Governor Doyle has asked me to respond to your recent letter regarding testing standards for individuals with military licenses applying for a Wisconsin Commercial Driver License (CDL).

The department has a fundamental goal of providing for the public safety of all citizens on Wisconsin highways. As noted in the letter from Mr. Hoffa, many states take different approaches to that mission.

Wisconsin law allows the department to waive CDL related knowledge tests (except for hazardous materials and school buses) and road tests for individuals surrendering a CDL license from another state. In addition, our current law allows the department to waive CDL related knowledge and road tests for individuals presenting a military license, but only if the military license was issued within the territorial boundaries of Wisconsin. The military waiver process was the result of a cooperative effort between the department and military officials who confirmed that Wisconsin military commercial motor vehicle testing standards were equal to or greater than those required under the federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and Wisconsin law.

The section in the federal regulations Mr. Hoffa refers to in his letter (part 383.77) was used by Wisconsin during the initial implementation of the commercial motor vehicle safety act of 1986. This allowance to "grandfather" commercial motor vehicle operators from the required road test was based on their driving record and previous experience operating a commercial motor vehicle.

Our ability to grandfather experienced and safe commercial motor operators expired on April 1, 1992. Waivers for military commercial motor vehicle operation would require a legislative change.

As a Trustee of the *Helmets To Hardhats* program, I want to inform you that I have written to the governors of 45 states asking that they grant commercial drivers licenses (CDLs) to veterans who have experience driving heavy vehicles.

This simple change in procedure would recognize the talent and skill our military men and women achieve while serving our country and would help them transition more smoothly and quickly to civilian life. Federal regulations (49 CFR 383.77, Substitute for driving skills) already grant every state the ability to grant CDLs based on military experience, but so far only five states — Florida, Minnesota, Nevada, Ohio and Rhode Island — have rules in place to make it happen.

For the sake of our veterans and their families, I ask for your support in this effort, one that would not only help repay our debt to those who bravely served our country during war time, but would also ensure that applicants possess the skills necessary to safely operate commercial vehicles on our national highways. Such standards should include:

- Issuing the class of license equivalent to the vehicle class driven in military service;
- If the applicant has experience/training driving a vehicle that requires an endorsement(s) (Doubles/Triples, Bus, and Tank) they should not be required to test for the applicable endorsement(s). However, they should be required to take the test for the Hazardous Materials endorsement;
- A passing score of the written CDL General Knowledge Test;
- Meet all physical qualifications (49 CFR 391.41); and
- Have safe driving records (49 CFR 383.51).

For prior military:

• A Form-DD214 showing the proper Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) or appropriate certificate of training or a form of verification.

For active military, National Guard or Reserve:

• Letters from military units defining the class of vehicles the applicants are qualified to drive.

Sorry this is late, I have been out of the office the last few days.

Under Statue 340.01 definitions, 41m, talks about "Other or another jurisdiction" and that is where you will find language regarding waiving tests if a CDL license was issued at a federal military installation located with the territorial boundaries of Wisconsin.

We would treat a CDL license issued at a federal military installation within Wisconsin, the same as someone surrendering a CDL license from Michigan for example. No tests required unless the person has a phyical impairment that needs further evalutation or they have an "H" endorsement to transport hazmat or an "S" endorsement for operating a school

endorsement requires a knowledge only (along with a background check under the U.S.A. Patriot Act) and the "S" endorsement requires knowledge, highway signs and an abbreviated skills test.

Please let me know if you need anything else.



Our staff is trained to take a look at everyone who comes for a driver license product (including customers coming in from another jurisdiction), just to evaluate whether the person seems to have a disability or functional impairment that may be subject to a special examination under Chapter Trans.

104.07(1)(f), if we need to evaluate a physical disability or functional impairment and their current license does not have restrictions associated with the impairment or disability.

We just wanted you to know, because there is always a possibility -- unusual, but still there -- that a person who comes in with a military CDL (like anyone who comes from another jurisdiction) could be subject to special examination under Trans 104.07(1)(f).

Hi, Lorna: We've reviewed the attached LRB draft and have the following suggestions, please.

1. The intent of DOT and the Representative is to treat all military CDL licenses the same way we treat CDL licenses from another jurisdiction. For all jurisdictions, Wisconsin does not waive the knowledge test for a Hazardous Materials ("H") endorsement and a School Bus ("S") endorsement, and we also do not waive the skills test for a School Bus ("S") endorsement.

The LRB draft needs to be amended to establish these two exclusions, so that military CDL will be treated exactly like other jurisdiction CDL. For information, please see Trans.104.03(1)(b) which states that a knowledge test is not waived for Hazardous Materials or School Bus endorsement; and to Trans 104.06(4) and the note following that section, which states that a skills test is not waived for a School Bus endorsement.

2. A Military CDL does not use the same definitions of vehicle classes that all jurisdictions use on their CDL licenses. It is impossible for DOT to determine, based on looking at a military CDL, what vehicle classes the Wisconsin CDL should authorize. The LRB draft needs to be amended to require the applicant to present to DOT, a letter from the applicant's commanding officer, which shows the equivalent vehicle class ("A", "B", or "C", enumerated and described in statute S.343.04(1)(a), (b), and (c)) for the vehicles that the military CDL authorizes.

3. The drafter note asks

*Will we still require the applicant to take a vision test?

Yes, we will still require the vision test.

*Do we need a time limit for expired military licenses?

The military CDL should be expired no more than 4 years.

This is the same treatment as CDLs from any other jurisdiction. We would like NOT to use the word "cancelled," only the word "expired," to address the issue of dishonorably discharge below.

*Should eligibility be limited to military license holders who have not been dishonorably discharged?

We believe the problem would be sufficiently taken care of if we use only the word "expired," with no reference to "cancelled." It's our understanding that if a person is dishonorably discharged, the person may be required to surrender his or her military CDL; and we do not have a way to check on whether a military CDL presented to us has been cancelled.

We believe if the person presents the documentation from a commanding officer that shows the equivalency of the vehicle classes (which we ask for in #2 above), this would probably deter an applicant who had been dishonorably discharged from requesting test waiver.
