The Governor has signed an executive order establishing the "off" indicator for both the supplemental and extended benefits programs. A copy is attached below. What this means is this:

The supplemental benefit period will begin in week 5 unless there is legislation in time to prevent its beginning.

The Executive Order makes the "off" indicator "effective" the week beginning February 8, 2009 (week 7). The "off" indicator in week 7 will cause supplemental benefit period to end in week 10. Therefore, even if no legislation is enacted, the supplemental benefit period that begins week 5 will end in week 10, which begins Sunday March 1. There can be no eligible supplemental benefit claims in or after week 10.

We intend to introduce legislation with the expectation it will be enacted by the Governor in week 5 with an effective date in week 5. If that occurs, that legislation will close the supplemental benefit period to claims in week 5. Of course, it remains to be seen whether legislation will pass in a timely manner, but we have reason to be optimistic that it will.

The Executive Order also makes the "off" indicator effective in week 7 and prevent a benefit period from beginning. Of course, no extended benefit period has been or will be triggered before week 10.

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDER # 273**

#### Relating to the Allowance of Federally Funded Emergency Unemployment Benefits in Lieu of Wisconsin Supplemental Benefits

**WHEREAS**, in 2008 federal programs for emergency unemployment benefits were enacted to provide benefits beyond those afforded to unemployed persons under state unemployment insurance programs, namely the Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2008, Title IV -- Emergency Unemployment Compensation Act, Public Law 110-252, enacted June 30, 2008 ("EUC08"); and the Unemployment Compensation Extension Act, Public Law 110-449, enacted November 21, 2008 ("EUC08 Extension"); and

**WHEREAS**, EUC08 has afforded and will afford emergency unemployment benefits to qualified unemployed persons in Wisconsin and in other states who have exhausted or will exhaust their claims for regular state unemployment benefits; and

**WHEREAS**, the most recent federal legislation on emergency unemployment benefits, EUC08 Extension, will, if triggered "on" by certain statutory conditions, afford additional benefits to qualified unemployed persons in Wisconsin and other states who have exhausted or will exhaust their claim for benefits under EUC08; and

**WHEREAS**, available data indicate that the economic conditions for triggering "on" EUC08 Extension benefits, including among other triggering conditions, the rate of insured unemployment, probably exist now in Wisconsin; and

**WHEREAS,** if such triggering conditions are shown to exist in the week ending January 10, 2009, certain additional benefits under the EUC08 Extension will begin to be payable to qualified individuals in Wisconsin for a period of time that will begin with the week ending January 31, 2009; and

**WHEREAS**, the qualifying conditions for triggering "on" payment of EUC08 Extension benefits are very similar to the qualifying economic conditions for triggering "on" the payment of Wisconsin supplemental

unemployment benefits (Wisconsin supplemental benefits) under Wis. Stat. § 108.142; and

**WHEREAS,** if qualifying economic conditions for triggering "on" the payment of Wisconsin supplemental benefits are shown to exist in the week ending January 10, 2009, Wisconsin supplemental benefits will become payable to qualified individuals in Wisconsin in the week ending January 31, 2009; and

**WHEREAS**, Wis. Stat. § 108.141 further provides Wisconsin extended unemployment benefits (Wisconsin extended benefits) may be triggered "on" when the qualifying economic conditions under Wis. Stat. § 108.141(1)(f) are met; and

**WHEREAS,** if qualifying economic conditions for triggering "on" the payment of Wisconsin extended benefits are shown to exist in some future week, Wisconsin extended benefits will become payable to qualified individuals in Wisconsin in the week that follows thereafter, as more particularly provided in Wis. Stat. § 108.141; and

**WHEREAS,** the Wisconsin supplemental and extended benefits programs were designed and intended to benefit unemployed persons in Wisconsin and have served their purposes; and

**WHEREAS,** the Legislature foresaw that the programs might be unnecessary or even interfere with the opportunity to obtain benefits under other programs afforded by the federal government, including programs of the type created by Congress in 2008, EUC08 and EUC Extension, and for that reason the legislation afforded the governor the power and authority to temporarily suspend the state programs to allow for the payment of additional federally funded benefits under Wis. Stat. §§ 108.142(1m) and 108.141(1m); and

**WHEREAS**, it is clear that the EUC08 and EUC Extension will provide substantially greater benefits to Wisconsin's unemployed population than the Wisconsin supplemental and extended benefits programs and that if the state programs are triggered they will diminish the overall benefits available to Wisconsin's unemployed; and

**WHEREAS,** it is in the interests of the residents of the state of Wisconsin, and unemployed persons and employers in Wisconsin in particular, that unemployed persons be legally permitted to fully participate in the existing and future federal unemployment programs (including, but not limited, to EUC08 and EUC Extension) without the interference of state statutes that are inconsistent with such federal programs;

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, JIM DOYLE**, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State, and specifically by Sections 108.142(1m) and 108.141(1m) of the Wisconsin Statutes, do hereby order that:

1. Wisconsin elects to establish a Wisconsin "off" indicator within the meaning of Wis. Stat. § 108.142(1m) in order to allow for the payment of additional federally funded benefits in lieu of Wisconsin

supplemental benefits, including, but not limited, to benefits under the EUC08 and EUC08 Extension programs. The "off" indicator shall be effective as of the week beginning Sunday, February 8, 2009, and until removed by Executive Order or legislation.

2. Wisconsin elects to establish a Wisconsin "off" indicator within the meaning of Wis. Stat. § 108.141(1m) in order to allow for the payment of additional federally funded benefits in lieu of extended benefits, including, but not limited, to benefits under the EUC08 and EUC08 Extension programs. The "off" indicator shall be effective as of the week beginning Sunday, February 8, 2009, and until removed by Executive Order or legislation.

# Re: Request for drafting re Wisconsin Supplemental Benefits and Extended Benefits

As we discussed, this morning, I am requesting that the Legislative Reference Bureau draft a bill to amend the unemployment statutes affecting Wisconsin supplemental benefits and extended benefits.

Wisconsin's rate of insured unemployment reached a level of 4% for week 2 (January 4 - 10) 2009. The 4% level is "one percentage point below the percentage [5%] specified in s. 108.141(1)(f)1" and thus satisfies the second of the two parts of Wis. Stat. §108.142(1)(b)1 (the first of the two parts having been satisfied some weeks previously). Therefore there is an "on" indicator for week 2, 2009.

According to Wis. Stat. §108.142(1)(a), a result of an "on" indicator for week 2 is that a supplemental benefit period will begin with the third week after week 2, which is the week ending January 31, 2009, week 5.

The Governor issued an executive order on January 16, 2008 (week 3) to establish an "off" indicator under Wis. Stat. §§108.141(1m) and 108.142(1m) for the extended and supplemental benefits, respectively. The executive order is effective the fourth week after the executive order is issued. *Id.* Thus the off indicator will take effect in week 7 (January 8 -14).

Under §108.142(1)(a), the supplemental benefit period will end with the third week after which there is an "off" indicator, which in this case is week 10, which begins Sunday March 1.

During the supplemental benefit period, supplemental benefits will be payable to eligible claimants. See §108.142(1)(g), "Eligibility period" defined. Claimants eligible for supplemental benefits will not be eligible for federally funded benefits under Emergency Unemployment Compensation enacted in 2008 ("EUC08") because of the requirements in EUC08 that such claimants exhaust state benefits as a condition of eligibility for federal.

Because of the provisions in EUC08 and the circumstances of the supplemental benefit period, eligibility for and receipt of Wisconsin supplemental benefits for up to 8 weeks under §108.142 will, for some persons, reduce the entitlement to EUC08 benefits they

would have otherwise. The amounts by which the EUC08 benefits would be reduced would be as much as 33 weeks for some while their state supplemental benefits are limited to 8 weeks at most.

The Department of Workforce Development is interested in legislation to prevent the payment of supplemental benefits, which are state-funded, in weeks ending after enactment of the legislation during which federally funded benefits are payable in Wisconsin, including, but not limited to EUC08, and any federally funded benefits yet to be enacted. For example, if legislation is enacted and effective on January 27, 2009, the legislation would provide that no benefits are payable in weeks ending on January 31 and thereafter while federally funded benefits are payable.

Similarly, the Department is concerned that the extended benefits, although not yet triggered "on", might become triggered on by further deterioration of the economy. It appears that the federal government does not presently intend to operate this program in the near future. In fact the EUC08 suspended the extended benefit program through December 31, 2009. However, we are concerned that some might read the state statute as requiring the payment of extended benefits (if by its provisions and economic conditions it is triggered on) independently of what federal law provides. For that reason, we are interested in amending Wis. Stat. §108.141 to suspend the payment of benefits for the period during which the federal extended benefits are not payable.

#### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, qualified claimants who have exhausted their regular unemployment insurance benefits may potentially receive additional/weeks of benefits specified by law if a Wisconsin supplemental benefit period or a federal extended benefit period is in effect. Both Wisconsin supplemental and extended benefits are paid for in whole or in part by employers in this state. Recently, the federal government has made available additional federally funded unemployment insurance benefits to claimants in this state who have exhausted their regular benefits. These additional benefits have been and may in the future be funded by the federal government directly with little or no cost to employers in this state. Current law permits the governor to suspend payment of either Wisconsin supplemental or federal extended benefits in this state in order to allow for payment of additional federally funded benefits.

This bill provides that no Wisconsin supplemental benefits may be paid for any week of unemployment ending after January 27, 2009, during which additional federally funded benefits are payable in this state unless the governor suspends this suspension to permit resumption of Wisconsin supplemental benefit payments. The bill also provides that no federal extended benefits may be paid for any week of unemployment ending after January 27, 2009, unless extended benefits are payable

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in this state for that week under federal law. The bill permits the governor to suspend this suspension to permit resumption of extended benefit payments.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

**Section 1.** 108.141 (1m) of the statutes is amended to read:

sub. (1), no extended benefits may be paid for any week of unemployment ending after January 27, 2009, unless benefits are payable for that week under P.L. 91–373, as amended, in this state. 

Both Wisconsin supplemental and federal extended benefits are paid for in whole or in part by employers in this state. Recently, the federal government has made available additional federally funded unemployment insurance benefits to claimants in this state who have exhausted their regular benefits. These additional benefits have been and may in the future be funded by the federal government directly with little or no cost to employers in this state. Current law permits the governor to suspend payment of either Wisconsin supplemental or federal extended benefits in this state in order to allow for payment of additional federally funded benefits.

This bill provides that no Wisconsin supplemental benefits may be paid for any week of unemployment ending after January 27, 2009, during which additional federally funded benefits are payable in this state unless the governor suspends this suspension to permit resumption of Wisconsin supplemental benefit payments. The bill also provides that no federal extended benefits may be paid for any week of unemployment ending after January 27, 2009, unless extended benefits are payable

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in this state for that week under federal law. The bill permits the governor to suspend this suspension to permit resumption of extended benefit payments.
