2	Whereas, over 42,000 people will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer this year
3	in the United States and over 35,000 will die from the disease; and
4	Whereas, pancreatic cancer is the deadliest cancer and the fourth leading cause
5	of cancer death in the United States; and
6	Whereas, approximately 710 deaths will occur in 2009 in the state of Wisconsin
7	alone due to pancreatic cancer; and
8	Whereas, 76 percent of pancreatic cancer patients die within the first year of
9	their diagnosis, and 95 percent of pancreatic cancer patients die within the first five
10	years; and
11	Whereas, there is no cure for pancreatic cancer and there have been no
12	significant improvements in early detection, treatment methods, or survival rates in

the last 30 years; and

pancreatic cancer in Wisconsin.

Whereas, when symptoms of pancreatic cancer present themselves, it is usually too late for an optimistic prognosis, and the average life expectancy of those diagnosed with metastasis disease is only three to six months; and

Whereas, incidence of pancreatic cancer is approximately 50 percent higher in African Americans than in other ethnic groups; and

Whereas, the federal government invests less money in pancreatic cancer research than it does in any of the other leading cancer killers; and

Whereas, the good health and well-being of the residents of the state of Wisconsin are enhanced as a direct result of increased awareness about pancreatic cancer and research into early detection, causes, and effective treatments; now, therefore, be it
