Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

SB 476 amends the state's Children's Code and Juvenile Justice Code to prevent the denial, limitation, or discontinuation of parental visitation from obstructing visitation between a child in sustaining care or child protection services and a sibling, if such a visitation would be in the best interest of the child and the sibling. While a potential fiscal impact exists if the Bureau of Milwaukee Child Welfare or a county child welfare agency were required to spend more time arranging and providing a visitation that is safe and appropriate for both siblings, the Department estimates that there would be a very small number of cases in which a visitation that is in the best interest of the child and sibling would be obstructed by the denial, limitation, or discontinuation of parental visitation. As a result, the Department anticipates no fiscal impact from this bill on the state or counties.
