## **Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate**

This bill primarily rewrites Chapter 49, relating to public assistance and children and family services. This fiscal estimate focuses on statutory changes to Chapter 71 contained in the bill and does not describe other provisions of the bill.

Under current law the development zones credit for job creation or retention allows employers to claim a credit if they create or retain full-time jobs in a designated development zone. Enhanced credits are available if employees are members of certain targeted groups, including participants in the real work, real pay pilot project. Since the pilot project no longer exists, this bill amends the development zones credit references to the pilot project. The bill does not affect eligibility for the credit and is not expected to have a fiscal impact.

**Long-Range Fiscal Implications**
