## Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

This bill provides a Class H felony if a person incarcerated in a prison or resides in a mental health facility possesses correctional employee's personal identifiable information or a document relating to the employee's personal identifying information. This bill also allows a correctional employee who is a victim of unauthorized possession of his or her personal identifying information or documents to obtain a security freeze on his or her credit reports free of charge if the unauthorized possession is reported to a law enforcement agency.

The Department of Corrections is unable to estimate the number of offenders who will be subject to the new criminal penalty provisions of this bill and therefore is unable to estimate the state fiscal impact. However, if additional offenders are convicted, the Department will see increased costs.

In FY11 the annual cost of an inmate in a DOC institution was approximately \$33,500. However, when there is excess capacity in DOC facilities, the incremental costs (i.e. food, health care, and clothing) of housing a small number of inmates is approximately \$5,200, based on FY11 costs. Should the Department use contract beds, the rate would be approximately \$18,800 annually per person. The annual cost for community supervision was \$2,900 in FY11.
