## **Expedited Partner Therapy (EPT) Legislation in 2009**

In May 2008, then Representative Sheldon Wasserman introduced A.B. 318, which revised numerous statutes to explicitly allow for expedited partner therapy (EPT). Representative Wasserman has since resigned his seat and no other legislator has introduced similar legislation.

The Department of Health Services supports the concept of EPT. However, the Department has identified language in A.B. 318 that should be revised.

#### Ideal EPT legislation would include:

- Definition of EPT according to CDC recommended language:
  - "To prescribe, dispense, furnish, or otherwise provide prescription drugs to the sexual partner or partners of persons diagnosed as infected with a sexually transmissible disease, without physical examination of the partner or partners."
- Assurance that a physician, physician assistant, advanced nurse prescriber, or pharmacist writing or filling a prescription for a patient without prior physical examination is not seen as "misconduct" or "unprofessional conduct" for Chlamydia, gonorrhea, and trichomoniasis.
- Limited liability to those who prescribe or dispense prescription drugs for the purpose of expedited partner therapy, when done consistent with the Act. The person prescribing or dispensing for the purpose of EPT would be immune from civil liability for injury or death of the individual for whom the drug is dispensed and may not be found guilty of unprofessional conduct for his or her acts or omissions, unless the person's conduct is reckless, wanton or intentional misconduct. See Wis. Stat. s. 255.056(6) for possible model language.
- Allow the prescribing and dispensing of prescriptions for EPT if the partner's name is not known or given. The Department recommends writing the prescription for "Expedited Partner Therapy."
- Physician, physician assistant, advanced nurse prescriber, or pharmacist would provide consultation about drug allergies and interactions to the patient or agent of the patient.
- Written materials developed by the Department of Health Services (DHS) would be included with EPT, but not require an administrative rule from DHS.
- Remain mute on designation of payer leaving the assumption that the standard payment mechanisms (patient & partner or their respective insurance) would pay.
- Clarify definitions of EPT and "antibiotic drug". EPT should allow for dispensing of necessary antimicrobial prescriptions to treat the disease. Some prescriptions used to treat these diseases are technically antifungals or antimicrobials, not antibiotics. Therefore, the definition of "antibiotic drugs" and cross reference throughout the bill should be changed to reflect prescribing of EPT antimicrobial prescriptions, not antibiotic drugs.

A.B. 318 is a good base for new expedited partner therapy legislation. The attached table has the Department's suggested revisions for A.B. 318 that are consistent with the bullets noted above. Please feel free to contact us with any questions.

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#### Antibiotic versus Antimicrobial

Technically, antibiotics are only those substances that are produced by one microorganism that kill, or prevent the growth, of another microorganism. Over time and in common usage, the term has been used more broadly and may include synthetically formed compounds as well and refers to almost any drug that cures bacterial infections.

A more accurate term to use is "antimicrobial". Antimicrobial is a general term given to substances including medicines that kill or slow the growth of microorganisms (bacterial, fungi, protozoans and viruses). Main classes of antimicrobials include a) antibiotics, 2) antivirals, 3)antifungals and 4) antiparasitics.

Trichomoniasis is actually caused by a single celled protozoan parasite. Metronidazole, the first line drug for Trichomoniasis is a synthetic antiprotozoal and antibacterial drug.

There are five places in the statue that use the term **antibiotic(s)**:

10. Adequate directions for the safe and effective use of commercial feed containing drugs or **antibiotics**, or of any other feed as required under department rules;

(a) Purchase, store, or distribute antitoxins, serums, vaccines, immunizing agents, antibiotics, and other pharmaceutical agents or medical supplies that the department determines are advisable to control a public health emergency.

252.11(11)

(11) In each county with an incidence of gonorrhea, antibiotic resistant gonorrhea, chlamydia or syphilis that exceeds the statewide average, a program to diagnose and treat sexually transmitted diseases at no cost to the patient is required. The county board of supervisors is responsible for ensuring that the program exists, but is required to establish its own program only if no other public or private program is operating. The department shall compile statistics indicating the incidence of gonorrhea, antibiotic resistant gonorrhea, chlamydia and syphilis for each county in the state.

3. Certain medications, including but not limited to tranquilizers, diuretics, antibiotics, high blood pressure medicines and birth control pills.

(b) An unusual increase in the number of prescriptions dispensed by the pharmacist or pharmacy that are antibiotic drugs.

There is one place in the statute that uses the term antimicrobial:

252.07(1t)

(1t) Any laboratory that identifies mycobacterium tuberculosis shall ensure that antimicrobial drug susceptibility tests are performed on the initial isolate. The laboratory shall report the results of these tests to the local health officer and the department.

None of the statute citations include a definition for the terms. My belief is that antibiotic was used as a common usage term without detailed thought to the specific science.

#### **Conclusion**

My suggestion is that we use the term "antimicrobial" and that we substitute it every place that the term "antibiotic" occurs.

AN ACT *to amend* 441.07 (1) (d), 448.015 (4), 448.04 (1) (a), 450.10 (1) (a) (intro.)

and 450.11 (1); and to create 46.03 (44), 441.16 (3m), 448.035 and 450.11 (1g)

of the statutes; relating to: prescriptions for antibiotic drugs for treatment of

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill allows a physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice nurse to prescribe to a patient an antibiotic drug as a course of therapy for the treatment of chlamydial infections, gonorrhea, or trichomoniasis for use by a person with whom the patient has had sexual intercourse if the patient states that the person is not allergic to the drug. Such a prescription may not be made for a controlled substance.

A physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice nurse who makes suche provides a prescription may provide the patient with written information specified in rules promulgated by the Department of Health and Family Services. The information must include information about sexually transmitted diseases and their treatment and about the risk of drug allergies. (In addition, the physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice nurse may request that the patient provide the written information to the person with whom he or she has had sexual intercourse.

Section 1. 46.03 (44) of the statutes is created to read:

46.03 (44) Sexually transmitted disease treatment information. The prescription order is not required to include the name and address of the patient. This subsection does not apply to the prescribing of a substance listed in the schedules in ss. 961.14, 961.16, 961.18, 961.20, and 961.22 or substances added by the controlled substances board acting under s. 961.11 (1).
- (3) At the time of issuing the prescription under sub. (2), the physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice nurse prescriber shall direct the patient to ask the person with whom the patient has had sexual intercourse whether that person is allergic to the antibiotic drug, and shall inform the patient that the person

with whom the patient has had sexual intercourse must not use or must discontinue

The bill also permits a pharmacist to dispense an antimicrobial drug to a patient upon receipt of a prescription order from a practitioner providing expedited partner therapy. The bill exempts a physician, physician's assistant, or advanced practice nurse prescriber who provides expedited partner therapy from civil liability for injury to or the death of a patient's sexual partner unless an act or omission of the physician, physician's assistant, or advanced practice nurse prescriber involves reckless, wanton, or intentional misconduct. The bill also exempts a pharmacist who dispenses an antimicrobial drug for the treatment of a chlamydial infection, gonorrhea, or trichomoniasis from civil liability for injury to or the death of a patient's sexual partner unless an act or omission of the pharmacist involves reckless, wanton, or intentional misconduct.

To address the Drafter's questions for Rep Pasch:

- 1. The Department of Health Services will develop guidance which will provide the materials and information sheet(s) to be included with expedited partner therapy. The distribution of these materials and information sheet(s) will be recommended in the guidance and made available for practitioners and pharmacists. Therefore, we suggest adding in language which would require DHS to create and maintain an information sheet about STDs and their treatment which would also include information about the risk of drug allergies. We would also suggest eliminating "and requiring the exercise of rule-making authority" from p. 1 lines 4-5.
- 2. We do not think the legislation should speak to the refusal of a pharmacist to dispense antimicrobials for EPT or a practitioner to refuse to provide EPT nor provide immunity for those who refuse. Therefore, we recommend remaining mute on this subject in the legislation.

#### Other changes to be made:

- 1. We would like the words "Expedited Partner Therapy" or "EPT" to be on the prescription whether or not the partner's name is known. We also want the idea that it would be best to have the partner's name on the prescription to be clearer in the legislation. Therefore, we propose deleting from p.4 lines 2-3 "does not need to show the name and address of the patient's sexual partner but" and adding "and name and address of sexual partner(s) when known" to the end of p.4 line 5. This change should also be reflected in the analysis by the LRB.
- 2. DHS suggested changes with regard to consultation and dispensing of antimicrobial drugs to reference existing pharmacy consultation policies.
- 3. Although changes to the labeling statutes were not included in the original drafting instructions, we have decided that they need to be included in the bill to ensure prescriptions can be dispensed and labeled for "Expedited Partner Therapy" when the partner's name is unknown. We suggest including changes to the labeling requirements for prescription drugs in 450.11 (4) 5. to allow for antimicrobials dispensed for EPT to be labeled "Expedited Partner Therapy" when the partner's name is unknown.

The bill defines "antimicrobial drug" as a drug recommended for the treatment of a chlamydial infection, gonorrhea, or trichomoniasis in the most current guidelines for the treatment of sexually transmitted diseases of the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Controlled substances are explicitly excluded from the definition of "antimicrobial drug." A prescription order for an antimicrobial drug prescribed as expedited partner therapy for the treatment of a chlamydial infection, gonorrhea, or trichomoniasis need not bear the name of the patient's sexual partner, but must contain the words "expedited partner therapy" in bold-face capital letters, and the name and address of the Partner when known as A physician, physician assistant, or certified advanced practice nurse who provides expedited partner therapy must provide the patient with written.
