Aaron, the provision in s. 86.196 (5) mirrors the Guidance statement provided in the federal Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. The language is in Section 2G.07, Guidance statement G., maximum distance to eligible facilities.

The requirement is not directly imposed by federal law, as it is identified as guidance. The Wisconsin Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices adopts the guidance statement so it becomes the standard for traffic signs prescribed by the department. The specific provision of 86.195 (5) reiterates the standard.

In terms of the practical implications, the department has experience in this area, as the somewhat similar specific information sign program years ago had a more lenient standard, allowing for inclusion of services up to 15 miles from the interchange or intersection. There were a number of public complaints about allowing signs that directed to services too far removed from the highway where the sign was located. Now those limitations, both from the MUTCD and in state law, are generally three miles with the potential to extent to 5 miles in some cases. For the "attractions" category only, the law provides that the distance may extend as far as 30 miles from the route. In practice, this would rarely if ever happen as there are other provisions preventing signing from one route to another like route.

Generally the department discourages changes that add to sign proliferation. The federal Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, as well as sound engineering practice, recognize that signs on the highway should be limited to those necessary to guide and warn traffic, to achieve safe highway operation. Adding signs for locations that are remote from the route adds little value and diminishes the impact or driver respect for signs that require driver action, which is seen as negatively affecting highway safety.


