Assumptions Used in Arriving at Fiscal Estimate

Currently, with some exceptions, a felony prosecution must commence within 6 years of commission of the felony. Current exceptions include 1st degree intentional homicide, 2nd degree intentional homicide, and 1st degree sexual assault of a child. Prosecution for these crimes may commence at any time. Under this bill, the following felonies will also be exceptions so that prosecution may begin at any time: 1st degree sexual assault of an adult; attempts to commit 1st or 2nd degree intentional homicide; and, attempts to commit 1st degree sexual assault of an adult or child. Prosecutors do not anticipate much if any fiscal impact as a result of this bill.

Long-Range Fiscal Implications

Should this bill be enacted, prosecutors do not expect a long-term fiscal impact.
