Animal Protection Community and Industry Support: Uniform Antifreeze Bittering Agent Legislation - House Bill 398

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS), the Humane Society Legislative Fund (HSLF), the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (MSPCA), and the antifreeze industry (The Consumer Specialty Products Association) support uniform bittering agent legislation in Massachusetts; as contained in House Bill 398.

Uniform bittering agent legislation would require that engine coolant/antifreeze that is more than 10 percent ethylene glycol must also contain denatonium benzoate, the world's bitterest known substance, to render it unpalatable. This legislation can be a useful tool in helping save countless animal lives and reduce the number of childhood emergencies.

<u>Background</u>: Children and animals (including companion animals and endangered species) are accidentally poisoned each year from ingesting antifreeze that is *improperly* stored or disposed of by consumers. One survey estimates that 10,000 dogs and cats are poisoned by antifreeze ingestion each year. Another survey suggests the number could be as high as 90,000. The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Association of Poison Control Centers, the American Medical Association, the American Veterinary Medical Association, the National Safety Council, the Pet Food Institute and the American Journal of Public Health all recommend adding an aversive agent to antifreeze.

Nine states— Arizona, California, Maine, New Mexico, Oregon, Tennessee Vermont, Virginia, and Washington—have successfully passed legislation requiring that a bittering agent be added to ethylene glycol antifreeze to make it unpalatable for animals and children.

<u>Essential Uniform Provisions – Contained in HB 398:</u> We have engaged in a painstaking effort to develop model legislative language that helps protect animals; while providing uniformity for manufacturers. This language is contained in House Bill 398 and includes the following necessary provisions:

- Reasonable Effective Date: Provides a reasonable effective date, January 1, 2011, to allow manufacturers to ramp-up supply in the East Coast and provide bitter antifreeze to Massachusetts.
- Stipulates Effective Bittering Agent: Stipulates that the bittering agent (denatonium benzoate or DB) will be added to ethylene-glycol based antifreeze at a range of 30-50 parts per million to render the product unpalatable.
- Assigns Liability: Assigns liability for denatonium benzoate to bitterant manufacturers and assigns liability for
 ethylene –glycol based antifreeze to the manufacturers of antifreeze--who do not produce the bittering agent but
 would be required to include it in their products.
- **Provides Uniform Statewide Mandate:** Provides a uniform statewide mandate, by preempting local jurisdictions from taking action.
- Provides Necessary Exemptions: Exempts the sale of vehicles containing antifreeze and commercial quantities of antifreeze (in 55-gallons) used for professional purposes.
- Provides for Enforcement: Provides for enforcement action and penalties for non-compliance.

The carefully crafted requirements contained in House Bill 398 are absolutely essential to accomplishing the goals of this legislation and ensuring that Massachusetts has an adequate and compliant antifreeze supply. Additional amendments or elimination of provisions within the purposed amended legislation will defeat the goals of the bill and undermine the broad support that it has. Therefore, we jointly urge passage of these key provisions of House Bill 398; to help protect children and animals.

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

New Act

Creates the Antifreeze Bittering Act. Provides that any engine coolant or antifreeze that is manufactured after January 1, 2011, and subsequently sold within the State, and that contains more than 10% ethylene glycol, shall include denatonium benzoate at a minimum of 30 parts per million and a maximum of 50 parts per million as a bittering agent within the product so as to render it unpalatable. Requires a manufacturer of a product subject to this Act to maintain a record of the trade name, scientific name, and active ingredients of any bittering agent used and to make such information available to the public upon request. Provides that subject to certain exceptions, a manufacturer, processor, distributor, recycler, or seller of an engine coolant or antifreeze that is required to contain an aversive agent shall not be liable to any person for any personal injury, death, property damage, damage to the environment (including natural resources), or economic loss that results from the inclusion of denatonium benzoate in any engine coolant or antifreeze, provided that the inclusion of denatonium benzoate is present in concentrations mandated under the Act. Contains provisions concerning exemptions and penalties. Denies home rule powers.

AN ACT ...; relating to: requiring bittering agents in certain engine coolants and

antifreeze and providing a penalty.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill requires that engine coolant or antifreeze that is sold within this state and that contains more than 10% ethylene glycol also contain, as a bittering agent, denatonium benzoate in a concentration between 30 and 50 parts per million. Under the bill, a manufacturer of such engine coolant or antifreeze must maintain a record of the trade name, scientific name, and active ingredients of any bittering agent used in the engine coolant or antifreeze, and must make the record available to the public upon request.

The bill exempts a manufacturer, processor, distributor, recycler, or seller of an engine coolant or antifreeze from liability for any personal injury, death, property damage, environmental damage, or economic loss caused by the inclusion of denatonium benzoate in the engine coolant or antifreeze, if the denatonium benzoate is present in a concentration required in the bill. The provisions of the bill do not apply to the sale of a motor vehicle that contains engine coolant or antifreeze or to antifreeze sold in containers with a capacity of 55 gallons or more.

A person who violates the provisions of the bill is subject to up to 90 days imprisonment, a fine up to \$1,500, or both.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. 100.383 of the statutes is created to read:

- 100.383 Antifreeze; bittering required. (1) Any engine coolant or antifreeze that is sold within this state and that contains more than 10 percent ethylene glycol, shall contain, as a bittering agent, denatonium benzoate in a concentration of not less than 30 parts per million nor more than 50 parts per million.
- (2) A manufacturer of an engine coolant or antifreeze described in sub. (1) shall maintain a record of the trade name, scientific name, and active ingredients of any bittering agent used in the engine coolant or antifreeze, and shall make the record available to the public upon request.
- (3) Notwithstanding s. 100.38, a manufacturer, processor, distributor, recycler, or seller of an engine coolant or antifreeze that is described in sub. (1) is not liable to any person for any personal injury, death, property damage, environmental damage, or economic loss caused by the inclusion of denatonium benzoate in the engine coolant or antifreeze, if the denatonium benzoate is present in a concentration required in sub. (1).
- (4) This section does not apply to the sale of a motor vehicle that contains engine coolant or antifreeze or to antifreeze sold in containers with a capacity of 55 gallons or more.
- (5) A person who violates this section may be imprisoned in the county jail for not more than 90 days or fined not more than \$1,500 or both.

Note that I have not revised the liability exemption language in the previous version as the exemption, by its terms, applies only to injuries "caused by the inclusion of denatonium benzoate in the engine coolant or antifreeze." Consistent with your instructions, this language does not limit liability for injuries unrelated to the addition of bittering agents.
