As the new session begins, we want to welcome you to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. Both returning and new members can look forward to accomplishing a great deal over the next two years. As your co-chairs, we thought it would be helpful to set forth some general guidelines for committee operations so that all members are prepared at the outset.

We all serve on a number of committees. We will do our best to accommodate your individual schedules when planning hearing dates. With that in mind, we intend to do the following:

- 2. Set agendas that can realistically be completed in a reasonable amount of time.
- 3. Begin our meetings on time.
- 4. Ask that speakers addressing the committee summarize rather than read testimony verbatim and not repeat previous testimony.
- 5. Set time limits on testimony, if needed.
- 6. Have members vote in person at executive sessions. Ordinarily, we will take executive action on proposed audits immediately following the public hearing on the proposed audit.

In addition to holding public hearings, we strongly believe that tracking agency progress in addressing the Legislative Audit Bureau's recommendations is an integral part of the committee's responsibility. To that end, attached is a timeline for receiving follow-up documents as required in a past audit or at the request of this committee or its co-chairs. We have also provided a listing of current audits in progress.

We are honored to serve as your co-chairs on the Joint Legislative Audit Committee and we look forward to working with you this session. Our committee clerks are Lewis Rosser (Sullivan) and Pam Matthews (Jeskewitz). We work closely with State Auditor Jan Mueller, her special assistant Joe Chrisman, and Legislative Council senior staff attorney Pam Shannon.



- 3. It is often useful if you discuss your request with State Auditor Janice Mueller before submitting it formally to the Committee. The State Auditor can help you determine if an audit has already been completed on the issue or assess the feasibility of your audit request. The State Auditor may be reached at (608) 266-2818.

Audit requests that were not approved during the past legislative session may also be updated and resubmitted for consideration. If you have any questions on the procedures to follow in requesting an audit, or on any other matter relevant to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, please feel free to contact us.







- (c) If the department issues a permit under this section authorizing removal of vegetation, the department shall provide to the permittee prior to commencement of the work an estimate of the value of the vegetation to be removed and a detailed explanation of the department's objectives in planting this vegetation or allowing this vegetation to become established.
- (6) The department shall have authority to supervise and determine how the work authorized under a permit

issued under this section is carried out. The department may require as a condition or restriction under any permit issued under this section that the work authorized under the permit meet standards established by the department.



Statutory Responsibilities for Recurring Audits

Under s. 13.94, Wis. Stats., and other statutory provisions, the Legislative Audit Bureau is responsible for conducting annual financial audits of:

- the Department of Employee Trust Funds;
- the Capital Improvement Fund;
- the Bond Security and Redemption Fund;
- the State of Wisconsin Investment Board;
- the Division of Gaming within the Department of Administration;
- the Wisconsin Lottery;
- State Fair Park;
- student loans and notes in the possession of the Higher Educational Aids Board;
- grants for dental services at the Marquette University School of Dentistry; and
- the Green Bay/Brown County Professional Football Stadium District's efforts to meet contracting and hiring goals for minorities and women in the Lambeau Field reconstruction project.

We also conduct biennial or more frequent financial audits of:

- the accounts of the State Treasurer;
- the central accounting records of the Department of Administration;
- expenditures from the state appropriation to the Medical College of Wisconsin;
- expenditures under the Higher Educational Aids Board contract for dental education services; and
- the financial status of the local professional baseball park and football stadium districts.


Annual program audit responsibility for area cooperation compacts under which municipalities collaborate to provide governmental services such as law enforcement, fire protection, and emergency services, begins in 2004.

We have biennial program audit responsibility for the State Lottery, the State of Wisconsin Investment Board, and the Division of Gaming within the Department of Administration. In addition, we are required to periodically audit divisions in the Department of Commerce that are responsible for inspections of multifamily housing, to conduct county and municipal best practices reviews, and to monitor the Department of Natural Resources' environmental cooperation pilot program.

Statutes require that we audit the State Life Insurance Fund, the Local Government Property Insurance Fund, and the Patients Compensation Fund at least once every three years. In recent years we have performed these audits every three years and have performed interim work each year for purposes of our annual audit of the State of Wisconsin's financial statements.

At least once every five years, we are required to examine the extent to which state agencies purchase materials, supplies, or equipment manufactured outside the United States. We are also responsible for conducting special examinations of the accounts and financial transactions of any department or office as the Governor, the Legislature, the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, or the Joint Committee on Legislative Organization directs. Finally, as directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, we may audit any county, city, village, town, or school district.

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B- Wisconsin

This isn't a fun time to be a state employee in Wisconsin. Hiring freezes, ongoing budget disputes and a lagging pay scale help explain why Wisconsin has the second-highest turnover rate in the country for veteran employees. The personnel situation even sounds a little Kafkaesque when you hear the story of Georgia Thompson.

A well-respected state procurement supervisor protected by civil-service rules, she was briefly jailed in 2006 in a politically motivated prosecution. An appellate court threw the case out in an afternoon, but the episode didn't do much to help overall employee morale. "Every single person in the state's civil service is saying, 'There but for the grace of God go I," says Mordecai Lee, a professor of governmental affairs at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. "'Somebody somewhere is going to distort the decisions that I make and I'm going to be in the same position as her."

While Governor Jim Doyle's Accountability, Consolidation and Efficiency Initiative has led to some improvements in the state's contracting processes, this, too, has been a source of considerable tension for state employees. "The state is contracting out for all sorts of things without monitoring them sufficiently," complains one recent high-level Department of Revenue

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retiree. "The state was willing to spend money on outside 'experts' but wouldn't spend the money necessary to retain the qualified personnel needed to run its agencies and programs."

Intricate cost-benefit analyses are now required before contracting out for state activities, but agency managers complain that their inability to hire additional personnel makes the difficult-to-produce findings irrelevant. Last year's hiring freeze meant that for a period of time one of the state's largest agencies, the Department of Health and Family Services, was lacking a procurement chief. Turnover in the Department of Corrections,

another of the state's largest customers for goods and services, has led to the loss of its delegated purchasing authority — and the flexibility that came with it. Now, just about everything the Corrections Department buys must be cleared by the state's central purchasing office.

The irony is that Wisconsin is widely acknowledged to have a high-quality workforce. Its challenge will be to iron out some of the current problems before too much lasting damage takes place.

Wisconsin has been struggling with a structural budget deficit for years — the state ended fiscal 2007 with a \$2.44 billion general-fund deficit. On the other hand, the state's handling of infrastructure is getting better. Although Wisconsin's backlog for general infrastructure maintenance is \$1.2 billion, a pretty big number, the state has been spending a growing amount on it each year — enough to keep the figure from getting any larger. The backlog for roads and bridges is now down to \$69 million. Both the Department of Transportation and the Department of Administration seem to have a solid grasp of their needs, aided by sophisticated asset-management computer systems.

Unfortunately, this kind of planning for the future hasn't been commonplace in most other facets of management. Some agencies engage in efforts at strategic planning but the central government hasn't joined the party. "Policy making by crossing their fingers is the best way to explain what long-term planning means in Wisconsin," says Professor Lee, a former state legislator himself. Agencies monitor and report on performance internally to varying degrees, and performance measures play a small role in the state's budget process.

Wisconsin's Legislative Audit Bureau remains among the most important and credible audit shops in the country. Not only has the office proved itself willing to go after the hotbutton news items of the day, it has managed to direct the legislature's attention to crucial management deficiencies. Spurring legislative action in these areas is no small feat, especially in long-neglected sectors such as information technology. And all of the bureau's findings are more accessible these days thanks to new, tech-savvy means of communicating findings to citizens, including podcasts, webcasts and RSS feeds.
