Hi Ilsa -

The money that's spent under the provisions amended in -3866 and -3867 is spent by the school districts. Then the state, through the appropriation that we're talking about, reimburses the school districts for a portion of the money that they spent. This is a "categorical" aid, meaning that it is paid on the basis of a percentage of costs or, in this case, so much per mile transported. The balance of the money spent by the school districts to transport pupils is counted in their shared costs, which is used to determine their general, or equalization, aid. I hope this answers your first question.

Note that a "continuing" appropriation does not solve the problem if there is no way to distribute the money. In other words, the amount that the school districts receive from the state is determined by a formula: so much per mile transported. If there is a balance in the appropriation after the aid is paid, right now it lapses to the general fund. A continuing appropriation would keep the money in the appropriation, but in the succeeding fiscal year the amount the districts would receive would again be determined by the formula of so much per mile transported. Again, if there is a balance after the payments are made, it does not get distributed. LRB-3865 solves the problem by distributing the balance.

Regarding s. 121.54 (2) (b) 1., I checked on the history. It was enacted by the 1967-68 legislature as part of a lengthy Legislative Council bill that made numerous changes to the laws relating to public schools.

It is not clear whether a school district must transport private school pupils who are not included in the May 15th list. The statutes require the school district to transport certain private school pupils, but the statutes also require private schools, by May 15th, to provide to the school district the list of pupils who are eligible to be transported. If you like, we can amend the provision to change the date or to clarify that the duty to transport applies to pupils who are *not* included on the list, or both.

Let me know how you'd like to proceed or whether you have additional questions.

Peter-

Thank you for this information.

Rep Dexter would like to have LRB-3866/1 and LRB-3867/1 redrafted to make them continuing appropriations. As we talked about this, one question did arise. The money that is spent under LRB-3866/1 and LRB-3867/1 is from the school district correct? So if there were savings wouldn't they automatically stay in the school district? Or do they need to return that money to the state at the end? Thank you!

Kristen would also like to look into Statute 121.54 (2) sub4 relating to a date that private schools have to notify public schools of the number of riders they have. Apparently there are public school districts in WI that have interpreted this statute to require private schools report the number of pupils they have to transport by May 15<sup>th</sup>, no exceptions. If there are more students added after May 15<sup>th</sup>, the public school doesn't reimburse for them. I am wounding if you could offer some history on this statute. Kristen would like to change this so that private schools have more time to notify about the number of students that they are going to need transported. I have a couple ideas about language, but I would prefer your expert opinion!

Depending on your opinion/advice I think we will want to add a change to the 121.54 Statute to the Transportation bills. We can wait on the redrafts of LRB-3866/1 and LRB-3867/1 until you have a chance to look at 121.54.

Hi Ilsa. In LRB-3865/1, there would be no savings, because the bill says that if there's a balance in the appropriation after all the approved claims are paid, DPI must distribute that balance to those school districts entitled to state transportation aid.

In LRB-3866/1 and LRB-3867/1, there could be a savings to the state. The money in the appropriation that is not used would lapse to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year. (This assumes that LRB-3865 is not enacted; as I mentioned above, if that bill is enacted, the balance would be distributed to school districts.) In -3866 and -3867, I could amend the appropriation so that it is a continuing appropriation. In a continuing appropriation, any balance at the end of the fiscal year is "continued" into the next year, and does not lapse to the general fund. Let me know if you'd like me to redraft those two drafts to do that.

AN ACT to amend 121.55 (3) (b) of the statutes; relating to: transportation of

2 pupils to private schools.

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### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, school board is required to transport pupils to private school under certain conditions. If the estimated cost of transporting a pupil to a private school is more than 1.5 times the school district's average cost per pupil for bus transportation, the school board may fulfill its obligation to transport the pupil by contracting with the pupil's parent or guardian. Except as provided below, the contract must provide for an annual payment for each pupil of at least \$5 times the number of miles between the pupil's residence and the private school, or the school district's average cost per pupil for bus transportation, whichever is greater.

In a first class city school district (currently, only the Milwaukee Public Schools), if two or more pupils reside in the same household and attend the same private school, the contract may, at the discretion of the school board, provide for a total annual payment of the amount described above for all of the pupils instead of for each of the pupils. This bill extends this provision to all school districts.

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

Section #. 121.54 (2) (b) 4. of the statutes is amended to read:

121.54 (2) (b) 4. No later than May 15 in each year, each private school shall notify each school board of the names, grade levels and locations of all pupils, if any, eligible to have transportation provided by such school board under this paragraph and planning to attend such private school during the forthcoming school term. The school board may extend the notification deadline.

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**SECTION 1.** 121.55 (3) (b) of the statutes, as created by 2009 Wisconsin Act 28, is amended to read:

121.55 (3) (b) Except as provided in par. (c), if 2 or more pupils reside in the same household and attend the same private school, the contract under par. (a) may, at the discretion of the school board of the school district operating under ch. 119, provide for a total annual payment for all such pupils of not less than \$5 times the distance in miles between the pupils' residence and the private school they attend, or the school district's average cost per pupil for bus transportation in the previous year exclusive of transportation for kindergarten pupils during the noon hour and for pupils with disabilities, whichever is greater.

SECTION 2. Initial applicability.

(1) first applies to contracts entered into under section 121.55 (3) of the statutes, as affected by this act, on the effective date of this subsection.

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# **2009 BILL**

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AN ACT to amend 121,54 (2) (b) 1. of the statutes; relating to: transportation

of private school pupils.

### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Current law, with some exceptions, requires a school district to provide transportation to and from school for a pupil attending a private school that is located at least two miles from the pupil's residence.

This bill requires a school district to provide transportation for private school pupils only during the school term of the school district. A school term is the time beginning on the first school day and ending on the last school day that the schools of a school district are in operation for the attendance of pupils in a school year, excluding summer classes.

# The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

**SECTION 1.** 121.54 (2) (b) 1. of the statutes is amended to read:

121.54 (2) (b) 1. Except as provided in sub. (1) or otherwise provided in this subsection, the school board of each district operating high school grades shall

provide transportation during the school term to and from the school a pupil attends for each pupil residing in the school district who attends any elementary grade, including kindergarten, or high school grade at a private school located 2 miles or more from the pupil's residence, if such private school is a school within whose attendance area the pupil resides and is situated within the school district or not more than 5 miles beyond the boundaries of the school district measured along the usually traveled route.
