Under Mr. Riley's leadership, WHEDA focused its energies on trying to capture the inherent relationship between housing and economic development by creating new strategies that increase jobs, make housing more affordable, and promoting policies to renew and invigorate depressed neighborhoods. President Obama recently appointed Mr. Riley to become the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development's Regional Administrator for six Midwestern States including Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS Fannie Frazier Hicklin was a theatre Department faculty member at UW-Whitewater from 1964 to 1988. And as the first African-American faculty member on campus, she directed over fifty theatre productions, and helped to establish Summer Theatre in the Park and the Touring Children's Theatre programs. The University of Wisconsin-Whitewater campus named the Theatre/Dance building in 1996 in her honor "Hicklin Studio Theatre". Miss Hicklin received her Bachelor's degree from Talladega College. She later taught in Missippi, Alabama, and North and South Carolina before moving to Michigan where she earned her Master's Degree in Speech and

Theatre from the University of Michigan. Miss Hicklin has been an active member of Zeta Phi Eta and the Wisconsin State Historical Society. She has also been an active member of First Congregational Church. She has long been dedicated to her city, state, and community; and


