Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill creates a Wisconsin conservation corps (WCC) program that seeks to protect, enhance, and provide access to Wisconsin's natural heritage and encourage and enable young people to learn the value of work in a natural setting by providing employment training and career pathways. The bill also creates a WCC Board, which is the policy-making body of the WCC and is attached to the Department of Administration (DOA). The WCC Board consists of the secretary of natural resources or his or her designee; the executive secretary of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands; two representatives to the assembly, appointed as are members of assembly standing committees; two senators, appointed as are members of senate standing committees; one member of a nongovernmental organization that has expertise in conservation matters or that represents

employees who work in conservation activities, for a three-year term; and two members of the faculty employed by a technical college district board, appointed by the state Technical College System Board, for three-year terms.

The bill provides funding for the WCC program from the conservation fund, the state normal school fund (a state trust fund that derives revenue from federal land grants), and from program fees that the board may assess to sponsors of projects. Under the bill, DOA provides all staff services to the board and the board has no other staff. The bill directs the board to enter into an agreement with a nonprofit corporation that has demonstrated experience in natural resource conservation and youth training to manage and administer the WCC program. The manager then retains, trains, and supervises work crews to carry out each project. The manager also identifies, reviews, and recommends proposed projects for the approval of the board. The bill requires the board to ensure that projects are equally distributed across technical college districts to the greatest extent possible, and to ensure that at least one project is located in each technical college district in each year.

The bill provides that a project must be designed to carry out a specific goal within a defined period of time and must be focused on the conservation or enjoyment of natural resources and must have a specific, beneficial, physical effect. Projects may include new trail construction, trail rehabilitation, invasive species management, bridge and boardwalk construction, reforestation, timber stand improvement, stream bank stabilization, erosion control, rain garden installation, prairie restoration, historical site preservation, recreation site maintenance, wild land fire hazard reduction and fuels management, lake and stream restoration, boundary marking, fencing, landscaping, carpentry, and data collection for scientific research. The bill permits local governments or nonprofit corporations to submit applications to sponsor projects. A project application must identify the proposed project and provide a detailed plan for working on the project. In addition, the application must contain an enumeration of the number of work crews that will work on the project and a determination that work crew members would be eligible to participate in a youth corps program administered by the National and Community Service Board (NCSB) and other requirements under the WCC program, as well as a plan for training the work crew members, providing transportation to the project work sites, making available educational opportunities for work crew members while they are employed on the projects, for assisting work crew members in making full use of all benefits provided under such a youth corps program,

The bill provides that each work crew member on a WCC project must be between the ages of 18 and 25, and at least 50 percent of the work crew members on each project must have no postsecondary education and have a family income of not more than 200 percent of the federal poverty line on the date of their initial employment.

The bill provides that, if the board determines that an application is an appropriate WCC project and that work crew members would be eligible under the program, the board must jointly submit the application with the sponsor to NCSB for funding. If funding is provided by NCSB, the board must also make a grant to the sponsor to assist the sponsor in training the work crews.

The crew members with application and enrollment procedures, programs, and course offerings

The bill also directs NCSB, which utilizes federal and state funding to award grants to persons providing national and community service programs, to first allocate funding for grants to provide work for at least 240 participants in each fiscal year in youth corps programs provided by the WCC Board, to the extent that funding is available to NCSB and NCSB receives valid applications for the grants. Currently, NCSB is directed only to give priority in awarding grants, to the greatest extent practicable, to persons providing youth corps programs.

The bill requires each sponsor of a WCC project to do both of the following: upon completion of the project, erect a permanent plaque at each work site identifying the site as a WCC project; and submit a report to the board identifying the number of work crew members who enrolled at a technical college upon completion of the project and their status on the first anniversary of completion of the project.

The bill exempts services performed by WCC work crews from compliance with requirements for state and local public works projects to adhere to current prevailing wage scales. The bill permits the board to retain its manager and other state agencies to engage a WCC crew on a project without complying with state procurement laws, including requirements for public notice to and competitive solicitation of contractors and limitations on the circumstances when contractual services may be obtained.

Finally, the bill requires the board to submit an annual report to the legislature identifying the projects completed in each year or that are in the process of completion as of the end of that year.

For further information see the **state** fiscal estimate, which will be printed as an appendix to this bill.

This draft contains two sum certain appropriations [proposed s. 20.505 (4) (q) and (qm)] that, together with the program revenue appropriation in proposed s. 20.505 (4) (jm), constitute the funding for the operations and programs of the Wisconsin Conservation Corps Board. Because the 2011-13 biennial budget act (like all biennial budget acts) will repeal and recreate the appropriation schedule in s. 20,005 (3), stats... any sum certain appropriation for the next fiscal biennium will be eliminated by that act unless that act also contains the same appropriations. Because the proposed program revenue appropriation contained in this draft is continuing and is not dependent upon that act to specify a funding level, it will probably not be affected by that act. However, since the proposed sum certain appropriations in this draft are dependent upon that act to specify a funding level for the 2011-13 fiscal biennium, this draft makes these appropriations effective on the last day of the 2009-11 fiscal biennium so that they will be in force before the new budget act takes effect. This may help to ensure that these appropriations will be considered "cost to continue" rather than "new" appropriations, giving them a slightly better chance of surviving the 2011-13 budget decision-making process. It will also enable the WCC board to commence operations on July 1, 2011 even if (as has usually been the pattern in recent decades) the 2011-13 biennial budget act is not enacted by July 1, 2011.

You requested a variety of provisions that interlock with other laws: 1) Unemployment insurance: UI coverage for nonprofit organizations employing 4 or more persons is controlled by federal law. This draft contains two sum certain appropriations [proposed s. 20.505 (4) (q) and (qm)] that, together with the program revenue appropriation in proposed s. 20.505 (4) (jm), constitute the funding for the operations and programs of the Wisconsin Conservation Corps Board. Because the 2011-13 biennial budget act (like all biennial budget acts) will repeal and recreate the appropriation schedule in s. 20.005 (3), stats... any sum certain appropriation for the next fiscal biennium will be eliminated by that act unless that act also contains the same appropriations. Because the proposed program revenue appropriation contained in this draft is continuing and is not dependent upon that act to specify a funding level, it will probably not be affected by that act. However, since the proposed sum certain appropriations in this draft are dependent upon that act to specify a funding level for the 2011-13 fiscal biennium, this draft makes these appropriations effective on the last day of the 2009-11 fiscal biennium so that they will be in force before the new budget act takes effect. This may help to ensure that these appropriations will be considered "cost to continue" rather than "new" appropriations, giving them a slightly better chance of surviving the 2011-13 budget decision-making process. It will also enable the WCC board to commence operations on July 1, 2011 even if (as has usually been the pattern in recent decades) the 2011-13 biennial budget act is not enacted by July 1, 2011.

The staff and board would then prepare the implementation plan for the passive review of JCF. This would require both a new effective date for at least some portions of the draft and a somewhat later deadline by which time the plan should be submitted to JCF. Under passive review, if JCF wants to meet, the WCC program could not be implemented until the meeting is held and the implementation plan is either approved or approved with modifications.
- 3. As the draft stands, DOA is responsible for budgeting, payroll, and accounting functions for the board and the board's staff (but not the manager's or sponsors' staffs). This would require relatively little effort for DOA and should be manageable with the use of DOA's existing staff. This is the normal model for attached boards in state

government. If you want to have DOA perform this function for sponsors as well, we need to change the draft. I should note that such a provision would be unusual and complicated because these sponsors are governed by different laws and ordinances than those that apply to the state.
