

## WISCONSIN LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL ACT MEMO

## 2009 Wisconsin Act 223 [2009 Senate Bill 224]

Notice of Proposed Vacation of Certain Highways

## Current Law

Current law provides that:

• The common council of a city, *except a first class city, or a village or town board* (*governing body*) may discontinue all or a portion of a public way. A proceeding to discontinue a public way may be initiated by a written petition of owners of property fronting on the way or by resolution of the governing body. Upon receipt of a petition or introduction of a resolution, the governing body must provide public notice of the time and place at which the petition or resolution will be considered. The governing body is also required to provide a copy of the petition or resolution to the Secretary of Transportation if the public way that is the subject of the petition or resolution is located within one-quarter mile of a state trunk highway or connecting highway.

• The common council of a *first class city* may discontinue a highway, street, alley, ground, waterway, public walk, or other public grounds (public facility) within the corporate limits of the city. A proceeding to discontinue a public facility may be initiated by a petition of all owners of property abutting the public facility or by resolution of the common council. A notice of hearing must be served upon all owners of record of property abutting the public facility subject to the discontinuance proceeding.

## 2009 Wisconsin Act 223

Under 2009 Wisconsin Act 223, a governing body or the common council of a first class city must provide a copy of the petition or resolution to discontinue to the commissioner of railroads if there is a railroad highway crossing within the portion of the public way or public facility that is the subject of the petition or resolution to discontinue.

Effective date: 2009 Wisconsin Act 223 took effect on May 20, 2010.
