Senator Jauch, with unanimous consent, asked that when the Senate adjourn, it do so in honor of Superior High School wrestler, Nikola Bogojevic, who won the WIAA Division I Heavyweight Championship. Niko defeated all of his opponents in the 2009–2010 regular season, won the Heart O’North Conference Title, remained undefeated in the playoffs and was crowned Regional, Sectional and then State Champion. He completed the season with a perfect 38–0 record. Nikola’s family, school and coach are all extremely proud.

Senator Jauch, with unanimous consent, asked that when the Senate adjourn, it do so in honor of Marilyn Christopherson, a very dear friend, who has spent her adult life serving the Superior community through her work with Catholic Charities. Recently Marilyn Christopherson was presented the Distinguished Service Award for more than 30 years of volunteer service to Catholic Charities by the Catholic Charities Bureau Board of Directors. She is also a member of an important alumni community as the spouse of a former state senator, Frank Christopherson.
