SUBJECT:

Technical Memorandum on SB 408 – relating to the sales and use tax exemption

for coins, currency, and commemorative medallions.

The Department has the following concerns with SB 408:

- 1. It is unclear whether the phrase "that are made from gold, silver, platinum, or palladium, or any combination of such metals" applies only to United States and sovereign coins or if it relates to all of the items listed under the proposed exemption. The inclusion of both "coins" and "coins of the United States and any sovereign government" in the exemption language may be the source of this ambiguity.
- 2. It is unclear whether "any combination of such metals" means that the item may be made only of any combination of gold, silver, platinum, or palladium or a combination of metals that includes any of the stated metals. For example, it is not clear whether a gold- or silver-plated commemorative medallion would be exempt under the bill.
- 3. Without statutory definitions for "currency," "commemorative medallions," and "coins," the exemption may include items that are not intended by the author.
