Subject: Proposed Amendment to Assembly Bill 440

I would like to thank you for considering the following proposed amendment language to Assembly Bill 440. This legislation will give doctors and pharmacists the ability to interact electronically when prescribing schedule II substances (i.e. hydrocodone, oxycodone, opium, Ritalin, morphine, and other narcotics).

The bill not only creates efficiencies in the health care system, but it allows for greater protection of prescriptions and helps curb the illegal use of narcotics and other controlled substances.

While reviewing the legislation, the Department of Health Services has identified a potential change that would strengthen the bill and ensure that pharmacists would not be required to duplicate administrative services. The bill, in its current format, fails to allow for an emergency schedule II substance prescription to have the option of being reduced to an "electronic record".

The following is a proposed technical fix to the legislation that will ensure that physicians and pharmacists have the most effective and efficient means of serving their patients.

SECTION 2. 961.38 (1r) of the statutes is amended to read:

961.38 (1r) Except when dispensed directly by a practitioner, other than a pharmacy, to an ultimate user, no controlled substance included in schedule II may be dispensed without the written <a href="https://example.com/hard-copy">hard-copy</a> or electronic prescription of a practitioner.

SECTION 3. 961.38 (2) of the statutes is amended to read:

961.38 (2) In emergency situations, as defined by rule of the pharmacy examining board, schedule II drugs may be dispensed upon <u>an</u> oral <u>or electronic</u> prescription of a practitioner, reduced promptly to <u>a written hard copy or electronic record</u> writing and filed by the pharmacy.

Prescriptions shall be retained in conformity with rules of the pharmacy examining board promulgated under s. 961.31. No prescription for a schedule II substance may be refilled.

#### 2011 ASSEMBLY BILL 440

December 20, 2011 – Introduced by Representative Stone, cosponsored by Senator Vukmir. Referred to Committee on Health.

AN ACT to amend 450.11 (2), 961.38 (1r) and 961.38 (2) of the statutes; relating

to: electronic prescriptions for schedule II controlled substances.

#### Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, controlled substances are divided into five separate schedules, depending on the substance's potential for abuse, whether the substance has a currently accepted and safe medical use, and whether and to what degree the substance leads to physical or psychological dependence. Schedule II substances are those that have a high potential for abuse and may lead to severe physical or psychological dependence, but also have a currently accepted medical use.

Under current law, a drug that is a schedule II substance may be dispensed to a person directly by a practitioner or by a pharmacy with a written prescription by the practitioner or, in the case of an emergency, by a pharmacist who receives an oral or electronic prescription by the practitioner that is promptly reduced to writing and filed by the pharmacist.

Under this bill, a drug that is a schedule II substance may be dispensed by a pharmacy with an electronic prescription by the practitioner in cases that are not emergencies and without the requirement that the prescription be reduced to writing.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

#### **ASSEMBLY BILL 440**

<b>SECTION 1.</b> 450.11 (2) of the statutes is amended to read:
450.11 (2) Prescription order file. Every prescription order shall be filed in
a suitable book or file and preserved for at least 5 years. Subject to s. 961.38 (2),
prescription Prescription orders transmitted electronically may be filed and
preserved in electronic format.
SECTION 2. 961.38 (1r) of the statutes is amended to read:
961.38 (1r) Except when dispensed directly by a practitioner, other than a
pharmacy, to an ultimate user, no controlled substance included in schedule II may
be dispensed without the written or electronic prescription of a practitioner.
SECTION 3. 961.38 (2) of the statutes is amended to read:
961.38 (2) In emergency situations, as defined by rule of the pharmacy
examining board, schedule II drugs may be dispensed upon an oral or electronic
prescription of a practitioner, reduced promptly to writing and filed by the pharmacy.
Prescriptions shall be retained in conformity with rules of the pharmacy examining
board promulgated under s. 961.31. No prescription for a schedule II substance may
be refilled.


