Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

The State Public Defender (SPD) is statutorily authorized and required to appoint attorneys to represent indigent defendants in criminal proceedings. The SPD plays a major role in ensuring that the Wisconsin justice system complies with the right to counsel provided by both the state and federal constitutions. Any legislation that creates a new criminal offense or expands the definition of an existing criminal offense has the potential to increase SPD costs.

Although this bill does not create a new criminal offense, it expands the definition of sexual intercourse applicable to the criminal statute prohibiting incest. Thus, the bill is likely to result in more prosecutions under the incest statute, which in turn would result in higher SPD costs for appointment of defense attorneys.

The SPD does not have the data to predict the increased costs that could result from the changes proposed in this bill. The average SPD cost to provide representation in a felony case is \$543.01 (for felony classes D-I, based upon FY 2007 data). In the future, the SPD could compare the number of appointments under the incest statute after the effective date of the bill to historical data on such appointments.

Counties are also subject to increased costs when a new crime is created or when the definition of criminal conduct is expanded under an existing statute. There are some defendants who, despite exceeding the SPD's statutory financial guidelines, are constitutionally eligible for appointment of counsel because it would be a substantial hardship for them to retain an attorney. The court is required to appoint counsel at county expense for these defendants. The counties could also incur additional costs associated with incarceration of defendants, both pending trial and after sentencing.
