Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill prohibits the manufacture or sale of empty bottles or cups intended for use by a child if the container contains bisphenol A. This bill also requires that manufacturers and wholesalers ensure that bottles and containers be clearly labeled as not containing bisphenol A.

Penalties for violating the provisions of the bill include fines up to \$5,000, up to one year in jail, or both, and a surcharge equal to 50% of any fine imposed, payable to the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

The Department is unable to predict the number of manufacturers and wholesalers who will be convicted of this offense. There will be additional costs to counties if offenders are sentenced to jail and increased costs to the Department if offenders are placed on probation supervision. In FY09, the average cost of supervising one offender on community supervision was \$2,600 per year.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications
