21 assistance, shall submit an application to the office of justice assistance for a grant
22 under section 16.964 (12) (b) of the statutes. Upon approval of the county's grant
23 application, the office of justice assistance shall from the appropriation under section

The plan shall include all of the following components:

1. Identification of a target group of offenders from among persons who are convicted of a Class F, G, H, or I felony or a misdemeanor whom the county shall assess.

2. Assessment of persons in the target group to determine the risk that they will commit further crimes, their needs that are directly related to criminal behavior, the likelihood that they will respond positively to community-based treatment for the assessed needs, as well as an assessment of the availability of community-based treatment programs to serve the offenders.

3. Collection and dissemination of information relating to the accuracy of assessments performed, the value and usefulness of information contained in the assessment reports for purposes of making sentencing decisions, the effectiveness of community-based treatment programs in addressing the assessed needs of offenders, and the effect of the treatment programs with respect to recidivism.

4. Annual evaluation of the plan.

(b) Upon approval of a county plan submitted under paragraph (a), the office of justice assistance shall from the appropriation under section 20.505 (6) (b) of the statutes, as affected by this act, award the county \$500,000 for the calendar year beginning January 1, 2009, to perform presentencing assessments of offenders. At least 50 percent of the assessments performed by a county with funding provided

1 under this subsection shall be of persons subject to sentencing in connection with a
2 felony.

3 (5) YOUTH DIVERSION GRANT REDUCTIONS.

4 (a) Notwithstanding the amount specified under section 16.964 (8) (a) of the
5 statutes, as affected by this act, the office of justice assistance in the department of
6 administration shall reduce the amount of money allocated under section 16.964 (8)
7 (a) of the statutes, as affected by this act, by \$10,000 in each of fiscal years 2007-08
8 and 2008-09.

9 (b) Notwithstanding the amounts specified under section 16.964 (8) (c) of the
10 statutes, as affected by this act, the office of justice assistance in the department of
11 administration shall reduce the amount of money allocated for each of the 4 contracts
12 that are funded with moneys from the appropriation accounts under section 20.505
13 (6) (d) of the statutes, as affected by this act, by \$3,000 in each of fiscal years 2007-08
14 and 2008-09 and shall reduce the amount of money allocated for the contract that
15 is funded only with moneys from the appropriation account under section 20.505 (6)
16 (kj) of the statutes, as affected by this act, by \$3,100 in each of fiscal years 2007-08
17 and 2008-09.

18 (6f) MOBILE DATA COMPUTERS FOR CITY OF FORT ATKINSON. From the appropriation
19 account under section 20.505 (6) (p) of the statutes, the office of justice assistance in
20 the department of administration shall provide to the city of Fort Atkinson a grant
21 of \$61,400 in fiscal year 2007-08 to purchase mobile data computers for law
22 enforcement vehicles.

23 ✓ (6L) FEDERAL BYRNE JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT FUNDING FOR
24 MULTIJURISDICTIONAL ENFORCEMENT GROUPS. For the 2007-08 and 2008-09 fiscal
25 years, the department of administration shall allocate to multijurisdictional

1 enforcement groups 44 percent of the federal Byrne Justice Assistance Grant awards
2 appropriated under section 20.505 (6) (p) of the statutes.

3 (6Lj) FEDERAL BYRNE JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT FUNDING FOR WISCONSIN CASA
4 ASSOCIATION. In each of fiscal years 2007-08 and 2008-09, the office of justice
5 assistance in the department of administration shall distribute \$150,000 of the

9 (5) of the statutes.

11 appropriation account under section 20.505 (6) (mb) of the statutes, the office of
12 justice assistance in the department of administration shall provide a grant of
13 \$10,000 in fiscal year 2007-08 to purchase an emergency generator for the town of
14 Sumner in Jefferson County.

15 (7h) GRANT FOR JUVENILE CRIME PREVENTION. Beginning on January 1, 2008,
16 from the appropriation account under section 20.505 (6) (p) of the statutes, the office
17 of justice assistance in the department of administration shall provide a 3-year
18 grant, totaling \$112,500 to the Cops-N-Kids Reading Program in the city of Racine. ✓

19 (7k) INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE TO ELECTIONS BOARD AND
20 GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY BOARD. The department of administration shall:

21 (a) Assist the elections board, prior to its termination, or the government
22 accountability board, thereafter, in the selection of a vendor to complete the board's
23 database conversion project.

24 (b) Designate a staff person to provide to the elections board, prior to its
25 termination, or the government accountability board, thereafter, quality assurance

1 for information technology development work completed in connection with
2 conversion of the board's campaign finance database.

3 (7t) YOUTH COURT COORDINATOR. From the appropriation account under section
4 20.505 (6) (p) of the statutes, the office of justice assistance in the department of
5 administration shall distribute \$58,000 in each of fiscal years 2007-08 and 2008-09
6 to an entity in Dane County for the employment of a full-time youth court
7 coordinator to expand the number of youth courts in that county.

8 (8i) WRITTEN POLICIES FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS. No
9 later than January 1, 2008, the department of administration shall submit for review
10 by the joint legislative audit committee and for approval by the joint committee on
11 information policy and technology a preliminary draft of the policies required under
12 section 16.971 (2) (Lg) 1. of the statutes, as created by this act.

13 (8j) RULES PERTAINING TO LARGE, HIGH-RISK INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PROJECTS.
14 The department of administration shall submit in proper form the rules required
15 under section 16.973 (10) of the statutes, as created by this act, to the legislative
16 council staff under section 227.15 (1) of the statutes no later than June 30, 2008.

3 protection may promulgate a rule necessary to authorize grants for programs to
4 collect unwanted prescription drugs under section 93.57 of the statutes, as affected
5 by this act, for the period before the effective date of the permanent rule necessary

9 created by this act, for the construction of soybean crushing facilities with the
10 capacity to process more than 20,000,000 bushels of soybeans per year. ✓

25 2008, the department of corrections shall submit to the legislative audit bureau a

1 response to the 2007 legislative audit bureau report regarding the effects of adult
2 criminal jurisdiction on 17-year-olds. The legislative audit bureau shall file a copy
3 of the response under this subsection with the distributees specified in section 13.94
4 (1) (b) of the statutes.

5 (2) FUNDING FOR CERTAIN COMMUNITY REINTEGRATION SERVICES. From the

15 for nonviolent offenders on the department's institutional and community
16 corrections population, and on the department's costs of operation.

17 (3j) REPORT ON OVERCROWDING IN THE PRAIRIE DU CHIEN CORRECTIONAL
18 INSTITUTION. The department of corrections shall evaluate the current capacity and
19 usage of the segregation unit at the Prairie du Chien Correctional Institution and
20 shall, by July 1, 2008, submit a report to the joint committee on finance that includes
21 its findings and addresses the issue of overcrowding in the segregation unit.

23 **SECTION 9111. Nonstatutory provisions; District Attorneys.**

24 (1L) PROSECUTION OF DRUG CRIMES; MILWAUKEE COUNTY. From the appropriation
25 account under section 20.505 (6) (p) of the statutes, the department of

1 administration, and from the appropriation account under section 20.455 (2) (kp) of
2 the statutes, the department of justice, shall expend \$143,000 in fiscal year 2007-08
3 and \$157,600 in fiscal year 2008-09 to provide the multijurisdictional enforcement
4 group serving Milwaukee County with funding for 2.0 assistant district attorney
5 positions to prosecute criminal violations of chapter 961 of the statutes. The
6 department of administration shall determine the amounts to be expended from each
7 appropriation account for each fiscal year.

8 (2L) PROSECUTION OF DRUG CRIMES; DANE COUNTY. From the appropriation
9 account under section 20.505 (6) (p) of the statutes, the department of
10 administration, and from the appropriation account under section 20.455 (2) (kp) of
11 the statutes, the department of justice, shall expend \$60,000 in fiscal year 2007-08
12 and \$65,900 in fiscal year 2008-09 to provide the multijurisdictional enforcement
13 group serving Dane County with funding for 0.75 assistant district attorney position
14 to prosecute criminal violations of chapter 961 of the statutes. The department of
15 administration shall determine the amounts to be expended from each appropriation
16 account for each fiscal year.

17 (3L) PROSECUTION OF DRUG CRIMES; ST. CROIX COUNTY. From the appropriation
18 account under section 20.455 (2) (kp) of the statutes the department of justice shall
19 expend \$84,500 in fiscal year 2007-08 and \$94,600 in fiscal year 2008-09 to provide
20 the multijurisdictional enforcement group serving St. Croix County with funding for
21 1.0 assistant district attorney position to prosecute criminal violations of chapter 961
22 of the statutes.

1 (1c) REENGINEERING INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SYSTEMS.

2 (a) The department of employee trust funds shall provide to the joint committee
3 on finance copies of all materials submitted to the department of administration that
4 relate to the release of moneys from unallotted reserve, during the 2007-09 fiscal
5 biennium, for reengineering information technology systems of the department of
6 employee trust funds.

7 (b) The joint committee on finance may supplement, from the appropriation
8 under section 20.865 (4) (u) of the statutes, the appropriation under section 20.515
9 (1) (t) of the statutes for the purpose of implementing a redesigned lump-sum
10 payment system if all of the following occur:

11 1. The department of employee trust funds submits a report to the joint
12 committee on finance on its plan to implement the redesigned lump-sum payment
13 system. The report shall specify how the plan conforms to information technology
14 projects planning and monitoring standards developed by the department of
15 administration and submitted to the joint legislative audit committee in response to
16 legislative audit bureau report 07-5, entitled "Information Technology Projects."

17 2. The department of employee trust funds submits a request to the joint
18 committee on finance to supplement the appropriation under section 20.515 (1) (t)
19 of the statutes for implementation of a redesigned lump-sum payment system.

20 3. The cochairpersons of the joint committee on finance do not notify the
21 department of employee trust funds that the committee has scheduled a meeting for
22 the purpose of reviewing the request within 14 working days after the date of the
23 receipt of the request. If, within 14 working days after the date of the receipt of the
24 request, however, the cochairpersons of the committee notify the department of
25 employee trust funds that the committee has scheduled a meeting for the purpose

1 of reviewing the proposed supplement, the supplement may occur only upon
2 approval of the committee.

3 (c) During the 2007-09 fiscal biennium, the department of employee trust
4 funds shall submit a report to the joint committee on finance on its plan for
5 implementing an integrated health insurance enrollment, eligibility, and processing
6 system. The report shall specify all of the following:

7 1. The costs for each fiscal year in which implementation work is to be
8 performed, including specifically potential costs for the 2009-11 fiscal biennium.

9 2. How the implementation plan conforms to information technology projects
10 planning and monitoring standards developed by the department of administration
11 and submitted to the joint legislative audit committee in response to legislative audit
12 bureau report 07-5, entitled "Information Technology Projects."

13 3. How the internal resources of the department of employee trust funds will
14 be used in the implementation work of the integrated health insurance enrollment,
15 eligibility, and processing system and in the implementation work associated with
16 the lump-sum payment system to ensure timely and successful completion of both
17 projects.

18 (2w) PAYMENT OF HEALTH INSURANCE PREMIUMS FOR EMPLOYEES OF THE HEALTH
19 INSURANCE RISK-SHARING PLAN AUTHORITY. Notwithstanding section 40.05 (4) (a) 2.
20 of the statutes, as affected by this act, for an insured employee, as defined in section
21 40.02 (39) of the statutes, who is employed by the Health Insurance Risk-Sharing
22 Plan Authority on the effective date of this subsection, the employer shall pay
23 required employer contributions toward the health insurance premium beginning on
24 the date on which the employee becomes insured.
