Description

Mandatory reporting of child abuse or neglect by school district employees; training in child abuse and neglect identification, laws, and procedures for those employees; retaliation against a person who reports child abuse or neglect in good faith, and granting rule-making authority

Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Current law requires certain professionals to report suspected abuse or neglect, when those individuals encounter children in the course of their duties and have a reason to believe that the child has been or will be threatened with abuse or neglect. Additionally, under current law, any citizen may report suspected abuse or neglect to local authorities.

This bill makes all public school employees mandatory child abuse and neglect reporters. Currently, only school teachers, administrators, counselors, nurses, therapists, and social workers are required to report suspected incidents of child abuse or neglect. Additionally, the bill requires that all public school employees receive training in identifying child abuse and neglect.

Under the existing law, the Department, in conjunction with the Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and the Child Welfare Professional Development System, made materials available for local entities to administer child abuse and neglect training programs. This law requires the Department to make available training programs to school districts to enable them to comply with the law. This requirement will not change current practices and will not increase costs to the Department. The bill may increase costs to counties, due to potential increased demand on county child welfare agencies for technical assistance and/or training of the additional school employees. It is not possible to determine the extent of the increased cost, if any, to counties.
