## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

Among other things, 2007 Assembly Bill 209 eliminates the statute of limitations in certain cases of child sexual assault and creates felony offenses relating to child neglect. These changes will likely result in more prosecutions. While these prosecutions normally will be handled by county district attorneys, the Department of Justice represents the state in all felony appeals. It is difficult to predict how many more prosecutions will result should AB 209 become law. It is even more difficult to estimate how many of those cases DOJ will handle on appeal. Though it is difficult to project increased caseload with certainty, DOJ does not anticipate a significant fiscal impact due to the enactment of Assembly Bill 209.
