### Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

SB 108 prohibits mandating overtime for direct patient health care workers except in unforeseen emergencies, as defined in the bill, or in cases where the affected worker consents. The bill's definition of "unforeseen emergencies" generally limits these circumstances to declared emergencies and specifically excludes situations where "...a health care facility has inadequate staff due to chronic short staffing or other foreseeable causes."

Agencies that will be fiscally impacted by the proposed bill are the Department of Corrections, Department of Health Services, Department of Veterans Affairs and any other state agencies that employ patient health care workers. The Office of State Employment Relations cannot predict what steps various state agencies would have to take in order to comply with the bill's provisions, therefore the potential costs are indeterminate.

#### Potential costs are:

- (1) Agencies will need to secure additional positions and funding authority to be able to avoid mandatory overtime for patient care in unforeseen emergencies or to provide adequate staffing during other circumstances where overtime is currently mandated, including scheduled vacations, leaves of absence, sick call-in's, etc.
- (2) The availability of skilled workers can and will vary for each affected facility. Increased demand from limited pools of candidates could cause an increase in wage and benefit costs needed to attract and retain qualified candidates.
- (3) Agencies will need to increase contracting for services for the following occupational groups nurse clinician, licensed practical nurse, and certified nurse assistants, among others. Again, each facility will experience different compensation/contracting costs due to the availability of providers with qualified staff.

#### **Long-Range Fiscal Implications**
