#### Eric--

When we spoke on January 20, you indicated that you would like to see a listing of statutory programs that include services for autism. The following is a listing of these services, as best I can determine from the statutes and administrative rules, in chs. 46, 49, and 51, stats.:

#### CH. 46

- 1. Section 46.286 (1), stats., provides entitlement to Family Care for, among others, persons with developmental disability who meet functional and financial eligibility criteria and are at least 18 years of age. The definition of "developmental disability" refers to the definition in s. 51.01 (5) (a), stats., which includes autism.
- 2. Section 46.485, stats., provides community aids general purpose revenue and Medical Assistance funds for services for severely emotionally disturbed (SED) children, as defined in s. 49.45 (25) (a), stats. The SED criteria would seem to apply to certain autistic children.

#### CH. 49

- 1. Section 49.45 (25), stats., provides Medical Assistance case management services for "severely emotionally disturbed (SED) children" (individuals under age 21 years with emotional and behavioral problems that meet specified criteria) and to persons with developmental disability; the SED criteria would seem to apply to certain autistic children, and the definition of "developmental disability" refers to the definition in s. 51.01 (5) (a), stats., which includes autism.
- Section 49.45 (30e), stats., provides Medical Assistance community-based psychosocial services.
- 3. Secction 49.45 (30m), stats., provides certain services for developmentally disabled persons. The definition of "developmentally disabled" under s. 49.43 (3m), for purposes of the Medical Assistance statutes, refers to the definition in s. 51.05 (5) (a), stats., which includes autism.
- 4. Sections 49.46 (2) (b) 8. and 49.47 (6) (a) 1., stats., which specify benefits available under Medical Assistance, refer to the disabled children's long-term support program (the program referred to in 2007 Assembly Bill 901).

#### CH. 51

- 1. Section 51.01 (5) (a), stats., defines "developmental disability" for purposes of the chapter as a whole, to include "autism".
- 2. Section 51.06, stats., outlines inpatient services at the centers for developmentally disabled.
- 3. Section 51.07, stats., specifies outpatient services for patients who are contracted with county departments of community programs (under s. 51.42, stats.) and county departments of developmental disabilities services (under s. 51.437, stats.)
- 4. Section 51.10, stats., refers to voluntary admission of adults to centers for the developmentally disabled (through county departments)
- 5. Section 51.13, stats., specifies procedures and criteria for admission of minors to treatment facilities for treatment of developmental disability and mental illness.
- 6. Section 51.15, stats., specifies criteria and procedures for emergency detention of persons who are dangerous and mentally ill, drug dependent, or developmentally disabled.

- 7. Section 51.20, stats., specifies criteria and procedures for involuntary commitment of persons who are dangerous and mentally ill, drug dependent, or developmentally disabled.
- 8. Section 51.423, stats., specifies community support programs for mental illness, developmental disability, alcoholism, and drug abuse that are funded by state community aids, federal social services block grants, and Medical Assistance.
- 9. Section 51.44, stats., specifies a statewide system of coordinated, multidisciplinary programs to provide early intervention services (known as the Birth to 3 Program) for eligible children and their families. Under administrative rules (DHS 90.08 (4), a child is eligible under the program if he or she is determined to be developmentally delayed or if he or she has a diagnosed physical or mental condition which will likely result in developmental delay. A "diagnosed condition", under

DHS 90.08 (6), includes autism.

PLEASE NOTE: In light of all the services that include autism under one or more definitions of "developmental disability," the provision under s. 146.85 of 2007 Assembly Bill 901, requiring a health care provider to provide a treatment plan for a patient diagnosed with a condition, injury, or illness OTHER THAN developmental disability appears not to work, if it is intended that this section would be requiring a treatment plan for a patient diagnosed with autism.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill increases a general purpose revenue appropriation to the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS) by \$6,060,000 in fiscal year 2008-09 for the autism benefit under the Medical Assistance (MA) program. Under an MA waiver of federal law, DHFS provides in-home services to children who have been diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder and who would not otherwise be eligible for MA benefits. The funding increase under this bill would be used to provide those services to children diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder who are on the statewide, waiting list for those services.

The bill requires a health care provider who diagnoses a patient with a condition, injury, or illness other than alcoholism, drug dependency, mental illness, or developmental disability that requires further treatment, to provide the patient (or, if a minor, the patient's parent, guardian, or legal custodian) with a treatment plan and to provide any necessary and appropriate referral for further treatment or services.

In addition, the bill directs DHFS to develop and periodically update a brochure describing the activities that a parent or guardian of a child with autism may engage in at home with the child to complement the child's treatment or individualized

education program. OHFS must distribute the brochure to local educational agencies and physicians.

Under current law, the Department of Health Services (DHS) provides in-home services, under a Medical Assistance (MA) waiver of federal law, to children who have been diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder and who would not otherwise be eligible for MA benefits. This bill requires DHS to provide autism services under the MA autism benefit to all individuals who are eligible for the services and prohibits DHS from using a waiting list to limit or delay the provision of those services to eligible individuals. The bill also creates a sum sufficient general purpose revenue appropriation to DHS for the autism benefit. In addition, DHS is required to seek a waiver or an amendment to the existing waiver if DHS determines that that is necessary for the provision of the services to all individuals who are eligible and to authorize federal financial participation for MA reimbursement for providing the services to all eligible individuals.



AN ACT *to create* 15.405 (6p), 440.08 (2) (a) 15m. and chapter 462 of the statutes;

relating to: licensure of autism paraprofessionals, creating an autism

paraprofessional board, and granting rule-making authority.

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### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill requires licensure of persons who engage in autism paraprofessional practice, defined as the provision of services for compensation to an individual with autism for which current law does not require a licensure as a physician, physicians assistant, nurse, chiropractor, pharmacist, psychologist, or other professional specified in the bill.

The bill creates an Autism Paraprofessional Board (board) composed of two psychiatrists, one pediatrician, one psychologist, one social worker, and two public members. The public members must each be the parent of a child who has been diagnosed with autism. The bill requires the board to promulgate rules that establish educational criteria and practice standards for autism paraprofessionals and permits the board to promulgate rules that create ethical standards and continuing education requirements for autism paraprofessionals.

Under the bill, the board may discipline an autism paraprofessional who does any of the following: 1) intentionally makes a material misstatement in an application for a license or for renewal; 2) engages in autism paraprofessional practice while impaired by alcohol or other drugs; 3) makes a substantial misrepresentation that is relied upon by a client; or 4) violates any law that substantially relates to autism paraprofessional practice.

# **2009 BILL**

autism-related information

AN ACT to amend 20.435 (4) (b); and to create 15.405 (6r), 20.435 (4) (c), 49.45 (38m), 51.03 (7), 146.85, 440.08 (2) (a) 15m. and chapter 462 of the statutes; relating to: requiring development and distribution of a brochure, requiring a referral when certain diagnoses are made, providing funding for the Medical Assistance autism benefit, licensure of autism paraprofessionals, creating an autism paraprofessional board, granting rule-making authority, and making an appropriation.

### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, the Department of Health Services (DHS) provides in-home services, under a Medical Assistance (MA) waiver of federal law, to children who have been diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder and who would not otherwise be eligible for MA benefits. This bill requires DHS to provide autism services under the MA autism benefit to all individuals who are eligible for the services and prohibits DHS from using a waiting list to limit or delay the provision of those services to eligible individuals. The bill also creates a sum sufficient general purpose revenue appropriation to DHS for the autism benefit. In addition, DHS is required to seek a waiver or an amendment to the existing waiver if DHS determines that that is necessary for the provision of the services to all individuals who are eligible and to authorize federal financial participation for MA reimbursement for providing the services to all eligible individuals.

The bill requires a health care provider who diagnoses a patient with a condition, injury, or illness other than alcoholism, drug dependency, or mental illness, that requires further treatment, to provide the patient (or, if a minor, the patient's parent, guardian, or legal custodian) with any necessary and appropriate referral for further treatment or services.

Y In addition, the bill directs DHS to develop and periodically update a brochure describing the activities that a parent of a child with autism may engage in at home with the child to complement the child's treatment or individualized education program. DHS must distribute the brochure to local educational agencies and physicians. intermation

The bill requires licensure of persons who engage in autism paraprofessional practice, defined as the provision of services for compensation to an individual with autism for which current law does not require a licensure as a physician, physician assistant, nurse, chiropractor, pharmacist, psychologist, or other professional specified in the bill.

The bill creates an Autism Paraprofessional Board (board) composed of two psychiatrists, one pediatrician, one psychologist, one social worker, and two public members. The public members must each be the parent of a child who has been diagnosed with autism. The bill requires the board to promulgate rules that establish educational criteria and practice standards for autism paraprofessionals and permits the board to promulgate rules that create ethical standards and continuing education requirements for autism paraprofessionals.

Under the bill, the board may discipline an autism paraprofessional who does 1) intentionally makes a material misstatement in an any of the following: application for a license or for renewal: 2) engages in autism paraprofessional practice while impaired by alcohol or other drugs; 3) makes a substantial misrepresentation that is relied upon by a client; or 4) violates any law that substantially relates to autism paraprofessional practice.

(o), to fund the pilot project under s. 46.27 (9) and (10), to provide a portion of the facility payments under 1999 Wisconsin Act 9, section 9123 (9m), to fund services provided by resource centers under s. 46.283, for services under the family care benefit under s. 46.284 (5), for assisting victims of diseases, as provided in ss. 49.68, 49.683, and 49.685, and for reduction of any operating deficits as specified in 2005 Wisconsin Act 15, section 3. Notwithstanding s. 20.002 (1), the department may transfer from this appropriation account to the appropriation account under sub. (7) (kb) funds in the amount of and for the purposes specified in s. 46.485. Notwithstanding ss. 20.001 (3) (b) and 20.002 (1), the department may credit or deposit into this appropriation account and may transfer between fiscal years funds that it transfers from the appropriation account

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under sub. (7) (kb) for the purposes specified in s. 46.485 (3r). Notwithstanding s
20.002 (1), the department may transfer from this appropriation account to the
appropriation account under sub. (7) (bd) funds in the amount and for the purpose
specified in s. 49.45 (6v).

**SECTION 3.** 20.435 (4) (c) of the statutes is created to read:

20.435 (4) (c) Medical Assistance autism benefit. A sum sufficient for the state's share of the Medical Assistance autism benefit to provide autism services under the children's long-term care Medical Assistance waiver program, as described under s. 49.45 (38m) and 2003 Wisconsin Act 33, section 9124 (8c).

**Section 4.** 49.45 (38m) of the statutes is created to read:

49.45 (38m) AUTISM BENEFIT. (a) The department shall provide autism services under the autism benefit program under the children's long-term care Medical Assistance waiver program, as described under 2003 Wisconsin Act 33, section 9124 (8c), to all individuals who are eligible for the services and may not use a waiting list to limit or delay the provision of services to eligible individuals.

(b) If the department determines that it needs a waiver or an amendment to the waiver described under 2003 Wisconsin Act 33, section 9124 (8c), to provide the services as required under par. (a) and to authorize federal financial participation for Medical Assistance reimbursement for the services, the department shall request from the secretary of the federal department of health and human services a waiver or a waiver amendment to allow the department to provide the services as required under par. (a) and to authorize federal financial participation for those services. provide
